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## Associations of "Earned" (30 Words)

<b>acquire</b>	Take on a certain form, attribute, or aspect. <i>I <b>acquired</b> a passing knowledge of Chinese.</i>
<b>acquired</b>	Gotten through environmental forces. <i><b>Acquired</b> characteristics such as a suntan or a broken nose cannot be passed on.</i>
<a href="#">allowance</a>	Put on a fixed allowance as of food. <i>He objected to the <b>allowance</b> of smoking in the dining room.</i>
<a href="#">amnesty</a>	A warrant granting release from punishment for an offense. <i>An <b>amnesty</b> for political prisoners.</i>
<b>assets</b>	Anything of material value or usefulness that is owned by a person or company.
<b>college</b>	The teaching staff and students of a college considered collectively. <i><b>Colleges</b> of further education.</i>
<b>degree</b>	Social or official rank. <i>The lowered third <b>degree</b> of the scale.</i>
<b>deserved</b>	Properly deserved. <i>A <b>deserved</b> standing ovation.</i>
<b>diploma</b>	A document certifying the successful completion of a course of study.
<b>dissertation</b>	A long essay on a particular subject, especially one written for a university degree or diploma. <i>A <b>dissertation</b> on the novels of the Bront sisters.</i>
<b>doctoral</b>	Of or relating to a doctor or doctorate. <i>A <b>doctoral</b> thesis.</i>
<b>doctorate</b>	One of the highest earned academic degrees conferred by a university. <i>A <b>doctorate</b> in art history.</i>
<a href="#">earn</a>	Earn on some commercial or business transaction earn as salary or wages. <i>Through the years she has <b>earned</b> affection and esteem.</i>

<b>gain</b>	Increase in value. <i>She <b>gained</b> 20 pounds when she stopped exercising.</i>
<b>income</b>	Money received, especially on a regular basis, for work or through investments. <i>Figures showed an overall increase in <b>income</b> this year.</i>
<b>inheritance</b>	Hereditary succession to a title or an office or property. <i>My only <b>inheritance</b> was my mother's blessing.</i>
<b>legalization</b>	The act of making lawful. <i>Calls for the <b>legalization</b> of cannabis.</i>
<b>merited</b>	Properly deserved. <i>A <b>merited</b> success.</i>
<b>musicology</b>	The study of music as an academic subject, as distinct from training in performance or composition; scholarly research into music.
<b>overpayment</b>	A payment larger than needed or expected. <i>He received 20 000 in benefit <b>overpayments</b>.</i>
<b>phd</b>	A doctorate usually based on at least 3 years graduate study and a dissertation; the highest degree awarded graduate study.
<b>procure</b>	Persuade or cause (someone) to do something. <i>He haunted railway stations to <b>procure</b> young girls for immoral purposes.</i>
<b>property</b>	Shares or investments in property. <i>The president was concerned about the <b>property</b> across from the White House.</i>
<b>recognition</b>	Acknowledgement of the existence, validity, or legality of something. <i>Territorial disputes were resolved in Guatemala's <b>recognition</b> of Belize in 1991.</i>
<b>riches</b>	Valuable or abundant resources. <i><b>Riches</b> beyond their wildest dreams.</i>
<b>scholarship</b>	Academic study or achievement; learning at a high level. <i>He went on a state sponsored <b>scholarship</b> to study engineering.</i>
<b>stipend</b>	A sum of money allotted on a regular basis; usually for some specific purpose.
<b>thesis</b>	An unproved statement put forward as a premise in an argument. <i>A doctoral <b>thesis</b>.</i>
<b>trait</b>	A distinguishing feature of your personal nature. <i>The traditionally British <b>trait</b> of self denigration.</i>
<b>vat</b>	Place or treat in a vat. <i>A <b>vat</b> of hot tar.</i>
