abolitionism	The doctrine that calls for the abolition of slavery.
discharge	Go off or discharge. <i>First time bankrupts are discharged automatically after three years.</i>
<u>disengage</u>	Release from something that holds fast, connects, or entangles. <i>Disengage the gears.</i>
<u>dislodge</u>	Remove or force from a position of dwelling previously occupied. <i>The dentist dislodged the piece of food that had been stuck under my gums.</i>
emancipation	The freeing of someone from slavery. <i>The early struggle for emancipation from slavery.</i>
escape	Be incomprehensible to escape understanding by. <i>He drove along the dual carriageway to escape police.</i>
exude	(of a person) display (an emotion or quality) strongly and openly. <i>The building exudes an air of tranquillity.</i>
free	Free from obligations or duties. <i>After the Civil War he was a free man.</i>
illimitable	Without limits or an end. <i>The illimitable human capacity for evil.</i>
leeway	The sideways drift of a ship to leeward of the desired course. <i>The government had greater leeway to introduce reforms.</i>
liberally	In a way that favours individual liberty and moderate political and social reform. <i>Steaks liberally sprinkled with salt and pepper.</i>
<u>liberate</u>	Grant freedom to; free from confinement. <i>She is liberated from the constraints of an unhappy marriage.</i>
<u>liberation</u>	The termination of someone's employment (leaving them free to depart). <i>The liberation of all political prisoners.</i>
<u>loosely</u>	In a way that is not rigidly organized. <i>Discussions were loosely structured to enhance informality.</i>
looseness	Freedom from restraint. <i>Misunderstandings can often be traced to a looseness of expression.</i>
manumission	Release from slavery. <i>A leading advocate of manumission.</i>
manumit	Free from slavery or servitude. <i>Old Angus had never manumitted a single slave.</i>

release	A handle or catch that releases part of a mechanism. <i>The movie will be on release from Christmas.</i>
renewable	(of a contract, agreement, etc.) capable of being renewed. <i>We are on renewable annual contracts.</i>
runaway	Denoting something happening or done very quickly, easily, or uncontrollably. <i>Runaway inflation.</i>
separatist	Relating to separatists or separatism. <i>A separatist rebellion.</i>
underling	A person lower in status or rank. <i>She was shouting orders at underlings between gulps of coffee.</i>
unencumbered	Not burdened with cares or responsibilities. <i>Living an unencumbered life.</i>
unfettered	Not bound by shackles and chains. <i>Unfettered artistic genius.</i>
<u>unofficial</u>	Denoting strike action not called or endorsed by the union to which the strikers belong. <i>Unofficial reports said that dozens of people were injured.</i>
untie	Undo the ties of. <i>Untie the knot.</i>
<u>waiver</u>	A document recording the waiving of a right or claim. <i>They give consent to waiver of their subrogation rights.</i>
