Enclose by or as if by a fortification.  
*The girl was **fortified** by her religious faith.*

#### **give courage**

Occur.

#### **hearten**

Make more cheerful or confident.  
*She was **heartened** to observe that the effect was faintly comic.*

<b>make brave</b>	Favor the development of.
<b>make braver</b>	Change from one form into another.
<b>recreate</b>	Reproduce; re-enact. <i>The door was now open to <b>recreate</b> a single German state.</i>
<b>stiffen the resolve of</b>	Become stiff or stiffer.
<b>strengthen</b>	Give a healthy elasticity to. <i>His body <b>strengthened</b>.</i>

<b>elate</b>	Fill with high spirits; fill with optimism. <i>Their <b>elate</b> and animated faces.</i>
<b>encourage</b>	Persuade (someone) to do or continue to do something by giving support and advice. <i>His financial success <b>encouraged</b> him to look for a wife.</i>
<b>feisty</b>	Touchy and aggressive. <i>A love story with a <b>feisty</b> heroine who s more than a pretty face.</i>
<b>flamboyant</b>	Bright, colourful, and very noticeable. <i>A <b>flamboyant</b> bow tie.</i>
<b>gall</b>	An animal s gall bladder. <i>The trade in animal parts such as bear <b>galls</b>.</i>
<b>gallant</b>	Being attentive to women like an ideal knight. <i>Pamella thought that was very <b>gallant</b> of him.</i>
<b>gutsy</b>	Having or showing courage, determination, and spirit. <i>A <b>gutsy</b> red wine.</i>
<b>hardy</b>	United States slapstick comedian who played the pompous and overbearing member of the Laurel and Hardy duo who made many films (1892-1957). <i><b>Hardy</b> explorers of northern Canada.</i>
<b>hearten</b>	Make more cheerful or confident. <i>She was <b>heartened</b> to observe that the effect was faintly comic.</i>
<b>hero</b>	(in mythology and folklore) a person of superhuman qualities and often semi-divine origin, in particular one whose exploits were the subject of ancient Greek myths. <i>The <b>hero</b> of the range is the daily face peel.</i>
<b>inspire</b>	Serve as the inciting cause of. <i>His philosophy <b>inspired</b> a later generation of environmentalists.</i>
<b>intrepid</b>	Invulnerable to fear or intimidation. <i><b>Intrepid</b> pioneers.</i>
<b>manly</b>	(of an activity) befitting a man. <i>A <b>manly</b> torso of perfect proportions.</i>
<b>plucky</b>	Marked by courage and determination in the face of difficulties or danger; robust and uninhibited-Judith Crist. <i>The <b>plucky</b> youngster has astounded medical staff.</i>
<b>robust</b>	(of wine or food) strong and rich in flavour or smell. <i>A <b>robust</b> metal cabinet.</i>

<b>shameless</b>	Feeling no shame. <i>His <b>shameless</b> hypocrisy.</i>
<b><u>stalwart</u></b>	Strongly built and sturdy. <i>He was of <b>stalwart</b> build.</i>
<b>supporting</b>	Capable of bearing a structural load. <i>He offered no <b>supporting</b> evidence for this opinion.</i>
<b><u>valiant</u></b>	Possessing or showing courage or determination. <i>A <b>valiant</b> soldier.</i>
<b>venturous</b>	Willing to take risks or embark on difficult or unusual courses of action. <i>A <b>venturous</b> spirit.</i>
