Definitions of "Elation" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “elation” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *Great happiness and exhilaration.*
- *A feeling of joy and pride.*
- *An exhilarating psychological state of pride and optimism; an absence of depression.*



Synonyms of "Elation" as a noun (8 Words)

- delight** Something or someone that provides a source of happiness.
*His **delight** to see her was obvious to all.*
- exhilaration** The feeling of lively and cheerful joy.
*They felt the **exhilaration** of victory.*
- glee** A song for men's voices in three or more parts, usually unaccompanied, of a type popular especially c.1750-1830.
*His face lit up with impish **glee**.*
- happiness** The state of being happy.
*She struggled to find **happiness** in her life.*
- high spirits** A public secondary school usually including grades 9 through 12.
- joy** A thing that causes joy.
*The **joys** of country living.*
- joyousness** The emotion of great happiness.
- lightness** The trait of being lighthearted and frivolous.
*The **lightness** of my skin.*

Associations of "Elation" (30 Words)

<u>acclaim</u>	Enthusiastic approval. <i>The conference was acclaimed as a considerable success.</i>
acclamation	Loud and enthusiastic approval. <i>The tackle brought the supporters to their feet in acclamation.</i>
admire	Look at with admiration. <i>I admire your courage.</i>
adulatory	Excessively praising or admiring. <i>The tone here is adulatory and uncritical.</i>
<u>applaud</u>	Show approval or praise by clapping. <i>The crowd whistled and applauded.</i>
applause	Approval or praise expressed by clapping. <i>They gave him a round of applause.</i>
cajolery	Coaxing or flattery intended to persuade someone to do something. <i>She uses cajolery deception and manipulation to get what she wants.</i>
<u>cheer</u>	Spur on or encourage especially by cheers and shouts. <i>Everybody cheered the birthday boy.</i>
commend	Present as suitable for approval or acceptance recommend. <i>His paintings commend him to the artistic world.</i>
<u>commendable</u>	In an admirable manner. <i>He showed commendable restraint.</i>
commendation	An official award (as for bravery or service) usually given as formal public statement. <i>The book gives commendations for initiative.</i>
congratulate	Pride or congratulate oneself for an achievement. <i>The operators are to be congratulated for the service that they provide.</i>
congratulation	The action of expressing congratulations. <i>Congratulations on a job well done.</i>
creditable	Worthy of often limited commendation. <i>The student s effort on the essay though not outstanding was creditable.</i>
deify	Worship or regard as a god. <i>These young men deify financial success.</i>
<u>ebullient</u>	Joyously unrestrained. <i>Misted and ebullient seas.</i>

encouragement	The act of trying to stimulate the development of an activity, state, or belief. <i>The encouragement of foreign investment.</i>
enthusiastically	With enthusiasm; in an enthusiastic manner. <i>The audience applauded enthusiastically.</i>
eulogistic	Formally expressing praise.
extol	Praise enthusiastically. <i>Extol the virtues of one's children.</i>
exuberant	Joyously unrestrained. <i>A noisy bunch of exuberant youngsters.</i>
flatter	Praise somewhat dishonestly. <i>The final scoreline flattered England.</i>
gutsy	Having or showing courage, determination, and spirit. <i>A gutsy red wine.</i>
joy	Feel happiness or joy. <i>Tears of joy.</i>
kudos	Compliments or congratulations. <i>Kudos to everyone who put the event together.</i>
laud	Praise (a person or their achievements) highly. <i>The obituary lauded him as a great statesman and soldier.</i>
laudatory	Full of or giving praise. <i>Enthusiastic and laudatory articles.</i>
panegyric	Formally expressing praise. <i>A panegyric on the pleasures of malt whisky.</i>
praise	Express warm approval or admiration of. <i>The parents praised their children for their academic performance.</i>
tout	One who sells advice about gambling or speculation (especially at the racetrack). <i>She was touted as a potential Prime Minister.</i>
