elated	Exultantly proud and joyful; in high spirits. <i>Dozens of elated fans welcomed the champions home.</i>
enraptured	Feeling great rapture or delight.
euphoric	Characterized by or feeling intense excitement and happiness. <i>A euphoric sense of freedom.</i>
in raptures	Directed or bound inward.
in transports	Directed or bound inward.
rapt	Filled with an intense and pleasurable emotion enraptured. <i>A rapt teenage audience.</i>
rapturous	Characterized by, feeling, or expressing great pleasure or enthusiasm. <i>He was greeted with rapturous applause.</i>
rhapsodic	Feeling great rapture or delight.

apotheosis	The elevation of a person (as to the status of a god). <i>His appearance as Hamlet was the apotheosis of his career.</i>
beatitude	The blessings listed by Jesus in the Sermon on the Mount (Matt. 5:3-11). <i>The expression of beatitude the religious sometimes adopt.</i>
blessedness	The state of being blessed with divine favour.
blissful	Completely happy and contented. <i>Blissful young lovers.</i>
cheering	Providing freedom from worry. <i>Cheering news.</i>
delight	Take delight in. <i>An experience guaranteed to delight both young and old.</i>
delighted	Filled with wonder and delight. <i>A delighted smile.</i>
ecstasy	A state of being carried away by overwhelming emotion. <i>There was a look of ecstasy on his face.</i>
elated	Full of high-spirited delight. <i>The elated winner.</i>
engrossed	Written formally in a large clear script, as a deed or other legal document. <i>That engrossed look or rapt delight.</i>
enjoyable	Affording satisfaction or pleasure. <i>The company was enjoyable.</i>
enraptured	Feeling great rapture or delight.
euphoria	A feeling of great (usually exaggerated) elation. <i>In his euphoria he had become convinced he could defeat them.</i>
euphoric	Characterized by or feeling intense excitement and happiness. <i>A euphoric sense of freedom.</i>
exaltation	A state of being carried away by overwhelming emotion. <i>She was in a frenzy of exaltation and terror.</i>
exciting	Causing great enthusiasm and eagerness. <i>One of the most exciting matches I ve ever seen.</i>
exultant	Triumphantly happy. <i>He waved to the exultant crowds.</i>
exultation	A feeling of extreme joy. <i>She laughs in exultation.</i>

glad	Any of numerous plants of the genus <i>Gladiolus</i> native chiefly to tropical and South Africa having sword-shaped leaves and one-sided spikes of brightly colored funnel-shaped flowers; widely cultivated. <i>Glad that they succeeded.</i>
happy	Marked by good fortune. <i>He was not happy about the proposals.</i>
joy	Feel happiness or joy. <i>The joy of being alive.</i>
joyful	Feeling, expressing, or causing great pleasure and happiness. <i>A joyful occasion.</i>
joyous	Full of or characterized by joy. <i>Joyous laughter.</i>
jubilant	Feeling or expressing great happiness and triumph. <i>A large number of jubilant fans ran on to the pitch.</i>
merry	Quick and energetic. <i>The streets were dense with merry throngs of students.</i>
pleased	Feeling pleasurable satisfaction over something by which you measures your self-worth. <i>As he led the way he looked very pleased with himself.</i>
rapt	Filled with an intense and pleasurable emotion enraptured. <i>He was rapt on high.</i>
rapture	A state of being carried away by overwhelming emotion- Charles Dickens. <i>Listening to sweet music in a perfect rapture.</i>
rapturous	Characterized by, feeling, or expressing great pleasure or enthusiasm. <i>He was greeted with rapturous applause.</i>
