According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "embody" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Form (people) into a body, especially for military purposes.
- Include or contain (something) as a constituent part.
- Represent or express something abstract in tangible form.
- *Provide (a spirit) with a physical form.*
- Represent, as of a character on stage.
- Be an expression of or give a tangible or visible form to (an idea, quality, or feeling.
- Represent in bodily form.

give human shape to	• Move in order to make room for someone for something.
incarnate	Put (a concept or quality) into concrete form. The idea that God incarnate s himself in man.
include	Allow participation in or the right to be part of; permit to exercise the rights, functions, and responsibilities of. Other changes include d the abolition of the death penalty.
incorporate	Unite or merge with something already in existence. She incorporate d his suggestions into her proposal.
integrate	Become one become integrated. <i>She was anxious to integrate well into her husband s family.</i>
<u>manifest</u>	Record in a ship s manifest. Lizzy manifest ed signs of severe depression.



personify	Attribute human qualities to something. <i>Public pageants and dramas in which virtues and vices were personified</i> .
realize	Give actual or physical form to. She realize d a profit of 100 000.
represent	Be a delegate or spokesperson for represent somebody s interest or be a proxy or substitute for as of politicians and office holders representing their constituents or of a tenant representing other tenants in a housing dispute. She became the first woman to represent a South Wales mining valley.
stand for	Be in effect; be or remain in force.
<u>substantiate</u>	Represent in bodily form. The president s trip will substantiate good relations with the former enemy country.
symbolize	Represent by means of symbols. These painters believed that artists should symbolize .
take in	Take into consideration for exemplifying purposes.
typify	Represent; symbolize. Tough, low-lying vegetation typifies this arctic area.

ampersand	A punctuation mark (&) used to represent conjunction (and.
<u>asterisk</u>	Mark a word or piece of text with an asterisk. He had asterisk ed the things about the case that still bothered him.
<u>bookmark</u>	A strip of leather, card, or other material, used to mark one's place in a book. Fans will want to bookmark this site.
caret	A mark (,]) placed below the line to indicate a proposed insertion in a text.



comma	Anglewing butterfly with a comma shaped mark on the underside of each hind wing.
<u>connotation</u>	What you must know in order to determine the reference of an expression. <i>The word discipline has unhappy</i> connotation <i>s of punishment and repression.</i>
cue	Sports implement consisting of a tapering rod used to strike a cue ball in pool or billiards. <i>Ros and Guil cued by Hamlet also bow deeply.</i>
denotation	The most direct or specific meaning of a word or expression; the class of objects that an expression refers to. Beyond their immediate denotation the words have a connotative power.
diacritical	Capable of distinguishing.
<u>emblem</u>	A visible symbol representing an abstract idea. <i>Our child would be a dazzling emblem of our love.</i>
embodiment	A concrete representation of an otherwise nebulous concept. She seemed to be a living embodiment of vitality.
<u>exclamation</u>	A loud complaint or protest or reproach. She gave an exclamation of delight.
<u>exemplify</u>	Clarify by giving an example of. The best dry sherry is exemplified by the fino of Jerez.
incarnate	Embody or represent (a deity or spirit) in human form. An incarnate spirit.
<u>index</u>	Record names subjects etc in an index. The pins are retracted and index ed to occupy an adjacent slotted position.
indicant	A thing which indicates something. Symptoms are the prime indicant s of disease.
indication	Something (as a course of action) that is indicated as expedient or necessary. The visit was an indication of the improvement in relations between the countries.
<u>manifestation</u>	A clear appearance. The butterfly was one of the many manifestation s of the Goddess.
mark	Make underscoring marks. The examiner may have hundreds of scripts to mark .
mascot	A person or animal that is adopted by a team or other group as a symbolic figure. <i>The team s dolphin mascot</i> .



punctuate	Insert punctuation marks into. <i>Her sharp questions punctuated the speaker s drone.</i>
punctuation	The marks used to clarify meaning by indicating separation of words into sentences and clauses and phrases. You will notice that no punctuation is used.
represent	Be a delegate or spokesperson for represent somebody s interest or be a proxy or substitute for as of politicians and office holders representing their constituents or of a tenant representing other tenants in a housing dispute. I represent the silent majority.
sign	A fundamental linguistic unit linking a signifier to that which is signified. A sign of the Zodiac.
<u>signify</u>	Convey or express a meaning. What does his strange behavior signify .
<u>symbol</u>	Symbolize. The limousine was another symbol of his wealth and authority.
<u>symbolic</u>	Serving as a visible symbol for something abstract. <i>Symbolic thinking.</i>
symptom	(medicine) any sensation or change in bodily function that is experienced by a patient and is associated with a particular disease. <i>The government was plagued by leaks a</i> symptom <i>of divisions and poor</i> <i>morale.</i>
<u>tag</u>	Attach a monitoring tag to. Mothers suspected that their babies had been wrongly tag ged during an alarm at the hospital.
zodiac	Astrology a circular diagram representing the 12 zodiacal constellations and showing their signs.
