feisty	Touchy and aggressive. <i>A love story with a feisty heroine who s more than a pretty face.</i>
flamboyant	Bright, colourful, and very noticeable. <i>A flamboyant bow tie.</i>
gall	An animal s gall bladder. <i>The trade in animal parts such as bear galls.</i>
gallant	Being attentive to women like an ideal knight. <i>Pamella thought that was very gallant of him.</i>
gutsy	Having or showing courage, determination, and spirit. <i>A gutsy red wine.</i>
hardy	United States slapstick comedian who played the pompous and overbearing member of the Laurel and Hardy duo who made many films (1892-1957). <i>Hardy explorers of northern Canada.</i>
hearten	Make more cheerful or confident. <i>She was heartened to observe that the effect was faintly comic.</i>
hero	(in mythology and folklore) a person of superhuman qualities and often semi-divine origin, in particular one whose exploits were the subject of ancient Greek myths. <i>The hero of the range is the daily face peel.</i>
inspire	Serve as the inciting cause of. <i>His philosophy inspired a later generation of environmentalists.</i>
intrepid	Invulnerable to fear or intimidation. <i>Intrepid pioneers.</i>
manly	(of an activity) befitting a man. <i>A manly torso of perfect proportions.</i>
plucky	Marked by courage and determination in the face of difficulties or danger; robust and uninhibited-Judith Crist. <i>The plucky youngster has astounded medical staff.</i>
robust	(of wine or food) strong and rich in flavour or smell. <i>A robust metal cabinet.</i>

shameless	Feeling no shame. <i>His shameless hypocrisy.</i>
<u>stalwart</u>	Strongly built and sturdy. <i>He was of stalwart build.</i>
supporting	Capable of bearing a structural load. <i>He offered no supporting evidence for this opinion.</i>
<u>valiant</u>	Possessing or showing courage or determination. <i>A valiant soldier.</i>
venturous	Willing to take risks or embark on difficult or unusual courses of action. <i>A venturous spirit.</i>
