#### Definitions of "Dust" as a verb

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "dust" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Remove the dust from.
- Cover with a light dusting of a substance.
- Rub the dust over a surface so as to blur the outlines of a shape.
- Beat up or kill someone.
- Distribute loosely.



- Cover lightly with a powdered substance.
- Bring something out for use again after a long period of neglect.
- Sprinkle (a powdered substance) on to something.
- *Remove the dust or dirt from the surface of (something) by wiping or brushing it.*

cover	Provide with a covering or cause to be covered. She is <b>cover</b> ing for our secretary who is ill this week.
disperse	Move away from each other. <i>Disperse</i> particles.
dot	Place a dot over a letter. You can turn a reel into a hornpipe by slowing it down a bit and <b>dot</b> ting the quavers.



<u>dredge</u>	Bring up or clear something from a river harbour or other area of water with a dredge.

тор	To wash or wipe with or as if with a mop. She <b>mop</b> ped the floor and cleaned out two cupboards.
powder	Sprinkle or cover a surface with powder or a powdery substance. Broken glass <b>powder</b> ed the floor.
<u>scatter</u>	Sow by scattering. The children <b>scatter</b> ed in all directions when the teacher approached.
sift	Put (a fine or loose substance) through a sieve so as to remove lumps or large particles. Sift through the job candidates.
<u>spray</u>	Cover by spraying with a liquid. Water <b>spray</b> ed all over the floor.
spread	Spread across or over. He sighed <b>spread</b> ing jam on a croissant.
<u>sprinkle</u>	Distribute or disperse something randomly or irregularly throughout (something. <i>I</i> <b>sprinkle</b> <i>d</i> the floor with water.
strew	Spread by scattering. Dead bodies <b>strew</b> ed the ground.
sweep	Make a big sweeping gesture or movement. <i>Please sweep the floor.</i>
wipe	Pass a swipe card over an electronic reader. <i>The man <b>wipe</b>d his hands on his hips.</i>






### Usage Examples of "Dust" as a verb

rubble	Waste or rough fragments of stone, brick, concrete, etc., especially as the debris from the demolition of buildings. <i>Two buildings collapsed trapping scores of people in the <b>rubble</b>.</i>
scabrous	Rough to the touch; covered with scales or scurf. <i>His face was <b>scabrous</b> and lumpy.</i>
splotch	Mark with a blot or smear of something. The white tablecloth was <b>splotch</b> ed with red wine.
stained	Marked or dyed or discolored with foreign matter. <i>Her ink <b>stained</b> fingers.</i>
sweep	Move with sweeping effortless gliding motions. A World Series <b>sweep</b> .
<u>sweeping</u>	Dirt or refuse collected by sweeping. A smooth <b>sweeping</b> motion.
tatter	A small piece of cloth or paper.
vestigial	(of an organ or part of the body) degenerate, rudimentary, or atrophied, having become functionless in the course of evolution. <i>He felt a vestigial flicker of anger from last night.</i>
wag	(especially with reference to an animal's tail) move or cause to move rapidly to and fro. She <b>wag</b> ged a finger at Elinor.
wreckage	The remains of something that has been badly damaged or destroyed. Firemen had to cut him free from the <b>wreckage</b> of the car.
