additionally	In addition, by way of addition; furthermore. <i>Additionally 50 hours of practical experience will be necessary.</i>
again	In addition to what has already been mentioned. <i>He rose tidied the bed and sat down again.</i>
also	In addition; too. <i>Also a car is very expensive to run.</i>
ambivalence	Mixed feelings or emotions. <i>Government ambivalence towards the arts.</i>
another	Any of various alternatives; some other. <i>Put it off to another or some other day.</i>
besides	Making an additional point; anyway. <i>I m capable of doing the work and a lot more besides.</i>
bilateral	Having or relating to two sides; affecting both sides. <i>A bilateral agreement between the United States and Japan.</i>
bisexual	Sexually attracted not exclusively to people of one particular gender; attracted to both men and women. <i>In fungi unisexual reproduction has been observed in several species that can also undergo traditional bisexual reproduction.</i>
both	Two considered together; the two. <i>The film has won favour with both young and old.</i>
each	Every one considered individually. <i>Each party is welcome.</i>
equivocally	In an ambiguous manner.
exaggerated	Represented as greater than is true or reasonable. <i>Thick lenses exaggerated the size of her eyes.</i>
exceedingly	To an extreme degree. <i>The team played exceedingly well.</i>

excessively	To a greater degree or in greater amounts than is necessary, normal, or desirable; inordinately. <i>Excessively high taxes.</i>
extremely	To a very great degree; very. <i>Extremely unpleasant.</i>
furthermore	In addition; besides (used to introduce a fresh consideration in an argument). <i>Computer chess games are getting cheaper all the time furthermore their quality is improving.</i>
individual	A single human being as distinct from a group. <i>Please mark the individual pages.</i>
inordinate	Unusually or disproportionately large; excessive. <i>A book of inordinate length.</i>
likewise	In like or similar manner. <i>The programmes of study will apply from five years of age likewise the attainment targets.</i>
more	Moreover. <i>For them enthusiasm is more important than talent.</i>
overdo	Overcook. <i>I d simply overdone it in the gym.</i>
overly	Excessively. <i>She was a jealous and overly possessive woman.</i>
prolix	Tediously prolonged or tending to speak or write at great length. <i>Editing a prolix manuscript.</i>
reconvene	Meet again. <i>Parliament reconvenes on 1st June.</i>
repetition	A piece set by a teacher to be learned by heart and recited. <i>Lie on your back and bench press a light weight very quickly over ten repetitions.</i>
reprise	Repeat an earlier theme of a composition. <i>A stale reprise of past polemic.</i>
similarly	Used to indicate a similarity between two facts or events. <i>He was similarly affected.</i>
simplistic	Characterized by extreme and often misleading simplicity. <i>Simplistic arguments of the ruling party.</i>
too	Moreover (used when adding a further point). <i>Is he coming too.</i>

Lacking justification or authorization.
*Desire for **undue** private profit.*
