| <u>academy</u> | A secondary school, in the US typically a private one. <i>A police academy.</i> |
| advisor | An expert who gives advice. <i>The United States sent military advisors to Guatemala.</i> |
| <u>campus</u> | The grounds of a school, hospital, or other institution. <i>For the first year I had a room on campus.</i> |
| curriculum | An integrated course of academic studies. <i>Course components of the school curriculum.</i> |
| <u>disciple</u> | A follower or pupil of a teacher, leader, or philosopher. <i>A disciple of Rousseau.</i> |

| <u>discipline</u> | Training to improve strength or self-control. <i>Parents must discipline their children.</i> |
| <u>educate</u> | Give intellectual, moral, and social instruction to (someone), typically at a school or university. <i>A plan to educate the young on the dangers of drugs.</i> |
| grad | A person who has received a degree from a school (high school or college or university). |
| headmaster | A man who is the head teacher in a school. |
| homeroom | A classroom in which a group of students assembles daily with the same teacher before dispersing to other classes. |
| instructor | A university teacher ranking below assistant professor. <i>A driving instructor.</i> |
| matriculate | A person who has matriculated. <i>They had recently matriculated as undergraduates at Jesus College.</i> |
| mentor | A wise and trusted guide and advisor. <i>He was her friend and mentor until his death.</i> |
| musicologist | An expert in or student of music as an academic subject, as opposed to someone trained in performance or composition. |
| pedagogue | Someone who educates young people. |
| pedagogy | The activities of educating or instructing; activities that impart knowledge or skill. <i>Pedagogy is recognized as an important profession.</i> |
| pupil | A learner who is enrolled in an educational institution. <i>Will you take me on as your pupil.</i> |
| <u>schooling</u> | The process of being formally educated at a school. <i>Schooling fences.</i> |
| schoolmaster | Presiding officer of a school. |
| teach | Work as a teacher. <i>He came one day each week to teach painting.</i> |
| <u>teacher</u> | A personified abstraction that teaches. <i>A history teacher.</i> |
| teaching | A doctrine that is taught. <i>He prepared for teaching while still in college.</i> |
| <u>trainee</u> | Someone who is being trained. <i>Trainee solicitors.</i> |
| <u>tuition</u> | Teaching pupils individually (usually by a tutor hired privately). <i>Tuition and room and board were more than 25 000.</i> |

- tutelage** Instruction; tuition.
*The organizations remained under firm government **tutelage**.*
- tutor** Work as a tutor.
*She agreed to **tutor** a week s art course.*
- tutorship** Teaching pupils individually (usually by a tutor hired privately).
- undergraduate** Denoting or relating to an undergraduate.
*A group of Oxford **undergraduates**.*
- university** The body of faculty and students at a university.
*His daughter is at **university**.*
