abolitionism	The doctrine that calls for the abolition of slavery.
discharge	Go off or discharge. First time bankrupts are discharge d automatically after three years.
<u>disengage</u>	Release from something that holds fast, connects, or entangles. <i>Disengage</i> the gears.
<u>dislodge</u>	Remove or force from a position of dwelling previously occupied. The dentist dislodge d the piece of food that had been stuck under my gums.
emancipation	The freeing of someone from slavery. The early struggle for emancipation from slavery.
escape	Be incomprehensible to escape understanding by. <i>He drove along the dual carriageway to escape police.</i>
exude	(of a person) display (an emotion or quality) strongly and openly. The building exude s an air of tranquillity.
free	Free from obligations or duties. After the Civil War he was a free man.
illimitable	Without limits or an end. The illimitable human capacity for evil.
leeway	The sideways drift of a ship to leeward of the desired course. The government had greater leeway to introduce reforms.
liberally	In a way that favours individual liberty and moderate political and social reform. Steaks liberally sprinkled with salt and pepper.
<u>liberate</u>	Grant freedom to; free from confinement. She is liberate d from the constraints of an unhappy marriage.
<u>liberation</u>	The termination of someone's employment (leaving them free to depart. <i>The liberation of all political prisoners.</i>
<u>loosely</u>	In a way that is not rigidly organized. Discussions were loosely structured to enhance informality.
looseness	Freedom from restraint. Misunderstandings can often be traced to a looseness of expression.
manumission	Release from slavery. A leading advocate of manumission .
manumit	Free from slavery or servitude. Old Angus had never manumit ted a single slave.



A handle or catch that releases part of a mechanism. The movie will be on release from Christmas.
(of a contract, agreement, etc.) capable of being renewed. We are on renewable annual contracts.
Denoting something happening or done very quickly, easily, or uncontrollably. <i>Runaway</i> inflation.
Relating to separatists or separatism. A separatist rebellion.
A person lower in status or rank. She was shouting orders at underling s between gulps of coffee.
Not burdened with cares or responsibilities. Living an unencumbered life.
Not bound by shackles and chains. <i>Unfettered</i> artistic genius.
Denoting strike action not called or endorsed by the union to which the strikers belong. Unofficial reports said that dozens of people were injured.
Undo the ties of. Untie the knot.
A document recording the waiving of a right or claim. They give consent to waiver of their subrogation rights.
