<b>rubble</b>	Waste or rough fragments of stone, brick, concrete, etc., especially as the debris from the demolition of buildings. <i>The tower is built of stone <b>rubble</b> faced with ashlar.</i>
<b>sweep</b>	An act of sweeping something with a brush. <i>She asked if I wanted a membrane <b>sweep</b> to get labour going.</i>
<b>wipe</b>	A cinematographic effect in which an existing picture seems to be wiped out by a new one as the boundary between them moves across the screen. <i>Bert was giving the machine a final <b>wipe</b> over with an oily rag.</i>

- *Beat up or kill someone.*
- *Distribute loosely.*

- *Cover lightly with a powdered substance.*
- *Bring something out for use again after a long period of neglect.*
- *Sprinkle (a powdered substance) on to something.*
- *Remove the dust or dirt from the surface of (something) by wiping or brushing it.*

- powder** Sprinkle or cover a surface with powder or a powdery substance.  
*Broken glass **powdered** the floor.*
- scatter** Sow by scattering.  
*The children **scattered** in all directions when the teacher approached.*
- sift** Put (a fine or loose substance) through a sieve so as to remove lumps or large particles.  
***Sift** through the job candidates.*
- spray** Cover by spraying with a liquid.  
*Water **sprayed** all over the floor.*
- spread** Spread across or over.  
*He sighed **spreading** jam on a croissant.*
- sprinkle** Distribute or disperse something randomly or irregularly throughout (something).  
*I **sprinkled** the floor with water.*
- strew** Spread by scattering.  
*Dead bodies **strewed** the ground.*
- sweep** Make a big sweeping gesture or movement.  
*Please **sweep** the floor.*
- wipe** Pass a swipe card over an electronic reader.  
*The man **wiped** his hands on his hips.*

<b>aphid</b>	A small bug which feeds by sucking sap from plants; a blackfly or greenfly. Aphids reproduce rapidly, sometimes producing live young without mating, and large numbers can cause extensive damage to plants.
<b>broom</b>	Sweep with a broom or as if with a broom.
<b>brush</b>	Apply a liquid to a surface with a brush. <i>Brush the potatoes with oil.</i>
<b>cleaner</b>	A device for cleaning such as a vacuum cleaner. <i>An oven cleaner.</i>
<b>cleaning</b>	The action of making something clean, especially the inside of a house. <i>The housekeeper will help with the cleaning.</i>
<b>cobweb</b>	Something resembling a cobweb in delicacy or intricacy. <i>The wooden carvings were almost obliterated by cobwebs.</i>
<b>debris</b>	The remains of something that has been destroyed or broken up. <i>A stable arrangement of planets comets and debris orbiting the sun.</i>
<b>detritus</b>	The remains of something that has been destroyed or broken up. <i>The streets were foul with detritus.</i>
<b>dirt</b>	(of roads) not leveled or drained; unsuitable for all year travel. <i>A dirt road.</i>
<b>dregs</b>	The most worthless part or parts of something. <i>Coffee dregs.</i>
<b>dross</b>	The scum formed by oxidation at the surface of molten metals. <i>Alchemists tried to create gold from dross.</i>
<b>foul</b>	Not hit between the foul lines. <i>A foul odour.</i>
<b>junk</b>	Junk bonds. <i>Junk an old car.</i>
<b>mite</b>	A minute arachnid which has four pairs of legs when adult, related to the ticks. Many kinds live in the soil and a number are parasitic on plants or animals.
<b>mop</b>	To wash or wipe with or as if with a mop. <i>Cleaning crews spent much of Wednesday mopping water from classrooms that had flooded.</i>
<b>mote</b>	A tiny piece of a substance; a speck. <i>The tiniest mote of dust.</i>

<b>particle</b>	Any of numerous subatomic constituents of the physical world that interact with each other including electrons neutrinos photons and alpha particles. <i>Tiny <b>particles</b> of dust.</i>
<b>remainder</b>	Sell cheaply as remainders. <i>There was no <b>remainder</b>.</i>
<b>remains</b>	The parts left over after other parts have been removed, used, or destroyed. <i>Roman <b>remains</b>.</i>
<b>residue</b>	Something left after other parts have been taken away. <i>The fine <b>residue</b> left after the sorting of tea.</i>
<b>rubble</b>	Waste or rough fragments of stone, brick, concrete, etc., especially as the debris from the demolition of buildings. <i>Two buildings collapsed trapping scores of people in the <b>rubble</b>.</i>
<b>scabrous</b>	Rough to the touch; covered with scales or scurf. <i>His face was <b>scabrous</b> and lumpy.</i>
<b>spotch</b>	Mark with a blot or smear of something. <i>The white tablecloth was <b>spotched</b> with red wine.</i>
<b>stained</b>	Marked or dyed or discolored with foreign matter. <i>Her ink <b>stained</b> fingers.</i>
<b>sweep</b>	Move with sweeping effortless gliding motions. <i>A World Series <b>sweep</b>.</i>
<b>sweeping</b>	Dirt or refuse collected by sweeping. <i>A smooth <b>sweeping</b> motion.</i>
<b>tatter</b>	A small piece of cloth or paper.
<b>vestigial</b>	(of an organ or part of the body) degenerate, rudimentary, or atrophied, having become functionless in the course of evolution. <i>He felt a <b>vestigial</b> flicker of anger from last night.</i>
<b>wag</b>	(especially with reference to an animal's tail) move or cause to move rapidly to and fro. <i>She <b>wagged</b> a finger at Elinor.</i>
<b>wreckage</b>	The remains of something that has been badly damaged or destroyed. <i>Firemen had to cut him free from the <b>wreckage</b> of the car.</i>
