## Easygoing as an Adjective

### Definitions of "Easygoing" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “easygoing” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Not hurried or forced.*
- *Relaxed and informal in attitude or standards.*
- *Not burdensome or demanding; borne or done easily and without hardship.*



## Synonyms of "Easygoing" as an adjective (4 Words)

**cushy** Not burdensome or demanding; borne or done easily and without hardship.  
*What a **cushy** job.*

<b>easy</b>	Less in demand and therefore readily obtainable. <i>Promises of an <b>easy</b> life in the New World.</i>
<b>leisurely</b>	Acting or done at leisure; unhurried or relaxed. <i>At a <b>leisurely</b> or easygoing pace.</i>
<b>soft</b>	Soft and mild not harsh or stern or severe. <i>He must be going <b>soft</b> in the head.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Easygoing" as an adjective

- *An easygoing teacher who allowed extra time for assignments.*
- *At a leisurely (or easygoing) pace.*
- *The easygoing life of a parttime consultant.*

## Associations of "Easygoing" (30 Words)

<b>dilatory</b>	Wasting time. <i>He had been <b>dilatory</b> in appointing a solicitor.</i>
<b>easy</b>	With ease easy is sometimes used informally for easily. <i>Success came too <b>easy</b>.</i>
<b>facile</b>	(especially of success in sport) easily achieved; effortless. <i>A <b>facile</b> hand.</i>
<b>faithless</b>	Disloyal, especially to a spouse or partner. <i>Her <b>faithless</b> lover.</i>
<b>fidget</b>	A person who fidgets. <i>He was <b>fidgeting</b> to get back to his shop.</i>
<b>idle</b>	Cause an engine to idle. <i>We <b>idled</b> the afternoon away.</i>
<b>idleness</b>	Having no employment. <i>He was punished for his <b>idleness</b> at school.</i>
<b>inaction</b>	The state of being inactive. <i>Future generations will condemn us for <b>inaction</b>.</i>
<b>inactive</b>	Not exerting influence or change. <i><b>Inactive</b> Crohn's disease.</i>
<b>inactivity</b>	Being inactive; being less active. <i>People are frustrated with government <b>inactivity</b>.</i>
<b>indolence</b>	Inactivity resulting from a dislike of work. <i>My failure is probably due to my own <b>indolence</b>.</i>

<b><u>indolent</u></b>	Wanting to avoid activity or exertion; lazy. <i>Leprosy is an <b>indolent</b> infectious disease.</i>
<b><u>inert</u></b>	Chemically inactive. <i><b>Inert</b> matter.</i>
<b>languor</b>	Inactivity; showing an unusual lack of energy. <i>Her whole being was pervaded by a dreamy <b>languor</b>.</i>
<b><u>lazy</u></b>	Unwilling to work or use energy. <i>A <b>lazy</b> lowland river.</i>
<b><u>leisurely</u></b>	Acting or done at leisure; unhurried or relaxed. <i>A <b>leisurely</b> breakfast at our hotel.</i>
<b>loosen</b>	Become relaxed or less tight. <i>He <b>loosened</b> his hold so she could pull her arms free.</i>
<b>measured</b>	Carefully thought out in advance. <i>Walking at the same <b>measured</b> pace.</i>
<b>neglectful</b>	Failing in what duty requires. <i><b>Neglectful</b> of his duties.</i>
<b>plod</b>	Walk heavily and firmly, as when weary, or through mud. <i>A bunch of <b>plods</b> arrived offering me a lift to the cop shop.</i>
<b>relaxed</b>	Without strain or anxiety. <i>Gave the impression of being quite <b>relaxed</b>.</i>
<b>shiftless</b>	Lacking or characterized by lack of ambition or initiative; lazy. <i>Studied in a <b>shiftless</b> way.</i>
<b><u>sloppy</u></b>	(of semi-fluid matter) containing too much liquid; watery. <i>A <b>sloppy</b> floor.</i>
<b>slothful</b>	Disinclined to work or exertion. <i>Fatigue made him <b>slothful</b>.</i>
<b>slow</b>	Slow to learn or understand lacking intellectual acuity Thackeray. <i>Business is dull or <b>slow</b>.</i>
<b>sluggish</b>	Moving slowly. <i>The car had been <b>sluggish</b> all morning.</i>
<b>stagnate</b>	Cause to stagnate. <i>Industry will <b>stagnate</b> if we do not stimulate our economy.</i>
<b><u>tardy</u></b>	Delaying or delayed beyond the right or expected time; late. <i>Always <b>tardy</b> in making dental appointments.</i>
<b>unhurried</b>	Moving, acting, or taking place without haste or urgency. <i>The singing is <b>unhurried</b>.</i>
