bullock	A male domestic bovine animal that has been castrated and is raised for beef. <i>People have dropped dead bullocking their guts out.</i>

collier	Someone who works in a coal mine.
dishonor	Bring shame or dishonor upon. <i>Dishonor checks and drafts.</i>

dredge	Clear the bed of a harbour river or other area of water by scooping out mud weeds and rubbish with a dredge. <i>The lower stretch of the river had been dredged.</i>
drone	A musical instrument or part of one sounding a continuous note of low pitch in particular also drone pipe a pipe in a bagpipe or also drone string a string in an instrument such as a hurdy gurdy or a sitar. <i>Pilots use remote controls to guide a stealth reconnaissance drone.</i>
elicit	Derive by reason. <i>Elicit a solution.</i>
embezzlement	The fraudulent appropriation of funds or property entrusted to your care but actually owned by someone else. <i>Charges of fraud and embezzlement.</i>
entangle	Entrap. <i>Fish attempt to swim through the mesh and become entangled.</i>
feud	Carry out a feud. <i>Hoover feuded with the CIA for decades.</i>
haul	The act of drawing or hauling something. <i>The thirty mile haul to Boston.</i>
implicate	Bear some of the responsibility for (an action or process, especially a criminal or harmful one). <i>He implicated his government in the murders of three judges.</i>
intrigue	Form intrigues for in an underhand manner. <i>I was intrigued by your question.</i>
involve	Require as useful, just, or proper. <i>The situation was rather involved.</i>
involvement	A connection of inclusion or containment. <i>She knew that involvement with Adam would only complicate her life.</i>

<u>liaison</u>	Introduction of a consonant between a word that ends in a vowel and another that begins with a vowel, as in English law and order. <i>He provided a liaison with the guerrillas.</i>
lug	A box or crate used for transporting fruit. <i>A truck piled high with wooden lugs of grapes.</i>
<u>lure</u>	Something used to lure fish or other animals into danger so they can be trapped or killed. <i>The child was lured into a car but managed to escape.</i>
<u>manipulation</u>	The action of manipulating something in a skilful manner. <i>He saw through her manipulations.</i>
peculation	The fraudulent appropriation of funds or property entrusted to your care but actually owned by someone else.
pull	An act of pulling something. <i>He took a pull on his cheroot.</i>
scandal	Rumour or malicious gossip about scandalous events or actions. <i>Divorce was cause for scandal in the island.</i>
<u>shame</u>	Bring shame to. <i>She shamed him into making amends.</i>
straighten	Straighten by unrolling. <i>She helped him straighten his tie.</i>
<u>tangle</u>	Tangle or complicate. <i>The home team s defence got into an awful tangle.</i>
tow	Of a motor vehicle or boat pull another vehicle or boat along with a rope chain or tow bar. <i>A pickup van towing a trailer.</i>
<u>trail</u>	A trailer for a film or broadcast. <i>Alex trailed a hand through the clear water.</i>
tug	Tow a ship by means of a tugboat. <i>The ships were tugged off the reefs.</i>
