- An inflated feeling of pride in your superiority to others.
- Your consciousness of your own identity.
- The part of the mind that mediates between the conscious and the unconscious and is responsible for reality testing and a sense of personal identity.
- (in metaphysics) a conscious thinking subject.
- (psychoanalysis) the conscious mind.





## Synonyms of "Ego" as a noun (13 Words)

egotism	An exaggerated opinion of your own importance. In his arrogance and <b>egotism</b> he underestimated Gill.
id	A card or badge used to identify the bearer. The conflict between the drives of the <b>id</b> and the demands of the cultural superego.
<u>psyche</u>	The human soul, mind, or spirit. <i>How does constant losing affect the <b>psyche</b>s of young athletes.</i>
<u>self</u>	Used ironically to refer to oneself or someone else. Language is an aspect of a person s sense of <b>self</b> .
self-confidence	Freedom from doubt; belief in yourself and your abilities.
self-esteem	A feeling of pride in yourself.
self-importance	An exaggerated opinion of your own importance.
self-respect	The quality of being worthy of esteem or respect.




self-worth	The quality of being worthy of esteem or respect.
<u>subconscious</u>	The subconscious part of the mind not in technical use in psychoanalysis where unconscious is preferred. Uncertainties were lurking around the edge of her <b>subconscious</b> .
subconscious mind	Psychic activity just below the level of awareness.
superego	The part of a person's mind that acts as a self-critical conscience, reflecting social standards learned from parents and teachers. <i>True schizophrenias lack the superego elements present in paranoia.</i>
unconscious mind	That part of the mind wherein psychic activity takes place of which the person is unaware.

# Associations of "Ego" (30 Words)

arrogance	The quality of being arrogant. The <b>arrogance</b> of this man is astounding.
<u>centered</u>	Being or placed in the center.
clannish	Befitting or characteristic of those who incline to social exclusiveness and who rebuff the advances of people considered inferior. <i>Clannish loyalty.</i>
conceit	The trait of being unduly vain and conceited false pride. The director s brilliant <b>conceit</b> was to film this tale in black and white.
conceited	Characteristic of false pride; having an exaggerated sense of self- importance. <i>Fred s so <b>conceited</b> he d never believe anyone would refuse him.</i>
covetousness	An envious eagerness to possess something.
<u>egocentric</u>	An egocentric person. <i>Egocentric</i> spatial perception.
egocentrism	Concern for your own interests and welfare.
egoism	(ethics) the theory that the pursuit of your own welfare in the basis of morality.
egoist	A conceited and self-centered person.



egotism	An inflated feeling of pride in your superiority to others. <i>In his arrogance and <b>egotism</b> he underestimated Gill.</i>
egotist	A person who is excessively conceited or absorbed in themselves; a self- seeker. <i>He is a self absorbed <b>egotist</b>.</i>
<u>emptiness</u>	The quality of having no value or purpose; futility. Feelings of <b>emptiness</b> and loneliness.
greed	Excessive desire to acquire or possess more (especially more material wealth) than one needs or deserves. Mercenaries who had allowed <b>greed</b> to overtake their principles.
haughtiness	Overbearing pride evidenced by a superior manner toward inferiors. <i>Her air of haughtiness</i> .
hedonism	The ethical theory that pleasure (in the sense of the satisfaction of desires) is the highest good and proper aim of human life.
<u>hubris</u>	Overbearing pride or presumption. The self assured <b>hubris</b> among economists was shaken in the late 1980s.
independent	An independent political candidate. <i>Treating each factory as an <b>independent</b> unit of production.</i>
individual	Concerning one person exclusively. Boat trips for parties and <b>individual</b> s.
individualism	Self-centred feeling or conduct; egoism. A culture that celebrates <b>individualism</b> and wealth.
individualist	Marked by or expressing individuality. <i>Individualist</i> attitudes.
<u>individualistic</u>	Marked by or expressing individuality; unconventional. <i>Her work is quirky and genuinely</i> <b>individualistic</b> .
<u>modern</u>	Belonging to the modern era since the Middle Ages. <i>Modern German</i> .
narcissism	Excessive interest in or admiration of oneself and one's physical appearance.
<u>pride</u>	Confidence and self-respect as expressed by members of a group, typically one that has been socially marginalized, on the basis of their shared identity, culture, and experience. <i>He prided himself on his honesty.</i>
<u>self</u>	Relating to of or by or to or from or for the self. A button through style with <b>self</b> belt.



selfish	Concerned chiefly or only with yourself and your advantage to the exclusion of others- Maria Weston Chapman. <i>I joined them for <b>selfish</b> reasons.</i>
selfishness	Stinginess resulting from a concern for your own welfare and a disregard of others. <i>An act of pure <b>selfishness</b></i> .
superego	That part of the unconscious mind that acts as a conscience. True schizophrenias lack the <b>superego</b> elements present in paranoia.
<u>vanity</u>	Denoting a person or company publishing works at the author's expense. A <b>vanity</b> press.
