abode

A place of residence; a house or home.

*My humble **abode**.*

accommodation

The act of providing something (lodging or seat or food) to meet a need.

*The company offers a number of guest house **accommodations** in Oberammergau.*

billet

A place to stop or stay.

*The sergeant gave them leave to rest while officers went in search of **billets**.*

| dwelling house | Housing that someone is living in. |
| habitation | A house or home. <i>Signs of human habitation.</i> |
| home | The family or social unit occupying a permanent residence. <i>Low cost homes for first time buyers.</i> |
| house | The people living in a house a household. <i>She felt she had to get out of the house.</i> |
| lodging place | Structures collectively in which people are housed. |
| place of habitation | A particular situation. |
| place of residence | A general vicinity. |
| <u>residence</u> | A large and imposing house. <i>He refused to live in the governor's residence.</i> |



Usage Examples of "Dwelling" as a noun

- *He built a modest dwelling near the pond.*
- *The proposed dwelling is out of keeping with those nearby.*



Associations of "Dwelling" (30 Words)

- abidance** The act of abiding (enduring without yielding).
- abode** Any address at which you dwell more than temporarily.
*My humble **abode**.*
- address** Address or apply oneself to something direct one's efforts towards something such as a question.
*The chairman **addressed** the board of trustees.*
- addressee** The person to whom something is addressed.
*The need to state clearly the **addressees** of reports.*

| domicile | The residence where you have your permanent home or principal establishment and to where whenever you are absent you intend to return every person is compelled to have one and only one domicile at a time. <i>The tenant is domiciled in the United Kingdom.</i> |
| dweller | A person or animal that lives in or at a specified place. <i>City dwellers.</i> |
| habitable | Fit for habitation. <i>The house should be habitable by Christmas.</i> |
| habitat | The natural home or environment of an animal, plant, or other organism. <i>Wild chimps in their natural habitat.</i> |
| habitation | The native habitat or home of an animal or plant. <i>He studied the creation and inhabitation and demise of the colony.</i> |
| hall | A large country house, especially one with a landed estate. <i>He dined in hall.</i> |
| home | Provide with or send to a home. <i>His home is New Jersey.</i> |
| homestead | Settle land given by the government and occupy it as a homestead. |
| household | The establishment and affairs of a royal household. <i>It was a good Christian household.</i> |
| hut | Provide with huts. <i>A beach hut.</i> |
| inhabitant | A person or animal that lives in or occupies a place. |
| lodge | Be a lodger stay temporarily. <i>A hunting lodge.</i> |
| manor | (in England and Wales) a unit of land, originally a feudal lordship, consisting of a lord's demesne and lands rented to tenants. <i>They were the undisputed rulers of their manor.</i> |

- mansion** A terrace or mansion block.
*Carlyle **Mansions**.*
- mews** A group of stables, typically with rooms above, built round a yard or along an alley.
*A **mews** house.*
- neighborhood** The approximate amount of something (usually used prepositionally as in ` in the region of.
*He always blames someone else in the immediate **neighborhood**.*
- patio** A paved outdoor area adjoining a house.
*The dining room looks out to a small **patio**.*
- reside** (of a quality) be present or inherent in something.
*The paintings now **reside** on the walls of a restaurant.*
- residence** The official home of a government minister or other public or official figure.
*Rome was his main place of **residence**.*
- resident** A British government agent in any semi-independent state, especially the Governor General's agent at the court of an Indian state.
*The film studio needed a **resident** historian.*
- tenement** (especially in Scotland or the US) a room or a set of rooms forming a separate residence within a house or block of flats.
