### Definitions of "Earthy" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “earthy” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Conspicuously and tastelessly indecent.*
- *(of a person or their language) direct and uninhibited, especially about sexual subjects or bodily functions.*
- *Not far removed from or suggestive of nature.*
- *Hearty and lusty.*
- *Sensible and practical.*
- *Resembling or suggestive of earth or soil.*
- *Of or consisting of or resembling earth.*



## Synonyms of "Earthy" as an adjective (21 Words)

- coarse** Relating to the sport of angling for coarse fish.  
*The wine is harsh tannic and **coarse**.*
- crude** Belonging to an early stage of technical development characterized by simplicity and often crudeness.  
*A relatively **crude** nuclear weapon.*
- filthy** Obscene and offensive.  
***Filthy** language.*
- foul** Of a baseball not hit between the foul lines.  
*It sometimes becomes advantageous to anchor during the periods of **foul** tide.*
- gross** Repellently fat.  
***Gross** negligence.*
- indecent** Offensive to good taste especially in sexual matters.  
*They leaped on the suggestion with **indecent** haste.*

<b>indecorous</b>	Not in keeping with good taste and propriety; improper. <b>Indecorous</b> behavior.
<b>indelicate</b>	Slightly indecent. An <b>indelicate</b> remark.
<b>lewd</b>	Suggestive of or tending to moral looseness. <b>Lewd</b> pictures.
<b>obscene</b>	Designed to incite to indecency or lust-Margaret Mead. <b>Obscene</b> jokes.
<b>off colour</b>	Not in operation or operational.
<b>ribald</b>	Humorously vulgar. He was delighted at the <b>ribald</b> laughter that greeted his witticism.
<b>rough</b>	Violently agitated and turbulent- Ezra Pound. They were <b>rough</b> and determined fighting men.
<b>rude</b>	Belonging to an early stage of technical development characterized by simplicity and often crudeness. A <b>rude</b> coffin.
<b>uncouth</b>	Lacking refinement or cultivation or taste. He is unwashed <b>uncouth</b> and drunk most of the time.
<b>unseemly</b>	(of behaviour or actions) not proper or appropriate. <b>Unseemly</b> to use profanity.

<b>actuality</b>	Existing conditions or facts. <i>The building looked as impressive in <b>actuality</b> as it did in magazines.</i>
<b>billingsgate</b>	Foul-mouthed or obscene abuse.
<b>coarse</b>	Relating to the sport of angling for coarse fish. <i>The wine is harsh tannic and <b>coarse</b>.</i>
<b>commoner</b>	(at some British universities) an undergraduate who does not have a scholarship. <i>This is the story of the <b>commoner</b> who married a king.</i>
<b>deprave</b>	Make (someone) immoral or wicked. <i>This book would <b>deprave</b> and corrupt young children.</i>
<b>filth</b>	Obscene and offensive language or printed material. <i>Stagnant pools of <b>filth</b>.</i>
<b>gaudy</b>	(Britain) a celebratory reunion feast or entertainment held a college. <i>Silver bows and <b>gaudy</b> ribbons.</i>
<b>inappropriate</b>	Not in keeping with what is correct or proper. <i>Put <b>inappropriate</b> pressure on them.</i>
<b>indecent</b>	Not appropriate or fitting. <i>An <b>indecent</b> gesture.</i>
<b>indecorous</b>	Not in keeping with accepted standards of what is right or proper in polite society. <i>A pub crawl with sundry <b>indecorous</b> adventures.</i>
<b>indelicate</b>	Verging on the indecent. <i>An <b>indelicate</b> remark.</i>
<b>irreverent</b>	Showing a lack of respect for people or things that are generally taken seriously. <i>A certain <b>irreverent</b> gaiety and ease of manner.</i>
<b>lewd</b>	Crude and offensive in a sexual way. <i>She began to gyrate to the music and sing a <b>lewd</b> song.</i>
<b>licentious</b>	Promiscuous and unprincipled in sexual matters. <i>Unlike many of the artists who frequented the Soho scene of the 1960s he did not lead a <b>licentious</b> life.</i>
<b>obscene</b>	(of the portrayal or description of sexual matters) offensive or disgusting by accepted standards of morality and decency. <i>The <b>obscene</b> massacre at Wounded Knee.</i>

<b>obscenity</b>	The trait of behaving in an obscene manner. <i>A stream of invective and <b>obscenity</b>.</i>
<b><u>plebeian</u></b>	A member of the lower social classes. <i>He is a man of <b>plebeian</b> tastes.</i>
<b>prurient</b>	Characterized by lust. <i>She d been the subject of much <b>prurient</b> curiosity.</i>
<b><u>raunchy</u></b>	Suggestive of or tending to moral looseness. <i>His <b>raunchy</b> new novel.</i>
<b><u>realistic</u></b>	Aware or expressing awareness of things as they really are. <i>I thought we had a <b>realistic</b> chance of winning.</i>
<b>ribald</b>	A ribald person someone who uses vulgar and offensive language. <i>A <b>ribald</b> comment.</i>
<b>ridiculously</b>	So as to cause surprise or disbelief. <i>It had been <b>ridiculously</b> easy to track him down.</i>
<b>salacious</b>	Characterized by lust. <i><b>Salacious</b> stories.</i>
<b><u>unbecoming</u></b>	(of behaviour) not fitting or appropriate; unseemly. <i>It was <b>unbecoming</b> for a university to do anything so crass as advertising its wares.</i>
<b>uncouth</b>	Lacking good manners, refinement, or grace. <i><b>Uncouth</b> sketches of peasants.</i>
<b>unseemly</b>	Not in keeping with accepted standards of what is right or proper in polite society. <i>An <b>unseemly</b> squabble.</i>
<b>vulgarity</b>	The state or quality of being vulgar. <i>He was seen as the embodiment of the <b>vulgarity</b> of the 1980s.</i>
