## Associations of "Educator" (30 Words)

<u><a href="#">absenteeism</a></u>	The practice of regularly staying away from work or school without good reason. <i>High levels of <b>absenteeism</b> caused by low job motivation.</i>
<u><a href="#">academy</a></u>	A secondary school, in the US typically a private one. <i>A police <b>academy</b>.</i>
<b>advisor</b>	An expert who gives advice. <i>The United States sent military <b>advisors</b> to Guatemala.</i>
<u><a href="#">campus</a></u>	The grounds of a school, hospital, or other institution. <i>For the first year I had a room on <b>campus</b>.</i>
<b>curriculum</b>	An integrated course of academic studies. <i>Course components of the school <b>curriculum</b>.</i>
<u><a href="#">disciple</a></u>	A follower or pupil of a teacher, leader, or philosopher. <i>A <b>disciple</b> of Rousseau.</i>

<b><u>discipline</u></b>	Training to improve strength or self-control. <i>Parents must <b>discipline</b> their children.</i>
<b><u>educate</u></b>	Give intellectual, moral, and social instruction to (someone), typically at a school or university. <i>A plan to <b>educate</b> the young on the dangers of drugs.</i>
<b>grad</b>	A person who has received a degree from a school (high school or college or university).
<b>headmaster</b>	A man who is the head teacher in a school.
<b>homeroom</b>	A classroom in which a group of students assembles daily with the same teacher before dispersing to other classes.
<b>instructor</b>	A university teacher ranking below assistant professor. <i>A driving <b>instructor</b>.</i>
<b>matriculate</b>	A person who has matriculated. <i>They had recently <b>matriculated</b> as undergraduates at Jesus College.</i>
<b>mentor</b>	A wise and trusted guide and advisor. <i>He was her friend and <b>mentor</b> until his death.</i>
<b>musicologist</b>	An expert in or student of music as an academic subject, as opposed to someone trained in performance or composition.
<b>pedagogue</b>	Someone who educates young people.
<b>pedagogy</b>	The activities of educating or instructing; activities that impart knowledge or skill. <i><b>Pedagogy</b> is recognized as an important profession.</i>
<b>pupil</b>	A learner who is enrolled in an educational institution. <i>Will you take me on as your <b>pupil</b>.</i>
<b><u>schooling</u></b>	The process of being formally educated at a school. <i><b>Schooling</b> fences.</i>
<b>schoolmaster</b>	Presiding officer of a school.
<b>teach</b>	Work as a teacher. <i>He came one day each week to <b>teach</b> painting.</i>
<b><u>teacher</u></b>	A personified abstraction that teaches. <i>A history <b>teacher</b>.</i>
<b>teaching</b>	A doctrine that is taught. <i>He prepared for <b>teaching</b> while still in college.</i>
<b><u>trainee</u></b>	Someone who is being trained. <i><b>Trainee</b> solicitors.</i>
<b><u>tuition</u></b>	Teaching pupils individually (usually by a tutor hired privately). <i><b>Tuition</b> and room and board were more than 25 000.</i>

<b>tutelage</b>	Instruction; tuition. <i>The organizations remained under firm government <b>tutelage</b>.</i>
<b>tutor</b>	Work as a tutor. <i>She agreed to <b>tutor</b> a week s art course.</i>
<b>tutorship</b>	Teaching pupils individually (usually by a tutor hired privately).
<b>undergraduate</b>	Denoting or relating to an undergraduate. <i>A group of Oxford <b>undergraduates</b>.</i>
<b>university</b>	The body of faculty and students at a university. <i>His daughter is at <b>university</b>.</i>
