- *Shaking and vibration at the surface of the earth resulting from underground movement along a fault plane or from volcanic activity.*
- *A great upheaval.*
- *A disturbance that is extremely disruptive.*
- *Shaking and vibration at the surface of the earth resulting from underground movement along a fault plane or from volcanic activity.*

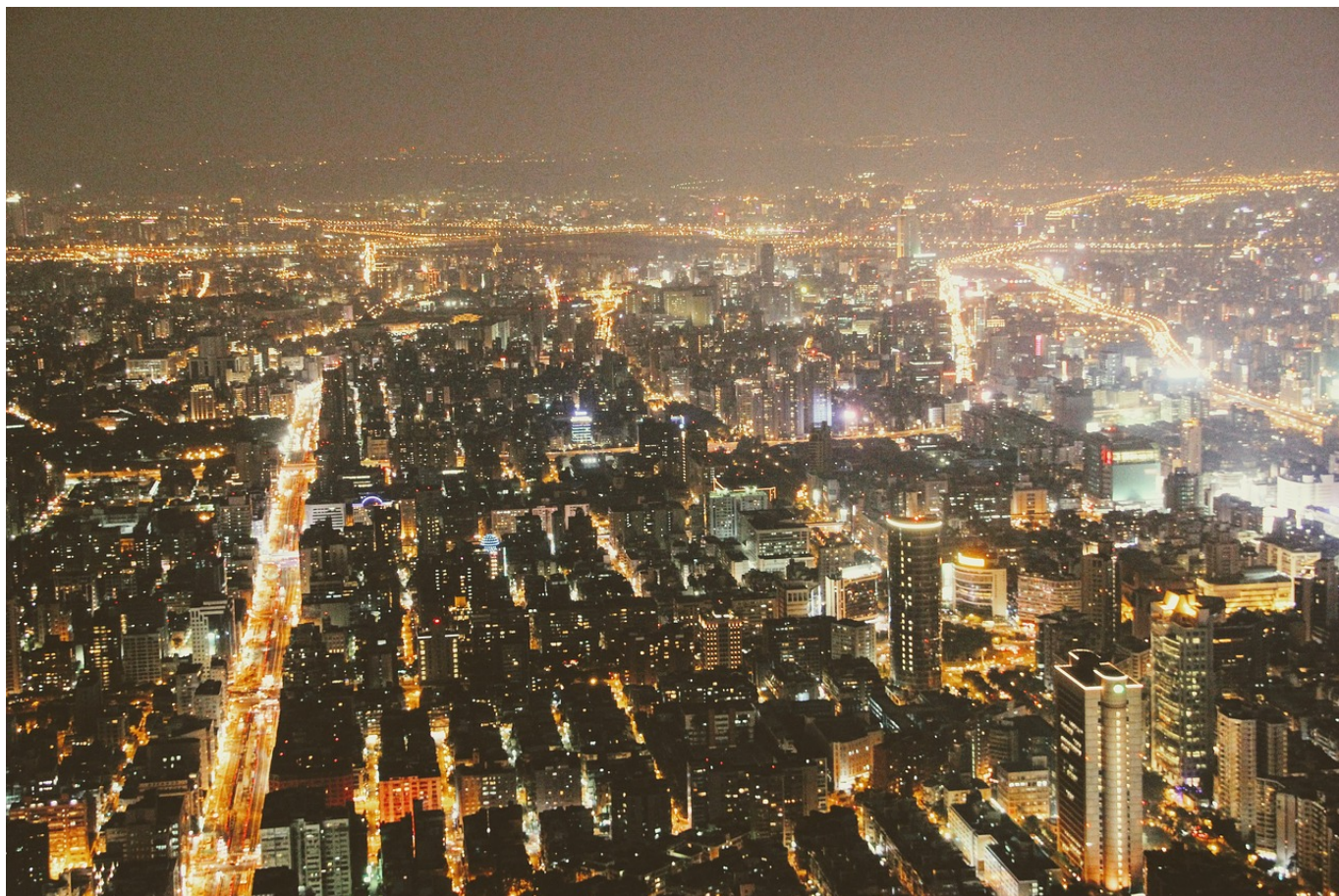


## Synonyms of "Earthquake" as a noun (22 Words)

<b>aftershock</b>	A tremor (or one of a series of tremors) occurring after the main shock of an earthquake.
<b>agitation</b>	A state of agitation or turbulent change or development. <i>Widespread <b>agitation</b> for social reform.</i>
<b>chaos</b>	Complete disorder and confusion. <i>Snow caused <b>chaos</b> in the region.</i>
<b>convulsion</b>	A violent social or political upheaval. <i>The <b>convulsions</b> of 1939 45.</i>
<b>disorder</b>	A state of confusion. <i>Recurrent food crises led to outbreaks of <b>disorder</b>.</i>
<b>disruption</b>	The act of causing disorder. <i>No industry is immune to digital <b>disruption</b>.</i>
<b><u>disturbance</u></b>	Electrical or acoustic activity that can disturb communication. <i>The <b>disturbances</b> were precipitated when four men were refused bail.</i>

<b>earth tremor</b>	The 3rd planet from the sun; the planet we live on.
<b>eruption</b>	A sudden very loud noise. <i>Irritable skin <b>eruptions</b>.</i>
<b>foreshock</b>	A mild tremor preceding the violent shaking movement of an earthquake. <i>A <b>foreshock</b> had been reported before the 1966 earthquake.</i>
<b>furor</b>	A sudden outburst (as of protest). <i>It was little thought that they would excite such a <b>furor</b> among stamp collectors.</i>
<b>quake</b>	An earthquake. <i>A big <b>quake</b> east of the Rocky Mountains.</i>
<b>seism</b>	Shaking and vibration at the surface of the earth resulting from underground movement along a fault plane or from volcanic activity.
<b>shock</b>	An unpleasant or disappointing surprise. <i>The home made lighting gave my father a <b>shock</b> when he touched the aquarium.</i>
<b>temblor</b>	Shaking and vibration at the surface of the earth resulting from underground movement along a fault plane or from volcanic activity.
<b>tremor</b>	A small earthquake. <i>A <b>tremor</b> of unease.</i>
<b>tumult</b>	A loud, confused noise, especially one caused by a large mass of people. <i>A <b>tumult</b> of shouting and screaming broke out.</i>
<b>turbulence</b>	Unstable flow of a liquid or gas. <i>The industrial revolution was a period of great <b>turbulence</b>.</i>
<b>turmoil</b>	A state of great disturbance, confusion, or uncertainty. <i>The country was in <b>turmoil</b>.</i>
<b>unrest</b>	A state of agitation or turbulent change or development. <i>Years of industrial <b>unrest</b>.</i>
<b>upheaval</b>	A rise of land to a higher elevation (as in the process of mountain building). <i>Times of political <b>upheaval</b>.</i>
<b>upset</b>	The act of upsetting something. <i>The biggest <b>upset</b> since David beat Goliath.</i>





## Usage Examples of "Earthquake" as a noun

- *Selling the company caused an earthquake among the employees.*





## Associations of "Earthquake" (30 Words)

### aftermath

New grass growing after mowing or harvest.

*Food prices soared in the **aftermath** of the drought.*

### **aftershock**

A smaller earthquake following the main shock of a large earthquake.

### **avalanche**

Engulf or carry off by an avalanche.

*We have had an **avalanche** of applications for the post.*

### **catastrophe**

A state of extreme (usually irremediable) ruin and misfortune.

*An environmental **catastrophe**.*

### devastating

Physically or spiritually devastating often used in combination.

*A **devastating** portrait of human folly.*

### **disaster**

A person or thing that is a complete failure.

*159 people died in the **disaster**.*

### epicenter

The point on the Earth's surface directly above the focus of an earthquake.

<b><u>flicker</u></b>	(of light or a source of light) shine unsteadily; vary rapidly in brightness. <i>The interior lights <b>flickered</b> and came on.</i>
<b><u>flutter</u></b>	An act of fluttering. <i>A couple of butterflies <b>fluttered</b> around the garden.</i>
<b>geologic</b>	Of or relating to or based on geology. <b>Geologic</b> forces.
<b>landslide</b>	An overwhelming electoral victory. <i>The road was blocked by a <b>landslide</b>.</i>
<b>palpitate</b>	(of the heart) beat rapidly, strongly, or irregularly. <i>His nostrils <b>palpitated</b>.</i>
<b>pulsate</b>	Expand and contract with strong regular movements. <i>Blood vessels throb and <b>pulsate</b>.</i>
<b>quake</b>	An earthquake. <i>A big <b>quake</b> east of the Rocky Mountains.</i>
<b><u>quiver</u></b>	A slight trembling movement or sound, especially one caused by a sudden strong emotion. <i>The tree's branches stopped <b>quivering</b>.</i>
<b>seismic</b>	Subject to or caused by an earthquake or earth vibration. <i>After a few days of <b>seismic</b> activity the volcanic eruption started.</i>
<b>seismograph</b>	An instrument that measures and records details of earthquakes, such as force and duration.
<b>seismology</b>	The branch of geology that studies earthquakes.
<b>shake</b>	A milkshake. <i>Don't miss the homemade cookies and <b>shakes</b>.</i>
<b><u>shaking</u></b>	The act of causing something to move up and down (or back and forth) with quick movements. <i>The <b>shaking</b> of his fingers as he lit his pipe.</i>
<b>shiver</b>	Shake slightly and uncontrollably as a result of being cold, frightened, or excited. <i>She gave a little <b>shiver</b> as the wind flicked at her bare arms.</i>
<b><u>shudder</u></b>	An act of shuddering. <i>I <b>shuddered</b> with horror.</i>
<b><u>tremble</u></b>	A trembling feeling, movement, or sound. <i>There was a slight <b>tremble</b> in his voice.</i>
<b>tremor</b>	Undergo a tremor or tremors. <i>A <b>tremor</b> of unease.</i>

<b>tremulous</b>	Quivering as from weakness or fear. <i>Barbara s voice was <b>tremulous</b>.</i>
<b><u>tsunami</u></b>	A long, high sea wave caused by an earthquake or other disturbance. <i>A colossal <b>tsunami</b> destroyed the Minoan civilization in minutes.</i>
<b><u>vibrate</u></b>	Move continuously and rapidly to and fro. <i>The cabin started to <b>vibrate</b>.</i>
<b><u>vibration</u></b>	(physics) a regular periodic variation in value about a mean. <i>The big capacity engine generated less <b>vibration</b>.</i>
<b>volcanic</b>	Explosively unstable. <i>Thick deposits of black <b>volcanic</b> ash.</i>
<b>wobble</b>	Waver between different courses of action; vacillate. <i>The handlebars developed a <b>wobble</b>.</i>
