Definitions of "Easygoing" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “easygoing” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Not hurried or forced.*
- *Relaxed and informal in attitude or standards.*
- *Not burdensome or demanding; borne or done easily and without hardship.*



Synonyms of "Easygoing" as an adjective (4 Words)

cushy Not burdensome or demanding; borne or done easily and without hardship.
*What a **cushy** job.*

easy	Less in demand and therefore readily obtainable. <i>Promises of an easy life in the New World.</i>
leisurely	Acting or done at leisure; unhurried or relaxed. <i>At a leisurely or easygoing pace.</i>
soft	Soft and mild not harsh or stern or severe. <i>He must be going soft in the head.</i>

Usage Examples of "Easygoing" as an adjective

- *An easygoing teacher who allowed extra time for assignments.*
- *At a leisurely (or easygoing) pace.*
- *The easygoing life of a parttime consultant.*

Associations of "Easygoing" (30 Words)

dilatory	Wasting time. <i>He had been dilatory in appointing a solicitor.</i>
easy	With ease easy is sometimes used informally for easily. <i>Success came too easy.</i>
facile	(especially of success in sport) easily achieved; effortless. <i>A facile hand.</i>
faithless	Disloyal, especially to a spouse or partner. <i>Her faithless lover.</i>
fidget	A person who fidgets. <i>He was fidgeting to get back to his shop.</i>
idle	Cause an engine to idle. <i>We idled the afternoon away.</i>
idleness	Having no employment. <i>He was punished for his idleness at school.</i>
inaction	The state of being inactive. <i>Future generations will condemn us for inaction.</i>
inactive	Not exerting influence or change. <i>Inactive Crohn's disease.</i>
inactivity	Being inactive; being less active. <i>People are frustrated with government inactivity.</i>
indolence	Inactivity resulting from a dislike of work. <i>My failure is probably due to my own indolence.</i>

<u>indolent</u>	Wanting to avoid activity or exertion; lazy. <i>Leprosy is an indolent infectious disease.</i>
<u>inert</u>	Chemically inactive. <i>Inert matter.</i>
languor	Inactivity; showing an unusual lack of energy. <i>Her whole being was pervaded by a dreamy languor.</i>
<u>lazy</u>	Unwilling to work or use energy. <i>A lazy lowland river.</i>
<u>leisurely</u>	Acting or done at leisure; unhurried or relaxed. <i>A leisurely breakfast at our hotel.</i>
loosen	Become relaxed or less tight. <i>He loosened his hold so she could pull her arms free.</i>
measured	Carefully thought out in advance. <i>Walking at the same measured pace.</i>
neglectful	Failing in what duty requires. <i>Neglectful of his duties.</i>
plod	Walk heavily and firmly, as when weary, or through mud. <i>A bunch of plods arrived offering me a lift to the cop shop.</i>
relaxed	Without strain or anxiety. <i>Gave the impression of being quite relaxed.</i>
shiftless	Lacking or characterized by lack of ambition or initiative; lazy. <i>Studied in a shiftless way.</i>
<u>sloppy</u>	(of semi-fluid matter) containing too much liquid; watery. <i>A sloppy floor.</i>
slothful	Disinclined to work or exertion. <i>Fatigue made him slothful.</i>
slow	Slow to learn or understand lacking intellectual acuity Thackeray. <i>Business is dull or slow.</i>
sluggish	Moving slowly. <i>The car had been sluggish all morning.</i>
stagnate	Cause to stagnate. <i>Industry will stagnate if we do not stimulate our economy.</i>
<u>tardy</u>	Delaying or delayed beyond the right or expected time; late. <i>Always tardy in making dental appointments.</i>
unhurried	Moving, acting, or taking place without haste or urgency. <i>The singing is unhurried.</i>

wastrel

Someone who dissipates resources self-indulgently.

*I have no intention of seeing my dues gambled away by your **wastrel** of a son.*
