Elect as a Verb

Definitions of "Elect" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "elect" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Select by a vote for an office or membership.*
- *Choose.*
- *(of God) choose (someone) in preference to others for salvation.*
- *Choose (someone) to hold public office or some other position by voting.*
- *Opt for or choose to do something.*

Synonyms of "Elect" as a verb (6 Words)

cast one's vote for Throw forcefully.

choose Pick out select or choose from a number of alternatives.
*I always **choose** the fish over the meat courses in this restaurant.*

choose by ballot See fit or proper to act in a certain way; decide to act in a certain way.

vote	Express one's choice or preference by vote. <i>None of the Democrats voted last night.</i>
vote for	Bring into existence or make available by vote.
vote in	Bring into existence or make available by vote.

Usage Examples of "Elect" as a verb

- *We elected him chairman of the board.*
- *More people elected to work at home.*
- *I elected to have my funds deposited automatically.*
- *He was elected as councillor.*
- *They elected him leader.*
- *The members who were elected to the committee.*

Elect as an Adjective

Definitions of "Elect" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "elect" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Chosen for a position but not yet in office.*
- *Selected as the best.*
- *Chosen by God for salvation.*
- *Elected but not yet installed in office.*
- *(of a person) chosen or singled out.*

Synonyms of "Elect" as an adjective (9 Words)

appointed	Fixed or established especially by order or command. <i>She arrived at the appointed time.</i>
chosen	Having been selected as the best or most appropriate. <i>He is by no means a forerunner in his chosen field.</i>
coming	Likely to be important or successful in the future. <i>Work is due to start in the coming year.</i>
designate	Appointed but not yet installed in office. <i>The Director designate.</i>
elected	Subject to popular election.

elite	Selected as the best. <i>Elite colleges.</i>
future	Effective in or looking toward the future. <i>Some future historian will evaluate him.</i>
next	Elected but not yet serving. <i>Next in line.</i>
presumptive	Of the nature of a presumption; presumed in the absence of further information. <i>A strong presumptive case is made out.</i>

- *The elect group of saints which was predestined for heaven.*
- *The president elect.*
- *An elect circle of artists.*

Associations of "Elect" (30 Words)

abstain	Formally decline to vote either for or against a proposal or motion. <i>Forty one voted with the Opposition and some sixty more abstained.</i>
abstention	The trait of abstaining (especially from alcohol). <i>A resolution passed by 126 votes to none with six abstentions.</i>
ballot	The total number of votes cast in a ballot. <i>A strike ballot.</i>
candidate	A person who applies for a job or is nominated for election. <i>The Green Party candidate.</i>
choose	Pick out select or choose from a number of alternatives. <i>I ll stay as long as I choose.</i>
chosen	The name for Korea as a Japanese province (1910-1945). <i>She was Mama s chosen.</i>
cloture	A rule for limiting or ending debate in a deliberative body. <i>Over 70 of the senators voted for cloture.</i>
constituency	A group of voters in a specified area who elect a representative to a legislative body. <i>A parliamentary candidate in the Hampstead and Highgate constituency.</i>
democracy	A state governed under a system of democracy. <i>Demands for greater democracy.</i>

democratic	Representing or appealing to or adapted for the benefit of the people at large. <i>Democratic government.</i>
election	The action of electing or the fact of being elected. <i>She agreed to stand for election.</i>
elective	A course that the student can select from among alternatives. <i>Elective official.</i>
elector	In the US a member of the electoral college. <i>Close to 60 per cent of the 60 000 registered electors voted.</i>
electorate	All the people in a country or area who are entitled to vote in an election. <i>75 per cent of the electorate voted for a Scottish parliament in some form.</i>
enfranchise	Grant voting rights. <i>A proposal that foreigners should be enfranchised for local elections.</i>
hustings	The activities involved in political campaigning (especially speech making). <i>I was out on the hustings talking to people.</i>
incoming	(of a communication) being received rather than sent. <i>Incoming class.</i>
parliament	A legislative assembly in certain countries. <i>The Russian parliament.</i>
pick	Hit lightly with a picking motion. <i>Maybe I picked the wrong career after all.</i>
plebiscite	A law enacted by the plebeians' assembly. <i>The administration will hold a plebiscite for the approval of constitutional reforms.</i>
poll	Convert into a pollard. <i>The network manager can also use the software to poll each Mac on the net.</i>
president	The celebrant at a Eucharist. <i>The president of the European Union.</i>
presidential	Relating to a president or presidency. <i>The French presidential election.</i>
reelect	Elect again.
referendum	A legislative act is referred for final approval to a popular vote by the electorate.
select	Selected or chosen for special qualifications. <i>You can select from a range of quality products.</i>
selected	Chosen in preference to another.

suffrage A legal right guaranteed by the 15th amendment to the US Constitution; guaranteed to women by the 19th amendment.
*The **suffrages** of the community.*

vote Express one's preference for a candidate or for a measure or resolution cast a vote.
*She **voted** for going to the Chinese restaurant.*

voter A citizen who has a legal right to vote.
