| <b>illimitable</b>       | Without limits or an end.<br><i>The <b>illimitable</b> human capacity for evil.</i>  |
| <b>leeway</b>            | The sideways drift of a ship to leeward of the desired course.<br><i>The government had greater <b>leeway</b> to introduce reforms.</i>                      |
| <b>liberally</b>         | In a way that favours individual liberty and moderate political and social reform.<br><i>Steaks <b>liberally</b> sprinkled with salt and pepper.</i>         |
| <b><u>liberate</u></b>   | Grant freedom to; free from confinement.<br><i>She is <b>liberated</b> from the constraints of an unhappy marriage.</i>                                      |
| <b><u>liberation</u></b> | The termination of someone's employment (leaving them free to depart).<br><i>The <b>liberation</b> of all political prisoners.</i>                           |

| <b>runaway</b>           | Denoting something happening or done very quickly, easily, or uncontrollably.<br><i><b>Runaway</b> inflation.</i>   |
