Embarrassed as an Adjective

Definitions of "Embarrassed" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “embarrassed” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Feeling or caused to feel uneasy and self-conscious.*
- *Feeling or showing embarrassment.*
- *Having or showing financial difficulties.*
- *Made to feel uncomfortable because of shame or wounded pride.*
- *Feeling or caused to feel ill at ease or self-conscious or ashamed.*



Synonyms of "Embarrassed" as an adjective (13 Words)

<u>abashed</u>	Feeling or caused to feel ill at ease or self-conscious or ashamed. <i>Felt abashed at the extravagant praise.</i>
awkward	Difficult to handle or manage especially because of shape. <i>You have put me in a very awkward position.</i>
<u>blushing</u>	Red in the face from shyness, embarrassment, or shame. <i>The blushing boy was brought before the Principal.</i>
chagrined	Feeling or caused to feel ill at ease or self-conscious or ashamed. <i>Chagrined at the poor sales of his book.</i>
<u>humiliated</u>	Made to feel uncomfortable because of shame or wounded pride. <i>Humiliated that his wife had to go out to work.</i>
mortified	Made to feel uncomfortable because of shame or wounded pride. <i>Felt mortified by the comparison with her sister.</i>
red-faced	Reddened or suffused with or as if with blood from emotion or exertion.

self-conscious	Excessively and uncomfortably conscious of your appearance or behavior.
sheepish	Showing or feeling embarrassment from shame or a lack of self-confidence. A sheepish grin.
shy	Less than; short of. A shy smile.
uncomfortable	Conducive to or feeling mental discomfort. An uncomfortable silence.
uneasy	(of a situation or relationship) not settled; liable to change. An uneasy silence.
unsettled	Still in doubt. An unsettled issue.



Usage Examples of "Embarrassed" as an adjective

- *Was embarrassed by her child's tantrums.*
- *I felt quite embarrassed whenever I talked to her.*

- *Too embarrassed to say hello to his drunken father on the street.*
- *He had to sort out the embarrassed financial affairs of his brother.*
- *An embarrassed silence.*



Associations of "Embarrassed" (30 Words)

<u>abashed</u>	Embarrassed, disconcerted, or ashamed. <i>Harriet looked slightly abashed.</i>
<u>afraid</u>	Feeling worry or concern or insecurity. <i>Afraid of snakes.</i>
<u>alarmed</u>	Experiencing a sudden sense of danger.
annoyed	Slightly angry; irritated. <i>I got very annoyed watching the film.</i>
anxious	Causing or fraught with or showing anxiety. <i>The company was anxious to avoid any trouble.</i>

apprehensive	Relating to perception or understanding. <i>Apprehensive about her job.</i>
ashamed	Reluctant to do something through fear of embarrassment or humiliation. <i>I am not ashamed to be seen with them.</i>
bemused	Deeply absorbed in thought. <i>Her bemused expression.</i>
bewildered	Perplexed and confused; very puzzled. <i>Bewildered and confused.</i>
blush	Sudden reddening of the face (as from embarrassment or guilt or shame or modesty). <i>The girl blushed when a young man whistled as she walked by.</i>
bother	(of a circumstance or event) worry, disturb, or upset (someone). <i>The driver didn't bother to ask why.</i>
concerned	Worried, troubled, or anxious. <i>The villagers are concerned about burglaries.</i>
confused	Having lost your bearings confused as to time or place or personal identity. <i>A confused expression crossed her face.</i>
disgraced	Having fallen from favour or a position of power or honour; discredited. <i>The disgraced city financier.</i>
distress	Bring into difficulties or distress especially financial hardship. <i>A company in financial distress.</i>
fluster	Be flustered behave in a confused manner. <i>The false start flustered me a bit.</i>
fret	Provide a musical instrument with frets. <i>Fret a guitar.</i>
harried	Troubled persistently especially with petty annoyances. <i>A harried expression.</i>
insecurity	Uncertainty or anxiety about oneself; lack of confidence. <i>The insecurity of wireless networks.</i>
irritated	Aroused to impatience or anger. <i>Made an irritated gesture.</i>
jitter	Of a signal or device suffer from jitter. <i>An anxious student who jittered at any provocation.</i>
neurotically	In a neurotic manner.
offend	Break a commonly accepted rule or principle. <i>Her tactless remark offended me.</i>

- perplexed** Completely baffled; very puzzled.

- perplexing** Completely baffling; very puzzling.
A perplexing problem.
- skittish** (of an animal, especially a horse) nervous or excitable; easily scared.
A skittish chestnut mare.
- steamed** (of food) cooked by steaming.
I was steamed.
- troubled** Showing distress or anxiety.
His troubled face.
- uneasy** Causing or feeling anxiety; troubled or uncomfortable.
An uneasy silence.
- worried** Mentally upset over possible misfortune or danger etc.
There was a worried frown on his face.
