### **Definitions of "Elation" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “elation” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *Great happiness and exhilaration.*
- *A feeling of joy and pride.*
- *An exhilarating psychological state of pride and optimism; an absence of depression.*



## Synonyms of "Elation" as a noun (8 Words)

- delight** Something or someone that provides a source of happiness.  
*His **delight** to see her was obvious to all.*
- exhilaration** The feeling of lively and cheerful joy.  
*They felt the **exhilaration** of victory.*
- glee** A song for men's voices in three or more parts, usually unaccompanied, of a type popular especially c.1750-1830.  
*His face lit up with impish **glee**.*
- happiness** The state of being happy.  
*She struggled to find **happiness** in her life.*
- high spirits** A public secondary school usually including grades 9 through 12.
- joy** A thing that causes joy.  
*The **joys** of country living.*
- joyousness** The emotion of great happiness.
- lightness** The trait of being lighthearted and frivolous.  
*The **lightness** of my skin.*



## Usage Examples of "Elation" as a noun

- *Richard's elation at regaining his health was short-lived.*



## Associations of "Elation" (30 Words)

<b><u>acclaim</u></b>	Enthusiastic approval. <i>The conference was <b>acclaimed</b> as a considerable success.</i>
<b>acclamation</b>	Loud and enthusiastic approval. <i>The tackle brought the supporters to their feet in <b>acclamation</b>.</i>
<b>admire</b>	Look at with admiration. <i>I <b>admire</b> your courage.</i>
<b>adulatory</b>	Excessively praising or admiring. <i>The tone here is <b>adulatory</b> and uncritical.</i>
<b><u>applaud</u></b>	Show approval or praise by clapping. <i>The crowd whistled and <b>applauded</b>.</i>
<b>applause</b>	Approval or praise expressed by clapping. <i>They gave him a round of <b>applause</b>.</i>
<b>cajolery</b>	Coaxing or flattery intended to persuade someone to do something. <i>She uses <b>cajolery</b> deception and manipulation to get what she wants.</i>
<b><u>cheer</u></b>	Spur on or encourage especially by cheers and shouts. <i>Everybody <b>cheered</b> the birthday boy.</i>
<b>commend</b>	Present as suitable for approval or acceptance recommend. <i>His paintings <b>commend</b> him to the artistic world.</i>
<b><u>commendable</u></b>	In an admirable manner. <i>He showed <b>commendable</b> restraint.</i>
<b>commendation</b>	An official award (as for bravery or service) usually given as formal public statement. <i>The book gives <b>commendations</b> for initiative.</i>
<b>congratulate</b>	Pride or congratulate oneself for an achievement. <i>The operators are to be <b>congratulated</b> for the service that they provide.</i>
<b>congratulation</b>	The action of expressing congratulations. <i><b>Congratulations</b> on a job well done.</i>
<b>creditable</b>	Worthy of often limited commendation. <i>The student s effort on the essay though not outstanding was <b>creditable</b>.</i>
<b>deify</b>	Worship or regard as a god. <i>These young men <b>deify</b> financial success.</i>
<b><u>ebullient</u></b>	Joyously unrestrained. <i>Misted and <b>ebullient</b> seas.</i>

<b>encouragement</b>	The act of trying to stimulate the development of an activity, state, or belief. <i>The <b>encouragement</b> of foreign investment.</i>
<b>enthusiastically</b>	With enthusiasm; in an enthusiastic manner. <i>The audience applauded <b>enthusiastically</b>.</i>
<b>eulogistic</b>	Formally expressing praise.
<b>extol</b>	Praise enthusiastically. <i><b>Extol</b> the virtues of one's children.</i>
<b>exuberant</b>	Joyously unrestrained. <i>A noisy bunch of <b>exuberant</b> youngsters.</i>
<b>flatter</b>	Praise somewhat dishonestly. <i>The final scoreline <b>flattered</b> England.</i>
<b>gutsy</b>	Having or showing courage, determination, and spirit. <i>A <b>gutsy</b> red wine.</i>
<b>joy</b>	Feel happiness or joy. <i>Tears of <b>joy</b>.</i>
<b>kudos</b>	Compliments or congratulations. <i><b>Kudos</b> to everyone who put the event together.</i>
<b>laud</b>	Praise (a person or their achievements) highly. <i>The obituary <b>lauded</b> him as a great statesman and soldier.</i>
<b>laudatory</b>	Full of or giving praise. <i>Enthusiastic and <b>laudatory</b> articles.</i>
<b>panegyric</b>	Formally expressing praise. <i>A <b>panegyric</b> on the pleasures of malt whisky.</i>
<b>praise</b>	Express warm approval or admiration of. <i>The parents <b>praised</b> their children for their academic performance.</i>
<b>tout</b>	One who sells advice about gambling or speculation (especially at the racetrack). <i>She was <b>touted</b> as a potential Prime Minister.</i>
