- Someone who educates young people.



## Associations of "Educator" (30 Words)

<u>absenteeism</u>	The practice of regularly staying away from work or school without good reason. High levels of <b>absenteeism</b> caused by low job motivation.
<u>academy</u>	A secondary school, in the US typically a private one. A police <b>academy</b> .
advisor	An expert who gives advice. The United States sent military <b>advisor</b> s to Guatemala.
<u>campus</u>	The grounds of a school, hospital, or other institution. For the first year I had a room on <b>campus</b> .
curriculum	An integrated course of academic studies. <i>Course components of the school curriculum</i> .
<u>disciple</u>	A follower or pupil of a teacher, leader, or philosopher. A <b>disciple</b> of Rousseau.



<u>discipline</u>	Training to improve strength or self-control. Parents must <b>discipline</b> their children.
<u>educate</u>	Give intellectual, moral, and social instruction to (someone), typically at a school or university. A plan to <b>educate</b> the young on the dangers of drugs.
grad	A person who has received a degree from a school (high school or college or university.
headmaster	A man who is the head teacher in a school.
homeroom	A classroom in which a group of students assembles daily with the same teacher before dispersing to other classes.
instructor	A university teacher ranking below assistant professor. A driving <b>instructor</b> .
matriculate	A person who has matriculated. They had recently <b>matriculate</b> d as undergraduates at Jesus College.
mentor	A wise and trusted guide and advisor. He was her friend and <b>mentor</b> until his death.
musicologist	An expert in or student of music as an academic subject, as opposed to someone trained in performance or composition.
pedagogue	Someone who educates young people.
pedagogy	The activities of educating or instructing; activities that impart knowledge or skill. <b>Pedagogy</b> is recognized as an important profession.
pupil	A learner who is enrolled in an educational institution. Will you take me on as your <b>pupil</b> .
<u>schooling</u>	The process of being formally educated at a school. <i>Schooling fences.</i>
schoolmaster	Presiding officer of a school.
teach	Work as a teacher. He came one day each week to <b>teach</b> painting.
<u>teacher</u>	A personified abstraction that teaches. A history <b>teacher</b> .
teaching	A doctrine that is taught. He prepared for <b>teaching</b> while still in college.
<u>trainee</u>	Someone who is being trained. <i>Trainee</i> solicitors.
<u>tuition</u>	Teaching pupils individually (usually by a tutor hired privately. <b>Tuition</b> and room and board were more than 25 000.



tutelage	Instruction; tuition. <i>The organizations remained under firm government</i> <b>tutelage</b> .
<u>tutor</u>	Work as a tutor. She agreed to <b>tutor</b> a week s art course.
tutorship	Teaching pupils individually (usually by a tutor hired privately.
undergraduate	Denoting or relating to an undergraduate. A group of Oxford <b>undergraduate</b> s.
