- Compulsory force or threat.
- Constraint illegally exercised to force someone to perform an act.
- Forcible restraint or imprisonment.

badgering	A native or resident of Wisconsin.
captivity	The condition of being imprisoned or confined. <i>He was held in <b>captivity</b> until he died.</i>



coercion	Using force to cause something to occur. Our problem cannot be solved by any form of <b>coercion</b> but only by agreement.
<u>compulsion</u>	Using force to cause something to occur. <i>He felt a <b>compulsion</b> to babble on about the accident.</i>
confinement	The act of keeping something within specified bounds (by force if necessary. <i>He was held in confinement</i> .
constraint	The state of being physically constrained. <i>Time <b>constraint</b>s make it impossible to do everything.</i>
custody	(with `in') guardianship over; in divorce cases it is the right to house and care for and discipline a child. <i>He is in the <b>custody</b> of police.</i>
demand	The act of demanding. The automobile reduced the <b>demand</b> for buggywhips.
detention	The action of detaining someone or the state of being detained in official custody. <i>The detention of tardy pupils.</i>
enforcement	The act of enforcing; ensuring observance of or obedience to. The strict <b>enforcement</b> of environmental regulations.
entreaty	An earnest or humble request. An <b>entreaty</b> to stop the fighting.
exaction	A sum of money exacted from someone. <i>The billions flow in through 28 taxes and countless smaller <b>exaction</b>s.</i>
force	The army navy and air force of a country. A government has not the vitality and <b>force</b> fulness of a living man.
goading	A pointed instrument that is used to prod into a state of motion.
<u>harassment</u>	The act of tormenting by continued persistent attacks and criticism. They face daily <b>harassment</b> and assault on the streets.
<u>imprisonment</u>	The state of being imprisoned; captivity. The <b>imprisonment</b> of captured soldiers.
influence	A person or thing with the capacity to have an influence on someone or something. Used her parents <b>influence</b> to get the job.
insistence	Continual and persistent demands. Alison s <b>insistence</b> on doing the washing up straight after the meal.



internment	The state of being confined as a prisoner, especially for political or military reasons.
intimidation	He was threatened with <b>internment</b> in a concentration camp. The feeling of discouragement in the face of someone's superior fame or wealth or status etc. The <b>intimidation</b> of witnesses and jurors.
<u>nagging</u>	Someone (especially a woman) who annoys people by constantly finding fault.
oppression	The act of subjugating by cruelty. A region shattered by <b>oppression</b> and killing.
persuasion	A group or sect holding a particular religious belief. I am not of your <b>persuasion</b> .
pressure	The pressure exerted by the atmosphere. <i>The <b>pressure</b>s of city life</i> .
provocation	Unfriendly behavior that causes anger or resentment. <i>Twenty patients had a high increase of serum gastrin after <b>provocation</b> <i>with secretin.</i></i>
restraint	A rule or condition that limits freedom. A policy of <b>restraint</b> in public spending.
threats	A warning that something unpleasant is imminent. Earthquakes are a constant threat in Japan.

abduction	The action of forcibly taking someone away against their will. <i>Abductions by armed men in plain clothes.</i>
<u>blackmail</u>	Money demanded by a person or group engaged in blackmail. They were acquitted of charges of <b>blackmail</b> .
<u>captive</u>	Giving or marked by complete attention to. A <b>captive</b> animal.
captivity	The condition of being imprisoned or confined. The third month of their <b>captivity</b> passed.



<u>coerce</u>	To cause to do through pressure or necessity, by physical, moral or intellectual means. Their confessions were allegedly <b>coerce</b> d by torture.
coercion	The act of compelling by force of authority. <i>They didn t have to use coercion</i> .
compel	Necessitate or exact. The water shortage <b>compel</b> s conservation.
<u>compelling</u>	Not able to be refuted; inspiring conviction. A <b>compelling</b> film.
<u>compulsion</u>	An urge to do or say something that might be better left undone or unsaid. <i>He felt a <b>compulsion</b> to babble on about the accident.</i>
<u>compulsory</u>	Required by rule. <i>The abuse of <b>compulsory</b> powers.</i>
confinement	The state of being confined. My grandmother s last six <b>confinement</b> s.
constrain	To close within bounds, or otherwise limit or deprive of free movement. <i>Duty</i> <b>constrain</b> s one to act often contrary to one s desires or inclinations.
constraint	A device that retards something's motion. They would be able to talk without <b>constraint</b> .
custody	Imprisonment. The mother was awarded <b>custody</b> of the children.
disarmament	Act of reducing or depriving of arms. <b>Disarmament</b> treaties between America and the former Soviet Union.
dispossess	Deprive (someone) of land, property, or other possessions. <i>He</i> <b>dispossess</b> ed Hendrie and set off on a solo run.
enforced	Forced or compelled or put in force. A life of <b>enforced</b> inactivity.
<u>fixation</u>	An abnormal state in which development has stopped prematurely. Biopsy specimens were placed in cassettes before <b>fixation</b> in formalin.
force	Take by force. Mark <b>force</b> d her arms back above her head.
forcible	Done by force. Signs of <b>forcible</b> entry.
hale	Prolific United States writer (1822-1909. <i>Hale</i> and hearty.
<u>imprisonment</u>	The state of being imprisoned. The <b>imprisonment</b> of captured soldiers.



make	Make by shaping or bringing together constituents. What <b>make</b> of car is that.
obsession	The state of being obsessed with someone or something. <i>He was in the grip of an <b>obsession</b> he was powerless to resist.</i>
pressure	The act of pressing the exertion of pressure. She <b>pressure</b> d her son to accept a job offer from the bank.
restraint	A device which limits or prevents freedom of movement. <i>He urged the protestors to exercise <b>restraint</b>.</i>
restriction	An act of limiting or restricting (as by regulation. The <b>restriction</b> of local government power.
tighten	Become tight or tighter. <i>Tighten</i> the rules.
travail	Concluding state of pregnancy; from the onset of contractions to the birth of a child. <i>Creation may travail in pain but it cannot escape its destiny.</i>
