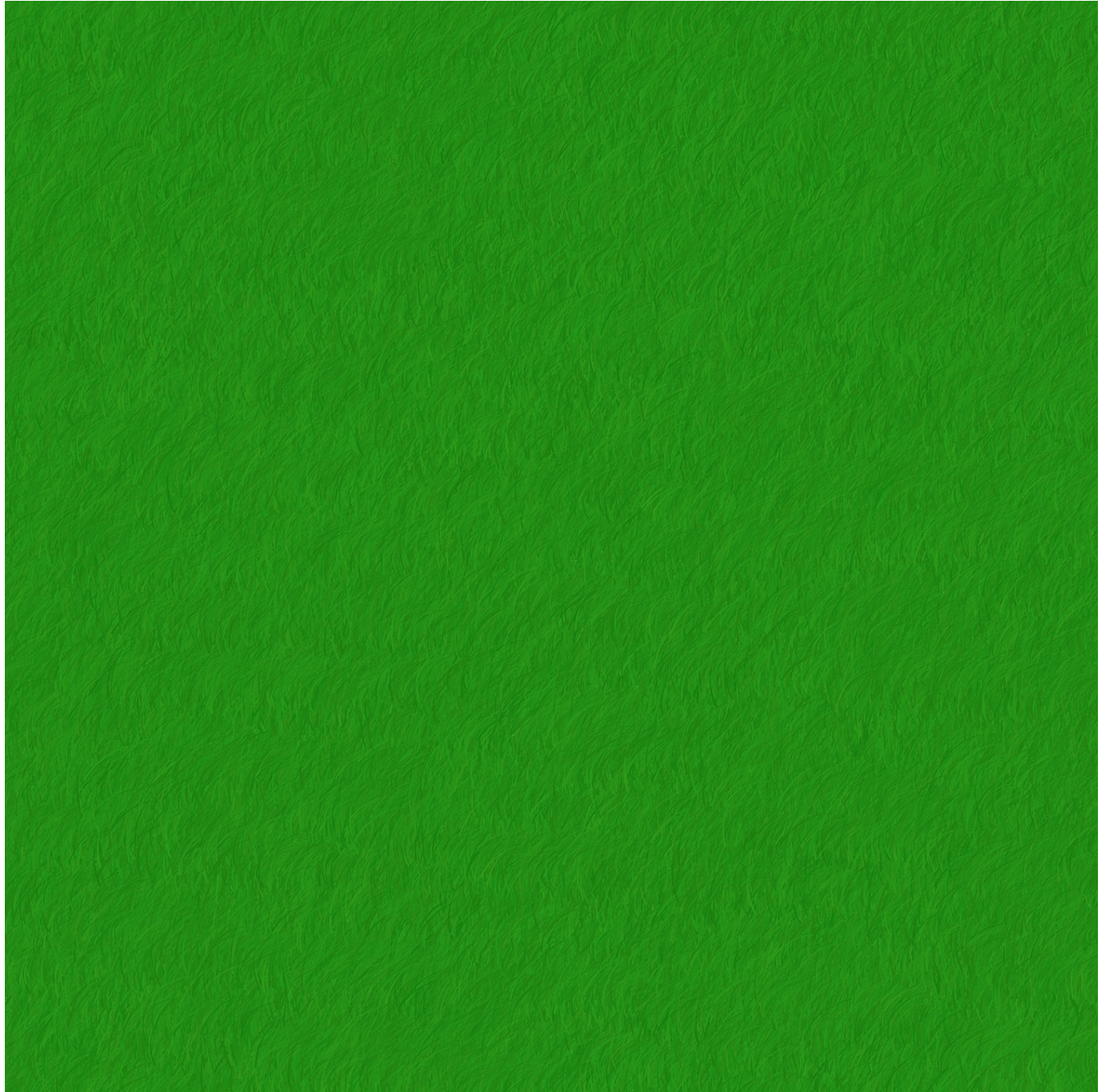
Echo as a Noun

- *(Greek mythology) a nymph who was spurned by Narcissus and pined away until only her voice remained.*
- *The repetition in structure and content of one speaker's utterance by another.*
- *A nymph who was spurned by Narcissus and pined away until only her voice remained.*
- *A reflected television or radio or radar beam.*
- *A close parallel to an idea, feeling, or event.*

- *A characteristic that is suggestive of something else.*
- *A reflected radio or radar beam.*

answer	The principal pleading by the defendant in response to plaintiff's complaint; in criminal law it consists of the defendant's plea of 'guilty' or 'not guilty' (or nolo contendere); in civil law it must contain denials of all allegations. <i>The answers were in the back of the book.</i>
clone	A person who is almost identical to another. <i>Guitarists who are labelled Hendrix clones.</i>
close likeness	The concluding part of any performance.
clue	A word or words giving an indication as to what is to be inserted in a particular space in a crossword. <i>A long pondered clue in a half completed crossword.</i>
copy	Matter to be printed; exclusive of graphical materials. <i>The clone was a copy of its ancestor.</i>
counterpart	One of two copies of a legal document. <i>The minister held talks with his French counterpart.</i>
double	A double measure of spirits. <i>He hit a double to deep centerfield.</i>
duplicate	Something additional of the same kind. <i>Locksmiths can make duplicates of most keys.</i>
evidence	(law) all the means by which any alleged matter of fact whose truth is investigated at judicial trial is established or disproved. <i>The evidence that smoking causes lung cancer is very compelling.</i>
evocation	Stimulation that calls up (draws forth) a particular class of behaviors. <i>The mutual evocation of responses through body language.</i>
facsimile	Duplicator that transmits the copy by wire or radio. <i>Facsimile editions.</i>
fellow	A member of a learned society. <i>One eye was blue but its fellow was brown.</i>
ghost	An apparition of a dead person which is believed to appear or become manifest to the living, typically as a nebulous image. <i>She gave the ghost of a smile.</i>
hint	An indication of potential opportunity. <i>He has given no hint of his views.</i>
imitation	The doctrine that representations of nature or human behavior should be accurate imitations. <i>An imitation sub machine gun.</i>

indication	Something that serves to indicate or suggest. <i>The presence of bacterial infection was an indication for the use of antibiotics.</i>
intimation	A slight suggestion or vague understanding. <i>It took ten years from the intimation of a claim to the assessment of damages.</i>
mark	A figure or letter representing the total number of marks awarded in an examination or competition and signifying a person's score. <i>And the Lord set a mark upon Cain.</i>
match	The score needed to win a match. <i>He always carries matches to light his pipe.</i>
mate	South American tea like drink made from leaves of a South American holly called mate. <i>See you then mate.</i>
memory	The area of cognitive psychology that studies memory processes. <i>A memory and the CPU form the central part of a computer to which peripherals are attached.</i>
mirror image	Polished surface that forms images by reflecting light.
<u>parallel</u>	An imaginary line around the Earth parallel to the equator. <i>She draws a parallel between personal destiny and social forces.</i>
<u>recollection</u>	The ability to recall past occurrences. <i>To the best of my recollection no one ever had a bad word to say about him.</i>
<u>reflection</u>	A thing bringing discredit to someone or something. <i>The pulse is a reflection of the heart's condition.</i>
reiteration	The action of repeating something, typically for emphasis or clarity. <i>A simple reiteration of the plots of classic episodes.</i>
<u>relic</u>	An antiquity that has survived from the distant past. <i>The supermodel has become an embarrassing relic from the early 1990s.</i>
remains	A person's body after death. <i>Roman remains.</i>
remembrance	A thing kept or given as a reminder or in commemoration of someone. <i>I went through the papers and remembrances in his drawers.</i>
reminder	An experience that causes you to remember something. <i>Her mushroom omelette is a blissful reminder of Sunday suppers.</i>
reminiscence	A mental impression retained and recalled from the past. <i>His story made me smile in reminiscence.</i>

<u>remnant</u>	A piece of cloth left when the greater part has been used or sold. <i>The bogs are an endangered remnant of a primeval landscape.</i>
<u>repeat</u>	A decorative pattern which is repeated uniformly over a surface. <i>A repeat offender.</i>
repetition	A thing repeated. <i>The tune is full of melodic repetition and sequence.</i>
<u>replica</u>	A duplicate of an original artistic work. <i>A replica of the Empire State Building.</i>
replication	The repetition of an experiment in order to test the validity of its conclusion. <i>Scientists will not believe an experimental result until they have seen at least one replication.</i>
<u>reproduction</u>	The act of making copies. <i>Gutenberg's reproduction of holy texts was far more efficient.</i>
reverberation	A remote or indirect consequence of some action. <i>The attack has had reverberations around the world.</i>
<u>ringing</u>	The sound of a bell ringing E A Poe. <i>The ringing of the telephone.</i>
sign	A fundamental linguistic unit linking a signifier to that which is signified. <i>She gave him the thumbs up sign.</i>
sound reflection	The subjective sensation of hearing something.
<u>souvenir</u>	A thing that is kept as a reminder of a person, place, or event. <i>The recording provides a souvenir of a great production.</i>
suggestion	An idea or belief accepted by a person as a result of suggestion. <i>At my suggestion the museum held an exhibition of his work.</i>
<u>survival</u>	An object or practice that has continued to exist from an earlier time. <i>He was fighting for his political survival.</i>
<u>token</u>	A badge or favour worn to indicate allegiance to a particular person or party. <i>You should have a token that will stand you in good stead if ever you should fall foul of the prince's officers.</i>
<u>trace</u>	The sum of the elements in the principal diagonal of a square matrix. <i>There wasn't a trace of evidence for the claim.</i>
<u>twin</u>	A twin bedded room. <i>The hotel has 54 rooms of which 4 are twins.</i>
vestige	An indication that something has been present. <i>He waited patiently but without a vestige of sympathy.</i>

- *(of a sound) be repeated or reverberate after the original sound has stopped.*
- *To say again or imitate.*
- *Ring or echo with sound.*
- *(of an object or event) be reminiscent of or have shared characteristics with.*
- *(of a defender) play a higher card followed by a lower one in the same suit, as a signal to request one's partner to lead that suit.*
- *Send a copy of (an input signal or character) back to its source or to a screen for display.*

- *Repeat (someone's words or opinions), typically to express agreement.*
- *(of a place) resound with or reflect back a sound.*

be repeated Be identical or equivalent to.

copy Send a copy of a letter or an email to a third party.
*The command will **copy** a file from one disc to another.*

imitate Copy (a person's speech or mannerisms), especially for comic effect.
*Synthetic fabrics can now **imitate** everything from silk to rubber.*

mimic Imitate (a person or manner), especially for satirical effect.
*The drug ephedrine **mimics** noradrenaline.*

parody Make a parody of.
*His speciality was **parodying** schoolgirl fiction.*

parrot	Repeat mindlessly. <i>Encouraging students to parrot back information.</i>
pulsate	Produce or modulate (as electromagnetic waves) in the form of short bursts or pulses or cause an apparatus to produce pulses. <i>The city pulsated with music and excitement.</i>
recall	Recall knowledge from memory have a recollection. <i>He recalled how he felt at the time.</i>
reflect	Reflect deeply on a subject. <i>Charles reflected that maybe there was hope for the family after all.</i>
reiterate	Say something again or a number of times, typically for emphasis or clarity. <i>He reiterated the points made in his earlier speech.</i>
repeat	Repeat an earlier theme of a composition. <i>The first team in nineteen years to repeat as NBA champions.</i>
resonate	Be received or understood. <i>The crystal resonates at 16 MHz.</i>
resound	(of a place) be filled or echo with a sound or sounds. <i>Another scream resounded through the school.</i>
restate	To say, state, or perform again. <i>He restated his opposition to abortion.</i>
reverberate	Ring or echo with sound. <i>Her deep booming laugh reverberated around the room.</i>
ring	Attach a ring to the foot of in order to identify. <i>The courthouse was ringed with police.</i>
say again	Express in words.
vibrate	Quiver with (a quality or emotion). <i>The bumblebee vibrated its wings for a few seconds.</i>

Associations of "Echo" (30 Words)

- audible** Heard or perceptible by the ear.
*He saw two safeties sneaking up and called an **audible**.*
- auditory** Relating to the sense of hearing.
***Auditory** processing.*
- deaf** Make or render deaf.
***Deaf** to her warnings.*
- ditto** The same thing again used in lists and accounts and often indicated by a ditto mark under the word or figure to be repeated.
*If one folds his arms so does the other if one crosses his legs **ditto**.*
- earshot** The range or distance over which one can hear or be heard.
*The children were told to stay within **earshot**.*
- hearing** The act of hearing attentively.
*I think I had a fair **hearing**.*

iterate	Make repeated use of a mathematical or computational procedure, applying it each time to the result of the previous application; perform iteration. <i>The function iterates.</i>
listening	The act of hearing attentively. <i>You can learn a lot by just listening.</i>
<u>mimic</u>	An animal or plant that mimics another. <i>They were waging mimic war.</i>
noise	Emit a noise. <i>All the noise in his speech concealed the fact that he didn't have anything to say.</i>
pummel	Criticize severely. <i>The pedestrians pummeled the demonstrators.</i>
recapitulate	Repeat (an evolutionary or other process) during development and growth. <i>Let's recapitulate the main ideas.</i>
<u>reflect</u>	Reflect deeply on a subject. <i>Sound is reflected well in this auditorium.</i>
reiterate	To say, state, or perform again. <i>He reiterated the points made in his earlier speech.</i>
<u>repeat</u>	Repeat an earlier theme of a composition. <i>A repeat offender.</i>
repeatedly	Several times. <i>They have been warned repeatedly with no effect.</i>
<u>replicate</u>	(of genetic material or a living organism) reproduce or give rise to a copy of itself. <i>He could never replicate his brilliant performance of the magic trick.</i>
<u>reprise</u>	Repeat an earlier theme of a composition. <i>A stale reprise of past polemic.</i>
resonance	The quality in a sound of being deep, full, and reverberating. <i>The resonance of his voice.</i>
resonate	Be received or understood. <i>The sound resonates well in this theater.</i>
resound	(of a sound, voice, etc.) fill or echo throughout a place. <i>The office resounds with the metronomic clicking of keyboards.</i>
<u>restate</u>	State (something) again or differently, especially more clearly or convincingly. <i>He restated his opposition to abortion.</i>

reverberate	(of a loud noise) be repeated several times as an echo. <i>The hall reverberated with laughter.</i>
reverberation	The repetition of a sound resulting from reflection of the sound waves. <i>Reverberations of the market crash were felt years later.</i>
ring	Ring or echo with sound. <i>I put a numbered ring on each bird s leg.</i>
sonar	An apparatus used in sonar. <i>We reduced the sensitivity of our scanning sonars.</i>
sonic	Relating to audible sound. <i>A sonic wave.</i>
speaking	Capable of or involving speech or speaking. <i>An English speaking guide.</i>
squeaking	Having or making a high-pitched sound such as that made by a mouse or a rusty hinge.
warn	Advise or counsel in terms of someone's behavior. <i>The old man warned the children off his property.</i>
