- blackness** The property or quality of being black in colour.  
*The **blackness** of the human heart through the atrocities of war.*
- close of day** The temporal end; the concluding time.
- crepuscle** The time of day immediately following sunset.
- crepuscule** Twilight.
- dark** The time after sunset and before sunrise while it is dark outside.  
*His lectures dispelled the **darkness**.*
- darkness** Unhappiness or gloom.  
*The powers of **darkness**.*
- dimness** The state of being poorly illuminated.
- evenfall** The time of day immediately following sunset.  
*He kindles his lamp at **evenfall**.*

<b>evening</b>	An evening characterized by a particular event or activity. <i>The <b>evening</b> meal.</i>
<b>fall</b>	A controlled act of falling especially as a stunt or in martial arts. <i>They finished before the <b>fall</b> of night.</i>
<b>gloom</b>	The time of day immediately following sunset.
<b>gloaming</b>	Twilight; dusk. <i>Hundreds of lights are already shimmering in the <b>gloaming</b>.</i>
<b>gloominess</b>	An atmosphere of depression and melancholy.
<b>murk</b>	Darkness or thick mist that makes it difficult to see. <i>My eyes were straining to see through the <b>murk</b> of the rainy evening.</i>
<b>murkiness</b>	An atmosphere in which visibility is reduced because of a cloud of some substance.
<b>nightfall</b>	The time of day immediately following sunset. <i>We had to get back by <b>nightfall</b>.</i>
<b>obscurity</b>	The quality of being difficult to understand. <i>He worked in <b>obscurity</b> for many years.</i>
<b>shade</b>	A lampshade. <i>He wore <b>shades</b> and a leather jacket.</i>
<b>shadiness</b>	Of questionable honesty or legality. <i>They acted with such obvious <b>shadiness</b> that they were instantly recognizable.</i>
<b>shadows</b>	Shade within clear boundaries. <i>The poor child was his mother's shadow.</i>
<b>sundown</b>	The time in the evening when the sun disappears or daylight fades.
<b>sunset</b>	The colours and light visible in the sky on an occasion of the sun's disappearance in the evening, considered as a view or spectacle. <i><b>Sunset</b> was still a couple of hours away.</i>
<b>twilight</b>	The period of the evening when twilight is visible between daylight and darkness. <i>A <b>twilight</b> world of secrecy.</i>

- curfew** The daily signal indicating the beginning of a curfew.  
*They had to return before the **curfew** sounded.*
- dawn** The beginning of a phenomenon or period of time, especially one considered favourable.  
*The awful truth was beginning to **dawn** on him.*
- daybreak** The first light of day.  
*She set off at **daybreak**.*
- evening** An evening characterized by a particular event or activity.  
*A couple in **evening** dress.*
- friday** The sixth day of the week; the fifth working day.
- gloaming** Twilight; dusk.  
*Hundreds of lights are already shimmering in the **gloaming**.*

<b>midnight</b>	The middle period of the night. <i>The <b>midnight</b> hours.</i>
<b>monday</b>	The second day of the week; the first working day.
<b>morning</b>	Every morning. <i>They talked until <b>morning</b>.</i>
<b>nightfall</b>	The time of day immediately following sunset. <i>We had to get back by <b>nightfall</b>.</i>
<b>nocturnal</b>	Of or relating to or occurring in the night. <i>Most owls are <b>nocturnal</b>.</i>
<b>noon</b>	The middle of the day. <i>The service starts at twelve <b>noon</b>.</i>
<b>o'clock</b>	According to the clock.
<b>saturday</b>	The seventh and last day of the week; observed as the Sabbath by Jews and some Christians.
<b>sunday</b>	United States evangelist (1862-1935).
<b>sunrise</b>	The first light of day. <i>An hour before <b>sunrise</b>.</i>
<b>sunset</b>	(of a programme, agency, regulation, etc.) expire or be terminated automatically at the end of a fixed period unless renewed by legislative action. <i>A blue and gold <b>sunset</b>.</i>
<b>thursday</b>	The fifth day of the week; the fourth working day.
<b>tomorrow</b>	The near future. <i>I have work to do <b>tomorrow</b> morning.</i>
<b>tonight</b>	The present or immediately coming night. <i><b>Tonight</b> is a night to remember.</i>
<b>tuesday</b>	The third day of the week; the second working day.
<b>twilight</b>	Lighted by or as if by twilight Henry Fielding. <i>A pleasant walk in the woods at <b>twilight</b>.</i>
<b>wake</b>	Be awake be alert be there. <i>His workers absented themselves for the local <b>wakes</b>.</i>
<b>wednesday</b>	The fourth day of the week; the third working day.
<b>week</b>	The time spent working during a week. <i>I work during the <b>week</b> so I can only get to this shop on Saturdays.</i>
<b>weekday</b>	Any day except Sunday (and sometimes except Saturday). <i>The <b>weekday</b> rush hour.</i>

**yesterday** In the recent past; only a short time ago.  
*It was in **yesterday**'s newspapers.*
