- *An emotional or religious frenzy or trance-like state, originally one involving an experience of mystic self-transcendence.*
- *A state of being carried away by overwhelming emotion.*

<b>adam</b>	In Judeo-Christian mythology; the first man and the husband of Eve and the progenitor of the human race.
<b><a href="#">bliss</a></b>	A state of spiritual blessedness, typically that reached after death. <i>The <b>bliss</b> of heaven.</i>
<b>cloud nine</b>	Out of touch with reality.
<b>crystal</b>	Street names for methylenedioxymethamphetamine.
<b>disco biscuit</b>	Popular dance music (especially in the late 1970s); melodic with a regular bass beat; intended mainly for dancing at discotheques.
<b><a href="#">elation</a></b>	An exhilarating psychological state of pride and optimism; an absence of depression. <i>Richard s <b>elation</b> at regaining his health was short lived.</i>

<b><u>euphoria</u></b>	A feeling of great (usually exaggerated) elation. <i>In his <b>euphoria</b> he had become convinced he could defeat them.</i>
<b>exaltation</b>	The action of praising someone or something highly. <i>What a sound an <b>exaltation</b> of larks must make.</i>
<b>go</b>	Vigorous activity. <i>Come on Tony it s your <b>go</b>.</i>
<b>hug drug</b>	A tight or amorous embrace.
<b>rapture</b>	A feeling of intense pleasure or joy. <i>The tabloids went into <b>raptures</b> about her.</i>
<b>raptus</b>	A seizure a sudden or acute attack especially of mental illness Also with distinguishing scientific Latin word as raptus melancholicus raptus nervorum etc.
<b>rhapsodies</b>	(in ancient Greece) an epic poem adapted for recitation.
<b>seventh heaven</b>	Position seven in a countable series of things.
<b>transport</b>	A convict who was transported to a penal colony. <i>The invasion force sailed from Cadiz in twenty five <b>transports</b>.</i>
<b>transports</b>	A mechanism that transports magnetic tape across the read write heads of a tape playback recorder.
<b>x</b>	Street names for methylenedioxyamphetamine.
<b>xtc</b>	Street names for methylenedioxyamphetamine.

<b>delectation</b>	Pleasure and delight. <i>They had all manner of rock n roll goodies for our <b>delectation</b>.</i>
<b>delight</b>	Take delight in. <i>His <b>delight</b> to see her was obvious to all.</i>
<b>delighted</b>	Filled with wonder and delight. <i>A <b>delighted</b> smile.</i>
<b><u>ecstatic</u></b>	Feeling or expressing overwhelming happiness or joyful excitement. <i><b>Ecstatic</b> fans filled the stadium.</i>
<b>elated</b>	Full of high-spirited delight. <i>Dozens of <b>elated</b> fans welcomed the champions home.</i>
<b>enjoyable</b>	(of an activity or occasion) giving delight or pleasure. <i>The company was <b>enjoyable</b>.</i>
<b><u>enraptured</u></b>	Feeling great rapture or delight.
<b><u>euphoria</u></b>	A feeling of great (usually exaggerated) elation. <i>In his <b>euphoria</b> he had become convinced he could defeat them.</i>
<b>exaltation</b>	The action of praising someone or something highly. <i>The <b>exaltation</b> of the army as a place for brotherhood.</i>
<b>exult</b>	To express great joy. <i><b>Exulting</b> in her escape Lisa closed the door behind her.</i>
<b>exultant</b>	Joyful and proud especially because of triumph or success. <i>He waved to the <b>exultant</b> crowds.</i>
<b><u>glad</u></b>	Feeling pleasure or happiness. <i>Albion s lessening shore could grieve or <b>glad</b> mine eye.</i>
<b>gladden</b>	Make glad. <i>The high childish laugh was a sound that <b>gladdened</b> her heart.</i>
<b>gratify</b>	Indulge or satisfy (a desire). <i>She was gratified to see the shock in Jim's eyes.</i>
<b>happiness</b>	The state of being happy. <i>Tom s heart swelled with <b>happiness</b>.</i>

<b>happy</b>	Satisfied with the quality or standard of. <i>A <b>happy</b> turn of phrase.</i>
<b>hedonic</b>	Relating to, characterized by, or considered in terms of pleasant (or unpleasant) sensations. <i>A <b>hedonic</b> thrill.</i>
<b>joviality</b>	Feeling jolly and jovial and full of good humor.
<b>joy</b>	Feel happiness or joy. <i>A <b>joy</b> to behold.</i>
<b>joyous</b>	Full of happiness and joy. <i>Scenes of <b>joyous</b> celebration.</i>
<b>please</b>	Used in polite or emphatic acceptance of an offer. <i>Instead of attending the meeting it <b>pleased</b> him to go off hunting.</i>
<b>pleased</b>	Feeling pleasurable satisfaction over something by which you measures your self-worth. <i>Both girls were <b>pleased</b> with their new hairstyles.</i>
<b>pleasure</b>	An activity that affords enjoyment. <i>The <b>pleasure</b> of his company.</i>
<b>rapt</b>	Filled with an intense and pleasurable emotion enraptured. <i>He was <b>rapt</b> on high.</i>
<b>rapture</b>	(according to some millenarian teaching) the transporting of believers to heaven at the Second Coming of Christ. <i>People will be <b>raptured</b> out of automobiles as they are driving along.</i>
<b>thrilled</b>	Feeling intense pleasurable excitement.
