<b>additionally</b>	In addition, by way of addition; furthermore. <i><b>Additionally</b> 50 hours of practical experience will be necessary.</i>
<b>again</b>	In addition to what has already been mentioned. <i>He rose tidied the bed and sat down <b>again</b>.</i>
<b>also</b>	In addition; too. <i><b>Also</b> a car is very expensive to run.</i>
<b><a href="#">ambivalence</a></b>	Mixed feelings or emotions. <i>Government <b>ambivalence</b> towards the arts.</i>
<b>another</b>	Any of various alternatives; some other. <i>Put it off to <b>another</b> or some other day.</i>
<b><a href="#">besides</a></b>	Making an additional point; anyway. <i>I m capable of doing the work and a lot more <b>besides</b>.</i>
<b>bilateral</b>	Having or relating to two sides; affecting both sides. <i>A <b>bilateral</b> agreement between the United States and Japan.</i>
<b>bisexual</b>	Sexually attracted not exclusively to people of one particular gender; attracted to both men and women. <i>In fungi unisexual reproduction has been observed in several species that can also undergo traditional <b>bisexual</b> reproduction.</i>
<b>both</b>	Two considered together; the two. <i>The film has won favour with <b>both</b> young and old.</i>
<b>each</b>	Every one considered individually. <i><b>Each</b> party is welcome.</i>
<b>equivocally</b>	In an ambiguous manner.
<b>exaggerated</b>	Represented as greater than is true or reasonable. <i>Thick lenses <b>exaggerated</b> the size of her eyes.</i>
<b><a href="#">exceedingly</a></b>	To an extreme degree. <i>The team played <b>exceedingly</b> well.</i>

<b>excessively</b>	To a greater degree or in greater amounts than is necessary, normal, or desirable; inordinately. <i><b>Excessively</b> high taxes.</i>
<b>extremely</b>	To a very great degree; very. <i><b>Extremely</b> unpleasant.</i>
<b>furthermore</b>	In addition; besides (used to introduce a fresh consideration in an argument). <i>Computer chess games are getting cheaper all the time <b>furthermore</b> their quality is improving.</i>
<b>individual</b>	A single human being as distinct from a group. <i>Please mark the <b>individual</b> pages.</i>
<b>inordinate</b>	Unusually or disproportionately large; excessive. <i>A book of <b>inordinate</b> length.</i>
<b>likewise</b>	In like or similar manner. <i>The programmes of study will apply from five years of age <b>likewise</b> the attainment targets.</i>
<b>more</b>	Moreover. <i>For them enthusiasm is <b>more</b> important than talent.</i>
<b>overdo</b>	Overcook. <i>I d simply <b>overdone</b> it in the gym.</i>
<b>overly</b>	Excessively. <i>She was a jealous and <b>overly</b> possessive woman.</i>
<b>prolix</b>	Tediously prolonged or tending to speak or write at great length. <i>Editing a <b>prolix</b> manuscript.</i>
<b>reconvene</b>	Meet again. <i>Parliament <b>reconvenes</b> on 1st June.</i>
<b>repetition</b>	A piece set by a teacher to be learned by heart and recited. <i>Lie on your back and bench press a light weight very quickly over ten <b>repetitions</b>.</i>
<b>reprise</b>	Repeat an earlier theme of a composition. <i>A stale <b>reprise</b> of past polemic.</i>
<b>similarly</b>	Used to indicate a similarity between two facts or events. <i>He was <b>similarly</b> affected.</i>
<b>simplistic</b>	Characterized by extreme and often misleading simplicity. <i><b>Simplistic</b> arguments of the ruling party.</i>
<b>too</b>	Moreover (used when adding a further point). <i>Is he coming <b>too</b>.</i>
