
Eases as a Noun

Definitions of "Eases" as a noun

- A freedom from financial difficulty that promotes a comfortable state.
- Freedom from constraint or embarrassment.
- Freedom from activity (work or strain or responsibility.
- Freedom from difficulty or hardship or effort.
- The condition of being comfortable or relieved (especially after being relieved of distress.

COMTOR	A freedom from financial difficulty that promotes a comfortable state. <i>He is a man who enjoys his comfort.</i>
easiness	Freedom from difficulty or hardship or effort. The easiness we feel when sleeping.
informality	Relaxed, friendly, or unofficial style or nature; absence of formality. There is a laid back informality to the food.
relaxation	A method of solving simultaneous equations by guessing a solution and then reducing the errors that result by successive approximations until all the errors are less than some specified amount. <i>Relaxation</i> of censorship rules.
relief	A cause of or occasion for relief. He asked the nurse for relief from the constant pain.
rannea	The absence of mental stress or anxiety. <i>He had lost none of his grace or his repose.</i>
<u>rest</u>	An instance or period of resting. The car accelerates rapidly from rest .
simpleness	Freedom from difficulty or hardship or effort.
simplicity	The quality of being simple or uncompounded. They took advantage of her simplicity .

Synonyms of "Eases" as a verb (6 Words)

allay	Lessen the intensity of or calm. Some stale figs partly allay ed our hunger.
<u>alleviate</u>	Make easier. Measures to alleviate unemployment.
comfort	Lessen pain or discomfort alleviate. <i>He dined outdoors</i> comfort ed by the crackling sounds of the fire.
facilitate	Increase the likelihood of (a response. You could facilitate the process by sharing your knowledge.
relieve	Relieve oneself of troubling information. He was relieve d of his world title.
still	Make or become still quieten. The din in the hall still ed.

- Ease the pain in your legs.
- The news eased my conscience.
- He eased himself into the chair.

enable	Make (a device or system) operational; activate. This skill will enable you to find a job on Wall Street.
enabling	Providing legal power or sanction. <i>Enabling</i> power.
extenuate	Lessen or to try to lessen the seriousness or extent of. <i>The circumstances</i> extenuate <i>the crime</i> .
facilitate	Make (an action or process) easy or easier. Schools were located in the same campus to facilitate the sharing of resources.
<u>handling</u>	Manual (or mechanical) carrying or moving or delivering or working with something. <i>The handling of prisoners.</i>
mitigate	Lessen the gravity of (an offence or mistake. There had been a provocation that mitigate d the offence to a degree.
mollify	Appease the anger or anxiety of (someone. Nature reserves were set up around the power stations to mollify local conservationists.
pacify	Quell the anger, agitation, or excitement of. The U N troops are working to pacify Bosnia.
palliate	Provide physical relief, as from pain. There is no way to excuse or palliate his dirty deed.
<u>permit</u>	A legal document giving official permission to do something. <i>He would not permit anybody access to the library.</i>
<u>placate</u>	Make (someone) less angry or hostile. They attempted to placate the students with promises.
processing	Preparing or putting through a prescribed procedure. The processing of ore to obtain minerals.
propitiate	Make peace with. The pagans thought it was important to propitiate the gods with sacrifices.
<u>quench</u>	An act of quenching a very hot substance. He only pursued her to quench an aching need.



relaxation	The action of making a rule or restriction less strict. <i>Relaxation</i> of censorship rules.
<u>relent</u>	Abandon or mitigate a severe or harsh attitude, especially by finally yielding to a request. She was going to refuse his request but relent ed.
relieve	Relieve oneself of troubling information. <i>He dispatched an expedition to relieve the city.</i>
simplicity	The quality or condition of being plain or uncomplicated in form or design. For the sake of simplicity this chapter will concentrate upon one theory.
<u>simplify</u>	Make simpler or easier or reduce in complexity or extent. <i>This move will simplify our lives.</i>
slacken	Reduce or decrease in speed or intensity. <i>The rope slackened.</i>
soften	Make soft or softer. Rents have soften ed in out of town locations.
thereby	By that means; as a result of that. Students perform in hospitals thereby gaining a deeper awareness of the therapeutic power of music.
