ardent

Characterized by intense emotion.
*Frightened by his **ardent** burning eyes.*

<u>assertive</u>	Having or showing a confident and forceful personality. <i>Pointing directly at a listener is an assertive act.</i>
conclusive	(of evidence or argument) having or likely to have the effect of proving a case; decisive. <i>The evidence is conclusive.</i>
decided	(of a person) having clear opinions; resolute. <i>He quotes from decided cases.</i>
<u>decisive</u>	Unmistakable. <i>Cast the decisive vote.</i>
<u>definite</u>	(of a person) certain or sure about something. <i>A definite statement of the terms of the will.</i>
<u>distinctive</u>	Characteristic of one person or thing, and so serving to distinguish it from others. <i>Jerusalem has a distinctive Middle East flavor.</i>
emphasised	Spoken with emphasis.
emphasized	Spoken with emphasis.
<u>energetic</u>	Relating to or characterized by energy (in the technical sense). <i>It caused an energetic chemical reaction.</i>
exclamatory	(of a cry or remark) expressing surprise, strong emotion, or pain.
firm	Marked by firm determination or resolution not shakable. <i>The post was still firm after being hit by the car.</i>
forceful	Forceful and definite in expression or action. <i>A forceful personality.</i>
forcible	Vigorous and strong; forceful. <i>Signs of forcible entry.</i>
<u>insistent</u>	Insisting on or demanding something; not allowing refusal. <i>Insistent hunger.</i>
marked	Strongly marked easily noticeable. <i>A scar marked face.</i>
positive	Having a positive charge. <i>Protons are positive.</i>
powerful	Of a person possessing physical strength and weight rugged and powerful. <i>A fast powerful car.</i>
pronounced	Very noticeable or marked; conspicuous. <i>He had a pronounced squint.</i>
<u>striking</u>	Attracting attention by reason of being unusual, extreme, or prominent. <i>A striking thing about Picadilly Circus is the statue of Eros in the center.</i>

strong	Strong and sure. <i>They had established a strong and trusting relationship.</i>
<u>unmistakable</u>	Clearly revealed to the mind or the senses or judgment. <i>The unmistakable sound of his laughter.</i>
<u>vehement</u>	Showing strong feeling; forceful, passionate, or intense. <i>Vehement criticism.</i>
<u>vigorous</u>	(of language) forceful. <i>A vigorous old man who spent half of his day on horseback.</i>
wholehearted	Showing or characterized by complete sincerity and commitment. <i>Gave wholehearted support to her candidacy.</i>

<u>accent</u>	Put stress on utter with an accent. <i>Fabrics which accent the background colours in the room.</i>
<u>accentuate</u>	Make more noticeable or prominent. <i>His jacket unfortunately accentuated his paunch.</i>
anxiety	A nervous disorder marked by excessive uneasiness and apprehension, typically with compulsive behaviour or panic attacks. <i>He felt a surge of anxiety.</i>
anxious	Feeling or showing worry, nervousness, or unease about something with an uncertain outcome. <i>Spent an anxious night waiting for the test results.</i>
<u>assertive</u>	Having or showing a confident and forceful personality. <i>Pointing directly at a listener is an assertive act.</i>
<u>awkwardness</u>	Trouble in carrying or managing caused by bulk or shape. <i>The awkwardness of youth.</i>
emphasis	Intensity or forcefulness of expression. <i>The red light gave the central figure increased emphasis.</i>

emphasize	Give special importance or value to (something) in speaking or writing. <i>A hip length jacket which emphasized her shape.</i>
emphasized	Spoken with emphasis.
<u>emphatically</u>	In a forceful way. <i>She closed the door behind her emphatically.</i>
<u>feverish</u>	Having or affected by a fever. <i>A feverish cold.</i>
<u>fortified</u>	(of a place) provided with defensive works as protection against attack. <i>Fortified wine.</i>
hard	Unfortunate or hard to bear. <i>Put the wheel hard over to starboard.</i>
highlight	Create highlights in hair. <i>Gary Lineker presents the highlights of today s semi final.</i>
<u>impatience</u>	A lack of patience; irritation with anything that causes delay. <i>He was shifting in his seat with impatience.</i>
<u>insecurity</u>	Uncertainty or anxiety about oneself; lack of confidence. <i>Growing job insecurity.</i>
intension	The internal content of a concept.
overburden	Load (someone) with too many things to carry. <i>An overburden of costs.</i>
stiffness	Inability to move easily and without pain. <i>Headache and neck stiffness.</i>
strength	An asset of special worth or utility. <i>The political and military strength of European governments.</i>
stress	Put stress on utter with an accent. <i>Don t stress there s plenty of time to get a grip on the situation.</i>
stressed	Strengthened by the application of stress during manufacture prestressed. <i>Stressed workers reported smoking more.</i>
strong	Having a strong physiological or chemical effect. <i>Driving on these motorways requires strong nerves.</i>
strongly	In a powerful manner. <i>He was strongly affected by the divorce of his parents.</i>
tension	Feelings of hostility that are not manifest. <i>Tension holds the belt in the pulleys.</i>
<u>troubled</u>	Characterized by unrest or disorder or insubordination. <i>A troubled expression.</i>

- underscore** Underline (something).
*The company **underscored** the progress made with fuel cells.*
- uneasy** Socially uncomfortable; unsure and constrained in manner.
*An **uneasy** coalition government.*
- upset** The act of upsetting something.
*A legal dispute will cause worry and **upset**.*
- worried** Mentally upset over possible misfortune or danger etc.
*Michelle knew that her friends were very **worried** about her.*
