- caucus** Hold or form a legislative caucus.  
*She is renowned for her ability to unite her **caucus**.*
- communism** A form of socialism that abolishes private ownership.
- confucian** Relating to or characteristic of Confucianism.
- conservative** Relating to the Conservative Party in the UK or a similar party elsewhere.  
*The Massachusetts liberal who **conservatives** love to hate.*
- democracy** A state governed under a system of democracy.  
*The intended extension of industrial **democracy**.*
- democrat** An advocate of democratic principles.  
*As a **democrat** I accepted the outcome of the referendum.*
- democratic** Belong to or relating to the Democratic Party.  
*Cycling is a very **democratic** activity which can be enjoyed by anyone.*
- democratize** Introduce a democratic system or democratic principles to.  
*Public institutions need to be **democratized**.*
- elective** (of a person or office) appointed or filled by election.  
*The National Assembly with 125 **elective** members.*

<b>emulation</b>	Technique of one machine obtaining the same results as another. <i>An additional server is accessed via <b>emulation</b> software.</i>
<b>fascism</b>	A political theory advocating an authoritarian hierarchical government (as opposed to democracy or liberalism). <i>This is yet another example of health <b>fascism</b> in action.</i>
<b>feudalistic</b>	Of or relating to or characteristic of feudalism.
<b>heterodox</b>	Characterized by departure from accepted beliefs or standards. <i><b>Heterodox</b> views.</i>
<b>legislator</b>	Someone who makes or enacts laws. <i>Statutes went unread by the <b>legislators</b> who passed them.</i>
<b><u>liberal</u></b>	(especially of an interpretation of a law) broadly construed or understood; not strictly literal or exact. <i>The strategy was to portray the press as members of a <b>liberal</b> elite.</i>
<b>liberalist</b>	A person who favors a political philosophy of progress and reform and the protection of civil liberties.
<b><u>mainstream</u></b>	Belonging to or characteristic of the mainstream. <i>Vegetarianism has been <b>mainstreamed</b>.</i>
<b>nomination</b>	An address (usually at a political convention) proposing the name of a candidate to run for election. <i>Send your <b>nominations</b> in by 30th November.</i>
<b>political</b>	Done or acting in the interests of status or power within an organization rather than as a matter of principle. <i>Calling a meeting is a <b>political</b> act in itself.</i>
<b><u>president</u></b>	An executive officer of a firm or corporation. <i>The <b>president</b> of the European Union.</i>
<b>presidential</b>	Relating to a president or presidency. <i>The <b>presidential</b> palace.</i>
<b><u>republic</u></b>	A group with a certain equality between its members. <i>The head of state in a <b>republic</b> is usually a president.</i>
<b>social</b>	An informal social gathering especially one organized by the members of a particular club or group. <i>Alcoholism is recognized as a major <b>social</b> problem.</i>
<b>socialism</b>	Policy or practice based on the political and economic theory of socialism.
<b>society</b>	A specified section of society. <i>A <b>society</b> wedding.</i>
<b>totalitarianism</b>	The principle of complete and unrestricted power in government. <i>Democratic countries were fighting against <b>totalitarianism</b>.</i>

<b>values</b>	Beliefs of a person or social group in which they have an emotional investment (either for or against something). <i>He has very conservatives <b>values</b>.</i>
<b>voter</b>	A citizen who has a legal right to vote.
