- At or near the beginning of a period of time or course of events or before the usual or expected time.






### Synonyms of "Earlier" as an adjective (1 Word)

## **Earlier as an Adverb**

#### Definitions of "Earlier" as an adverb

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "earlier" as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- In good time.
- Before now.
- Before the usual time or the time expected.
- During an early stage.
- Earlier in time; previously.
- Comparatives of `soon' or `early.





## Synonyms of "Earlier" as an adverb (5 Words)

before	During the period of time preceding a particular event or time. <i>He called me the day</i> <b>before</b> <i>but your call had come even earlier.</i>
in the beginning	To or toward the inside of.
in the first place	To or toward the inside of.
<u>originally</u>	In an original manner. The suggestions so <b>originally</b> and persuasively outlined.
sooner	In the near future. I d <b>sooner</b> die than give up.





### Usage Examples of "Earlier" as an adverb

- I mentioned that problem earlier.
- *He called me the day before but your call had come even earlier.*
- Her parents had died four years earlier.
- Came earlier than I expected.

<u>ahead</u>	Ahead of time in anticipation. The horse was three lengths <b>ahead</b> going into the home stretch.	
<u>ancient</u>	A person who lived in ancient times. <i>Ancient Greece.</i>	
antecedence Preceding in time.		
antiquate	Make obsolete or old-fashioned.	
<u>beforehand</u>	Being ahead of time or need. Was <b>beforehand</b> with her report.	
beginning	The background or origins of a person or organization. <i>He left at the <b>beginning</b> of February.</i>	
betimes	In good time. He awoke <b>betimes</b> that morning.	
colonist	A settler in or inhabitant of a colony.	



embryonic	Of an organism prior to birth or hatching. The plan is still in its <b>embryonic</b> stages.
emerging	Becoming apparent or prominent. Established and <b>emerging</b> artists.
first	The first or highest in an ordering or series. <i>The <b>first</b> verse</i> .
germinal	In the earliest stage of development. De Beauvoir s <b>germinal</b> book The Second Sex.
history	A past characterized by a particular thing. <i>History</i> takes the long view.
inchoate	(of an offence, such as incitement or conspiracy) anticipating or preparatory to a further criminal act. <i>A still inchoate democracy.</i>
inchoative	An inchoative verb. <i>Inchoative</i> stages.
initial	Mark with one s initials. The witness was identified simply by an <b>initial</b> letter.
medieval	As if belonging to the Middle Ages; old-fashioned and unenlightened. A <b>medieval</b> attitude toward dating.
neolithic	Latest part of the Stone Age beginning about 10,000 BC in the Middle East (but later elsewhere.
paleolithic	Of or relating to the second period of the Stone Age (following the eolithic. <i>Paleolithic artifacts</i> .
<u>pioneer</u>	Open up a road or terrain as a pioneer. The technique was <b>pioneer</b> ed by a Swiss doctor in the 1930s.
predate	Be earlier in time; go back further. <i>These mammals <b>predate</b> certain eggs.</i>
<u>premature</u>	Uncommonly early or before the expected time. <i>The sun can cause <b>premature</b> ageing.</i>
prematurely	Before the end of the normal period of gestation. I spoke <b>prematurely</b> .
previous	Previous convictions a criminal record. The <b>previous</b> occupant of the White House.
<u>primal</u>	Serving as an essential component. Rivers were the <b>primal</b> highways of life.
primeval	Having existed from the beginning; in an earliest or original stage or state. <i>Mile after mile of <b>primeval</b> forest.</i>



<u>primitive</u>	A painting by a primitive artist or an object in a primitive style. Santa Fe style antiques and Mexican <b>primitive</b> s.
<u>primordial</u>	(of a cell, part, or tissue) in the earliest stage of development. <b>Primordial</b> forms of life.
settler	A negotiator who settles disputes. The early European <b>settler</b> s in America were often fleeing from religious persecution.
untimely	At a time that is unsuitable or premature. <i>Dave s <b>untimely</b> return.</i>
