| escalation | A rapid increase; a rise. <i>Higher wages caused an escalation of prices.</i> |
| <u>facade</u> | A showy misrepresentation intended to conceal something unpleasant. <i>Her flawless public facade masked private despair.</i> |
| face | The part of an animal corresponding to the human face. <i>He lost face.</i> |
| growth | The process of developing physically, mentally, or spiritually. <i>A day's growth of unshaven stubble on his chin.</i> |

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| height | (of a standing person) the distance from head to foot. <i>He was of medium height.</i> |
| hill | Structure consisting of an artificial heap or bank usually of earth or stones. <i>They were climbing a steep hill in low gear.</i> |
| increase | The amount by which something increases. <i>He gave me an increase in salary.</i> |
| lift | Lifting device consisting of a platform or cage that is raised and lowered mechanically in a vertical shaft in order to move people from one floor to another in a building. <i>Alice went up to the second floor in the lift.</i> |
| meridian | A circle of constant longitude passing through a given place on the earth's surface and the terrestrial poles. <i>At the end of February Jupiter transits the meridian due south at 6 15 a m.</i> |
| mound | A slight elevation from which the pitcher delivers the ball. <i>The bushes were little more than vague mounds beneath the snow.</i> |
| mount | A mounting consisting of a piece of metal as in a ring or other jewelry that holds a gem in place. <i>The jockey's injuries forced him to give up the coveted mount on Cool Ground.</i> |
| mountain | A large pile or quantity of something. <i>They sought refuge in the mountains.</i> |
| move up | The act of changing your residence or place of business. |
| natural elevation | Someone regarded as certain to succeed. |
| peak | The top or extreme point of something (usually a mountain or hill). <i>Voltage peak.</i> |
| pinnacle | The most successful point; the culmination. <i>He had reached the pinnacle of his career.</i> |
| preferment | Promotion or appointment to a position or office. <i>After ordination preferment was fast.</i> |
| promotion | Encouragement of the progress or growth or acceptance of something. <i>A sales promotion company.</i> |
| raising | The event of something being raised upward. <i>A raising of the land resulting from volcanic activity.</i> |

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| rise | The property possessed by a slope or surface that rises. <i>The rise and fall of his voice.</i> |
| <u>side</u> | A surface forming part of the outside of an object. <i>A minibus was parked at the side of the road.</i> |
| step up | A sequence of foot movements that make up a particular dance. |
| <u>summit</u> | The highest attainable level of achievement. <i>The region is a few molecules wide at the summit.</i> |
| superlative | A superlative adjective or adverb. <i>So many highest superlatives achieved by man.</i> |
| tiptop | The extreme top or summit. |
| top | Covering for a hole especially a hole in the top of a container. <i>Her talent will take her right to the top.</i> |
| upgrading | The property possessed by a slope or surface that rises. |
| <u>upsurge</u> | A sudden forceful flow. <i>An upsurge in vandalism and violent crime.</i> |
| upswing | An increase in strength or quantity; an upward trend. <i>An upswing in economic activity.</i> |
