### Definitions of "Elevate" as a verb

- *Raise from a lower to a higher position.*
- *(of a priest) hold up (a consecrated host or chalice) for adoration.*
- *Give a promotion to or assign to a higher position.*

<b>bear aloft</b>	Move while holding up or supporting.
<b>bring up</b>	Go or come after and bring or take back.
<b>buoy up</b>	Mark with a buoy.
<b>get up</b>	Perceive by hearing.
<b>give a higher rank</b>	Move in order to make room for someone for something.
<b>give advancement</b>	Deliver in exchange or recompense.
<b>give promotion</b>	Bring about.

<b>lift up</b>	Raise in rank or condition.
<b>move up</b>	Be in a state of action.
<b><u>prefer</u></b>	Give preference to one creditor over another. <i>Some people <b>prefer</b> camping to staying in hotels.</i>
<b>promote</b>	Of an additive act as a promoter of a catalyst. <i>I got <b>promoted</b> after many years of hard work.</i>
<b>raise</b>	Multiply a number by itself a specified number of times 8 is 2 raised to the power 3. <i>She <b>raised</b> both arms above her head.</i>
<b>raise aloft</b>	Pronounce (vowels) by bringing the tongue closer to the roof of the mouth.
<b>raise up</b>	Give a promotion to or assign to a higher position.
<b><u>upgrade</u></b>	Give better travel conditions to. <i>The airline <b>upgraded</b> me when I arrived late and Coach Class was full.</i>
<b>upraise</b>	Raise (something) to a higher level. <i>He <b>upraised</b> his head with an energetic motion.</i>

<b><u>elevation</u></b>	Angular distance above the horizon (especially of a celestial object). <i>As every gunner knows increasing the <b>elevation</b> beyond five degrees can be a risky business.</i>

<b>encouragement</b>	The act of trying to stimulate the development of an activity, state, or belief. <i>Incentives and <b>encouragement</b> to play sports.</i>
<b>ennoble</b>	Lend greater dignity or nobility of character to. <i>The theatre is a moral instrument to <b>ennoble</b> the mind.</i>
<b>enrich</b>	Increase the proportion of a particular isotope in (an element), especially that of the isotope U-235 in uranium so as to make it suitable for use in a nuclear reactor or weapon. <i>The experience <b>enriched</b> her understanding.</i>
<b>escalator</b>	A clause in a contract that provides for an increase or a decrease in wages or prices or benefits etc. depending on certain conditions (as a change in the cost of living index).
<b>exalt</b>	Fill with sublime emotion. <i><b>Exalted</b> the humble shoemaker to the rank of King s adviser.</i>
<b>hike</b>	Walk for a long distance, especially across country. <i>Fears of a <b>hike</b> in interest rates.</i>
<b>hoist</b>	A group of flags raised as a signal. <i><b>Hoist</b> the flags.</i>
<b>honor</b>	Bestow honor or rewards upon. <i><b>Honor</b> your parents.</i>
<b>increase</b>	The amount by which something increases. <i>The <b>increase</b> in unemployment.</i>

<b>rise</b>	Rise up. <i>Christ is <b>risen</b>.</i>
<b><u>soar</u></b>	Rise rapidly. <i>The stock market <b>soared</b> after the cease fire was announced.</i>
<b>superlative</b>	A superlative adjective or adverb. <i>The critics ran out of <b>superlatives</b> to describe him.</i>
<b><u>underpin</u></b>	Support with evidence or authority or make more certain or confirm. <i>The theme of honour <b>underpinning</b> the two books.</i>
<b><u>up</u></b>	Lift something up. <i>Its an <b>up</b> market.</i>
<b><u>upgrade</u></b>	Get better travel conditions. <i>I <b>upgraded</b> to First Class when Coach Class was overbooked.</i>
<b><u>uplift</u></b>	A rise of land to a higher elevation (as in the process of mountain building). <i>Mona says the orchestra has <b>uplifted</b> her quality of life.</i>
