## Embodies as a Verb

### Definitions of "Embodies" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “embodies” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Represent or express something abstract in tangible form.*
- *Represent, as of a character on stage.*
- *Represent in bodily form.*

### Synonyms of "Embodies" as a verb (5 Words)

<b>be</b>	Be priced at. <i>He s a tough customer let him <b>be</b>.</i>
<b>body forth</b>	Invest with or as with a body; give body to.
<b>incarnate</b>	Embody or represent (a deity or spirit) in human form. <i>A desire to make things which will <b>incarnate</b> their personality.</i>
<b>personify</b>	Represent or embody (a quality, concept, etc.) in a physical form. <i>Public pageants and dramas in which virtues and vices were personified.</i>
<b><a href="#">substantiate</a></b>	Solidify, firm, or strengthen. <i>The painting <b>substantiates</b> the feelings of the artist.</i>

## Associations of "Embodies" (30 Words)

<b>ampersand</b>	The sign & (standing for and, as in Smith & Co., or the Latin et, as in &c.).
<b><u>asterisk</u></b>	Mark a word or piece of text with an asterisk. <i>He had <b>asterisked</b> the things about the case that still bothered him.</i>
<b><u>bookmark</u></b>	A record of the address of a website, file, or other data made to enable quick access in future. <i>Fans will want to <b>bookmark</b> this site.</i>
<b>caret</b>	A mark used by an author or editor to indicate where something is to be inserted into a text.
<b>comma</b>	A widespread butterfly that has orange and brown wings with ragged edges and a white comma shaped mark on the underside of the hindwing.
<b><u>connotation</u></b>	An idea or feeling which a word invokes for a person in addition to its literal or primary meaning. <i>The work functions both by analogy and by <b>connotation</b>.</i>
<b>cue</b>	Give a cue to or for. <i>My teacher joked about such attitudes and I followed her <b>cue</b>.</i>
<b>denotation</b>	The act of indicating or pointing out by name. <i>Beyond their immediate <b>denotation</b> the words have a connotative power.</i>
<b>diacritical</b>	Capable of distinguishing.
<b><u>emblem</u></b>	A thing serving as a symbol of a particular quality or concept. <i>America's national <b>emblem</b> the bald eagle.</i>
<b>embodiment</b>	A concrete representation of an otherwise nebulous concept. <i>The <b>embodiment</b> of hope.</i>
<b><u>exclamation</u></b>	An abrupt excited utterance. <i>She gave an <b>exclamation</b> of delight.</i>
<b><u>exemplify</u></b>	Be a typical example of. <i>He exemplified his point with an anecdote.</i>
<b>incarnate</b>	(especially of a deity or spirit) embodied in human form. <i>A desire to make things which will <b>incarnate</b> their personality.</i>
<b><u>index</u></b>	Adjust through indexation. <i>Exam results may serve as an <b>index</b> of the teacher's effectiveness.</i>
<b>indicant</b>	Something that serves to indicate or suggest. <i>Symptoms are the prime <b>indicants</b> of disease.</i>
<b>indication</b>	A symptom that suggests certain medical treatment is necessary. <i>There were <b>indications</b> that it was time to leave.</i>

<b><u>manifestation</u></b>	An event, action, or object that clearly shows or embodies something abstract or theoretical. <i>The butterfly was one of the many <b>manifestations</b> of the Goddess.</i>
<b>mark</b>	A figure or letter representing the total number of marks awarded in an examination or competition and signifying a person's score. <i>Few bullets could have missed their <b>mark</b>.</i>
<b>mascot</b>	A person or thing that is supposed to bring good luck, especially one linked to a particular organization or event. <i>The team's dolphin <b>mascot</b>.</i>
<b>punctuate</b>	Insert punctuation marks into. <i>Her sharp questions <b>punctuated</b> the speaker's drone.</i>
<b>punctuation</b>	The marks, such as full stop, comma, and brackets, used in writing to separate sentences and their elements and to clarify meaning. <i>You will notice that no <b>punctuation</b> is used.</i>
<b>represent</b>	Be a delegate or spokesperson for represent somebody's interest or be a proxy or substitute for as of politicians and office holders representing their constituents or of a tenant representing other tenants in a housing dispute. <i>The flower <b>represents</b> a young girl.</i>
<b>sign</b>	Communicate silently and non verbally by signals or signs. <i>Things haven't changed since I <b>signed</b> in the summer.</i>
<b><u>signify</u></b>	Convey or express a meaning. <i>What does his strange behavior <b>signify</b>.</i>
<b><u>symbol</u></b>	Symbolize. <i>The chemical <b>symbol</b> for helium is He.</i>
<b><u>symbolic</u></b>	Serving as a symbol. <i>Klimt's <b>symbolic</b> painting of 1900 7.</i>
<b>symptom</b>	(medicine) any sensation or change in bodily function that is experienced by a patient and is associated with a particular disease. <i>Dental problems may be a <b>symptom</b> of other illness.</i>
<b><u>tag</u></b>	Attach a tag or label to. <i>Pieces of DNA <b>tagged</b> with radioactive particles.</i>
<b>zodiac</b>	A representation of the signs of the zodiac or of a similar astrological system.
