- *Your consciousness of your own identity.*
- *The part of the mind that mediates between the conscious and the unconscious and is responsible for reality testing and a sense of personal identity.*
- *(in metaphysics) a conscious thinking subject.*
- *(psychoanalysis) the conscious mind.*



## Synonyms of "Ego" as a noun (13 Words)

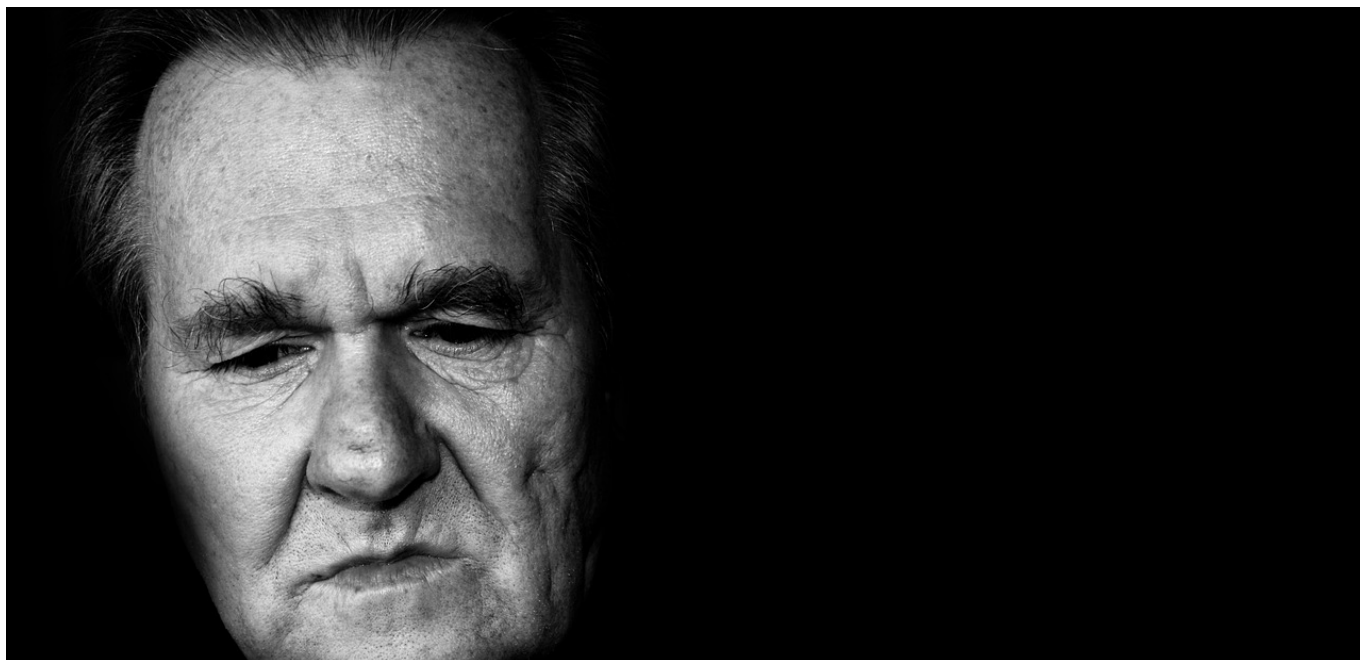
<b>egotism</b>	An exaggerated opinion of your own importance. <i>In his arrogance and <b>egotism</b> he underestimated Gill.</i>
<b>id</b>	A card or badge used to identify the bearer. <i>The conflict between the drives of the <b>id</b> and the demands of the cultural superego.</i>
<a href="#"><u>psyche</u></a>	The human soul, mind, or spirit. <i>How does constant losing affect the <b>psyches</b> of young athletes.</i>
<a href="#"><u>self</u></a>	Used ironically to refer to oneself or someone else. <i>Language is an aspect of a person's sense of <b>self</b>.</i>
<b>self-confidence</b>	Freedom from doubt; belief in yourself and your abilities.
<b>self-esteem</b>	A feeling of pride in yourself.
<b>self-importance</b>	An exaggerated opinion of your own importance.
<b>self-respect</b>	The quality of being worthy of esteem or respect.

<b>self-worth</b>	The quality of being worthy of esteem or respect.
<b><u>subconscious</u></b>	The subconscious part of the mind not in technical use in psychoanalysis where unconscious is preferred. <i>Uncertainties were lurking around the edge of her <b>subconscious</b>.</i>
<b>subconscious mind</b>	Psychic activity just below the level of awareness.
<b>superego</b>	The part of a person's mind that acts as a self-critical conscience, reflecting social standards learned from parents and teachers. <i>True schizophrenias lack the <b>superego</b> elements present in paranoia.</i>
<b>unconscious mind</b>	That part of the mind wherein psychic activity takes place of which the person is unaware.

## Associations of "Ego" (30 Words)

<b>arrogance</b>	The quality of being arrogant. <i>The <b>arrogance</b> of this man is astounding.</i>
<b><u>centered</u></b>	Being or placed in the center.
<b>clannish</b>	Befitting or characteristic of those who incline to social exclusiveness and who rebuff the advances of people considered inferior. <i><b>Clannish</b> loyalty.</i>
<b>conceit</b>	The trait of being unduly vain and conceited false pride. <i>The director s brilliant <b>conceit</b> was to film this tale in black and white.</i>
<b>conceited</b>	Characteristic of false pride; having an exaggerated sense of self-importance. <i>Fred s so <b>conceited</b> he d never believe anyone would refuse him.</i>
<b>covetousness</b>	An envious eagerness to possess something.
<b><u>egocentric</u></b>	An egocentric person. <i><b>Egocentric</b> spatial perception.</i>
<b>egocentrism</b>	Concern for your own interests and welfare.
<b>egoism</b>	(ethics) the theory that the pursuit of your own welfare in the basis of morality.
<b>egoist</b>	A conceited and self-centered person.

<b>egotism</b>	An inflated feeling of pride in your superiority to others. <i>In his arrogance and <b>egotism</b> he underestimated Gill.</i>
<b>egotist</b>	A person who is excessively conceited or absorbed in themselves; a self-seeker. <i>He is a self absorbed <b>egotist</b>.</i>
<u><b>emptiness</b></u>	The quality of having no value or purpose; futility. <i>Feelings of <b>emptiness</b> and loneliness.</i>
<b>greed</b>	Excessive desire to acquire or possess more (especially more material wealth) than one needs or deserves. <i>Mercenaries who had allowed <b>greed</b> to overtake their principles.</i>
<b>haughtiness</b>	Overbearing pride evidenced by a superior manner toward inferiors. <i>Her air of <b>haughtiness</b>.</i>
<b>hedonism</b>	The ethical theory that pleasure (in the sense of the satisfaction of desires) is the highest good and proper aim of human life.
<u><b>hubris</b></u>	Overbearing pride or presumption. <i>The self assured <b>hubris</b> among economists was shaken in the late 1980s.</i>
<b>independent</b>	An independent political candidate. <i>Treating each factory as an <b>independent</b> unit of production.</i>
<b>individual</b>	Concerning one person exclusively. <i>Boat trips for parties and <b>individuals</b>.</i>
<b>individualism</b>	Self-centred feeling or conduct; egoism. <i>A culture that celebrates <b>individualism</b> and wealth.</i>
<b>individualist</b>	Marked by or expressing individuality. <i><b>Individualist</b> attitudes.</i>
<u><b>individualistic</b></u>	Marked by or expressing individuality; unconventional. <i>Her work is quirky and genuinely <b>individualistic</b>.</i>
<u><b>modern</b></u>	Belonging to the modern era since the Middle Ages. <i><b>Modern</b> German.</i>
<b>narcissism</b>	Excessive interest in or admiration of oneself and one's physical appearance.
<u><b>pride</b></u>	Confidence and self-respect as expressed by members of a group, typically one that has been socially marginalized, on the basis of their shared identity, culture, and experience. <i>He <b>prided</b> himself on his honesty.</i>
<u><b>self</b></u>	Relating to of or by or to or from or for the self. <i>A button through style with <b>self</b> belt.</i>



<b>selfish</b>	Concerned chiefly or only with yourself and your advantage to the exclusion of others- Maria Weston Chapman. <i>I joined them for <b>selfish</b> reasons.</i>
<b>selfishness</b>	Stinginess resulting from a concern for your own welfare and a disregard of others. <i>An act of pure <b>selfishness</b>.</i>
<b>superego</b>	That part of the unconscious mind that acts as a conscience. <i>True schizophrenias lack the <b>superego</b> elements present in paranoia.</i>
<u><b>vanity</b></u>	Denoting a person or company publishing works at the author's expense. <i>A <b>vanity</b> press.</i>
