- *A phase during which the distinctive markings of a bird (especially a male duck) are obscured by moulting of the breeding plumage.*

<b>collapse</b>	A physical or mental breakdown. <i>He suffered a <b>collapse</b> from overwork.</i>
<b>comedown</b>	Decline to a lower status or level. <i>The drug is like speed but without the <b>comedown</b>.</i>
<b>concealing</b>	The activity of keeping something secret.
<b>covering</b>	The act of protecting something by covering it. <i>A vinyl floor <b>covering</b>.</i>

<b>darkening</b>	Changing to a darker color.

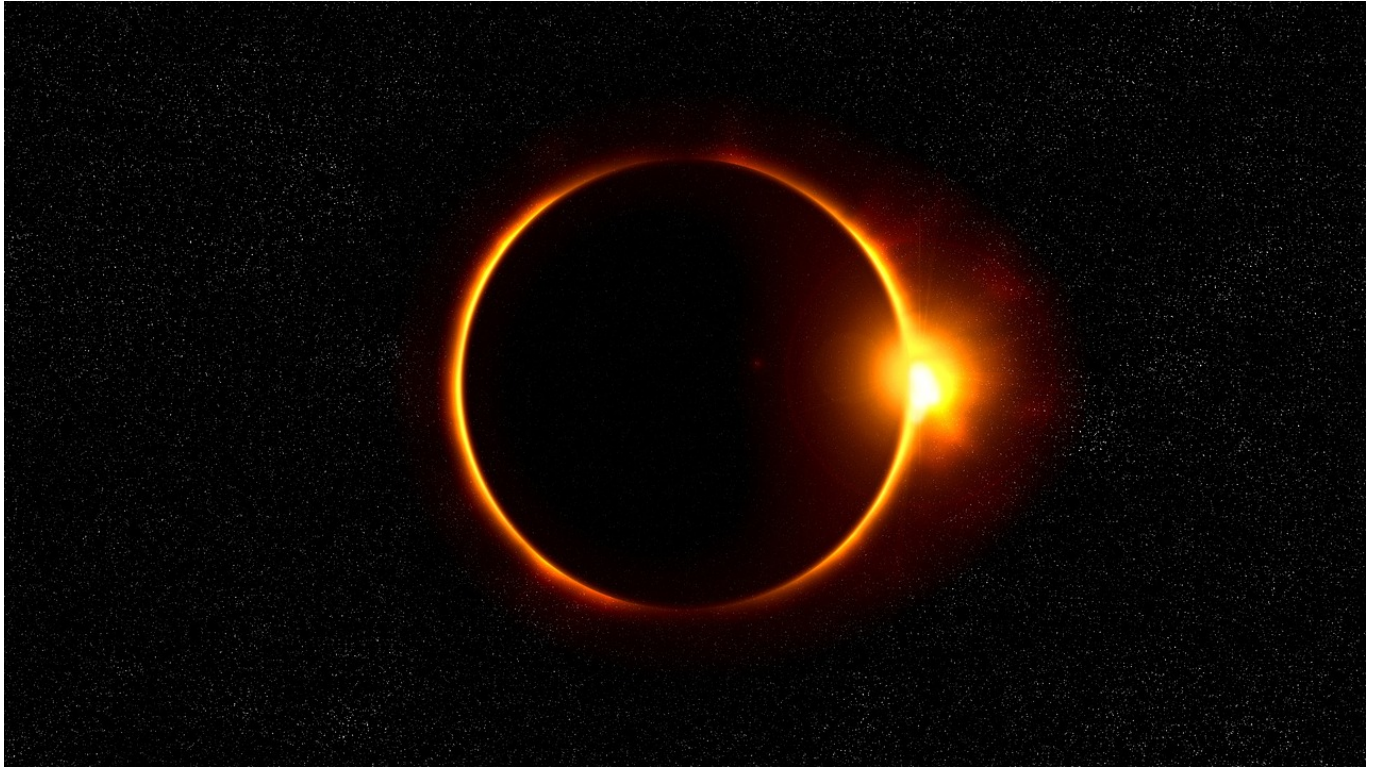
<b>decay</b>	An inferior state resulting from the process of decaying. <i>The required time constant for current <b>decay</b> is 1 ms.</i>
<b>decline</b>	A condition inferior to an earlier condition; a gradual falling off from a better state. <i>A serious <b>decline</b> in bird numbers.</i>
<b>degeneration</b>	Passing from a more complex to a simpler biological form. <i>Overgrazing has caused serious <b>degeneration</b> of grassland.</i>
<b>descent</b>	An act of moving downwards, dropping, or falling. <i>A <b>descent</b> on the Channel ports.</i>
<b>deterioration</b>	Process of changing to an inferior state. <i>A <b>deterioration</b> in the condition of the patient.</i>
<b>dwarfing</b>	A legendary creature resembling a tiny old man; lives in the depths of the earth and guards buried treasure.
<b>ebb</b>	The outward flow of the tide. <i>The <b>ebb</b> tide.</i>
<b>failure</b>	Inability to discharge all your debts as they come due. <i>He resented my <b>failure</b> to return his call.</i>
<b>fall</b>	A controlled act of falling especially as a stunt or in martial arts. <i>When that became known the price of their stock went into free <b>fall</b>.</i>
<b>hiding</b>	A physical beating. <i>He went into <b>hiding</b>.</i>
<b>lapse</b>	An interval or passage of time. <i>Tracing his <b>lapse</b> into petty crime.</i>
<b>occultation</b>	One celestial body obscures another.
<b>regression</b>	A measure of the relation between the mean value of one variable (e.g. output) and corresponding values of other variables (e.g. time and cost). <i>It is easy to blame unrest on economic <b>regression</b>.</i>
<b>shaming</b>	A painful emotion resulting from an awareness of inadequacy or guilt.
<b>shrouding</b>	A line (rope or chain) that regulates the angle at which a sail is set in relation to the wind.
<b>sinking</b>	A slow fall or decline (as for lack of strength). <i>With a <b>sinking</b> heart.</i>
<b>slide</b>	In skateboarding and snowboarding a manoeuvre in which the board slides along an obstacle such as a rail or the edge of a ramp. <i>The violinist was indulgent with his swoops and <b>slides</b>.</i>
<b>tumble</b>	A sudden drop from an upright position. <i>I took a <b>tumble</b> in the nettles.</i>

<b>upstaging</b>	The rear part of the stage.
<b>veiling</b>	A light gauzy fabric used for veils. <i>The <b>veiling</b> that trimmed her hat.</i>
<b>waning</b>	A gradual decrease in magnitude or extent. <i>The waxing and <b>waning</b> of the moon.</i>
<b>weakening</b>	Becoming weaker.
<b>withering</b>	Any weakening or degeneration (especially through lack of use.

<b>cap</b>	Provide a fitting climax or conclusion to. <i>Council budgets will be <b>capped</b>.</i>

<b>exceed</b>	Be greater in scope or size than some standard. <i>She <b>exceeded</b> our expectations.</i>
<b>excel</b>	Perform exceptionally well. <i>She <b>excelled</b> in math.</i>
<b>hide</b>	Prevent (an emotion or fact) from being apparent or known; keep secret. <i><b>Hide</b> the money.</i>
<b>obliterate</b>	Make undecipherable or imperceptible by obscuring or concealing. <i>The special stamp should be placed on the left hand side and not be used to <b>obliterate</b> the postage stamp.</i>
<b>obscure</b>	Make obscure or unclear. <i>The distinction was <b>obscured</b>.</i>
<b>occlude</b>	Cut off from view by interposing something. <i>Planets and stars often are <b>occluded</b> by other celestial bodies.</i>
<b>outclass</b>	Cause to appear in a lower class. <i>The Yankees <b>outclassed</b> Cincinnati.</i>
<b>outdistance</b>	Go far ahead of. <i>He <b>outdistanced</b> the other runners.</i>
<b>outdo</b>	Get the better of. <i>She <b>outdoes</b> all other athletes.</i>
<b>outshine</b>	Shine brighter than. <i>A supernova would <b>outshine</b> all the other stars in its galaxy.</i>
<b>outstrip</b>	Move faster than and overtake (someone else). <i>Supply far <b>outstripped</b> demand.</i>
<b>overshadow</b>	Cast gloom over. <i>His competitive nature often <b>overshadows</b> the other qualities.</i>
<b>put in the shade</b>	Formulate in a particular style or language.

<b>put to shame</b>	Arrange thoughts, ideas, temporal events.
<b>shame</b>	Make someone feel ashamed. <i>Legal action must be taken and companies named and <b>shamed</b>.</i>
<b>shroud</b>	Wrap or dress a body in a shroud for burial. <i>Mountains <b>shrouded</b> by cloud.</i>
<b>surpass</b>	Do or be better than ever before. <i>The organist was <b>surpassing</b> himself.</i>
<b>top</b>	Reach or ascend the top of. <i>He was baffled as to how he could <b>top</b> his past work.</i>
<b>tower above</b>	Appear very large or occupy a commanding position.
<b>tower over</b>	Appear very large or occupy a commanding position.
<b>transcend</b>	Be greater in scope or size than some standard. <i>This was an issue <b>transcending</b> party politics.</i>
<b>trump</b>	In bridge whist and similar card games play a trump on a card of another suit. <i>If he <b>trumped</b> with the 6 or 10 the opponents could overruff.</i>
<b>upstage</b>	Move upstage forcing the other actors to turn away from the audience. <i>They were totally <b>upstaged</b> by their co star in the film.</i>
<b>veil</b>	To obscure or conceal with or as if with a veil. <i>She <b>veiled</b> her face.</i>

<b>lunar</b>	Of, determined by, or resembling the moon. <i>A <b>lunar</b> eclipse.</i>
<b>meteorite</b>	A piece of rock or metal that has fallen to the earth's surface from outer space as a meteor. Over 90 per cent of meteorites are of rock while the remainder consist wholly or partly of iron and nickel.
<b>moon</b>	Any object resembling a moon. <i><b>Moonlight</b> is the smuggler's enemy.</i>
<b>moonbeam</b>	A ray of moonlight.
<b>nebula</b>	A galaxy.
<b>neptune</b>	God of the sea; counterpart of Greek Poseidon.
<b>noon</b>	The middle of the day. <i>The service starts at twelve <b>noon</b>.</i>
<b>outshine</b>	Shine more brightly than. <i>It is a shame when a mother <b>outshines</b> a daughter.</i>
<b>overshadow</b>	Be more impressive or successful than (another person). <i>It is easy to let this feeling of tragedy <b>overshadow</b> his story.</i>
<b>planetary</b>	Of or relating to or resembling the physical or orbital characteristics of a planet or the planets. <i><b>Planetary</b> motion.</i>
<b>pluto</b>	A cartoon character created by Walt Disney.
<b>shine</b>	Make a surface shine. <i><b>Shine</b> the silver please.</i>
<b>sky</b>	Heaven; heavenly power. <i>Hundreds of stars were shining in the <b>sky</b>.</i>
<b>solar</b>	Relating to or derived from the sun or utilizing the energies of the sun. <i><b>Solar</b> radiation.</i>
<b>solstice</b>	The time or date (twice each year) at which the sun reaches its maximum or minimum declination, marked by the longest and shortest days (about 21 June and 22 December).

<b><u>star</u></b>	Used in names of starfishes and similar echinoderms with five or more radiating arms e g cushion star brittlestar. <i>His golf destiny was written in the <b>stars</b>.</i>
<b><u>stellar</u></b>	Relating to a star or stars. <i>A <b>stellar</b> role.</i>
<b><u>sun</u></b>	The light or warmth received from the earth s sun. <i>After going so many <b>suns</b> without food I was sleeping.</i>
<b><u>sunlight</u></b>	The rays of the sun. <i>A shaft of <b>sunlight</b>.</i>
<b><u>sunny</u></b>	(of a person or their temperament) cheery and bright. <i>A <b>sunny</b> smile.</i>
<b><u>tan</u></b>	Get a tan from wind or sun. <i>She looks tall <b>tan</b> and healthy.</i>
