- *Derived from experiment and observation rather than theory.*

- real** Coinciding with reality F A Olafson.
*The competitive threat from overseas is very **real**.*
- verifiable** Capable of being verified.
*An easily **verifiable** claim.*

alien	A plant or animal species originally introduced from another country and later naturalized. <i>An alien culture.</i>
<u>animation</u>	The activity of giving vitality and vigour to something. <i>They started talking with animation.</i>
authenticated	Established as genuine.
behaviorism	An approach to psychology that emphasizes observable measurable behavior.
<u>being</u>	Being alive living. <i>Many factions remained in being.</i>
<u>documented</u>	Established as genuine. <i>The first documented case of shark attack in those waters.</i>
empiricism	Medical practice and advice based on observation and experience in ignorance of scientific findings.
existence	All that exists. <i>Our stressed out urban existence.</i>
<u>existential</u>	Concerned with existentialism. <i>Formal logicians are not concerned with existential matters.</i>

existing	Existing in something specified. <i>Depletion of the oxygen existing in the bloodstream.</i>
experience	Undergo or live through a difficult experience. <i>Experience is the best teacher.</i>
experimental	Of the nature of or undergoing an experiment. <i>An experimental knowledge of God.</i>
extant	Still in existence; surviving. <i>An extant letter.</i>
lifelong	Lasting or remaining in a particular state throughout a person's life. <i>The two men were to remain lifelong friends.</i>
lifetime	A very long period of time. <i>Fifteen shops closed during the lifetime of the scheme.</i>
live	Have life be alive. <i>I lived through two divorces.</i>
living	Pertaining to living persons. <i>Beat the living hell out of him.</i>
objectively	With objectivity. <i>Events should be reported objectively.</i>
observable	Able to be noticed or perceived; discernible. <i>Observable differences.</i>
observational	Drawing on things that one has seen, heard, or noticed in everyday life. <i>Long term observational data suggested an improvement in survival.</i>
outlast	Live or last longer than. <i>The kind of beauty that will outlast youth.</i>
outlive	(of a person) live longer than (another person). <i>The organization had largely outlived its usefulness.</i>
philosophy	The study of the fundamental nature of knowledge, reality, and existence, especially when considered as an academic discipline. <i>Don't expect anything and you won't be disappointed that's my philosophy.</i>
populate	Fill or be present in (a place or sphere). <i>The film is an epic fantasy populated by grotesque weirdos.</i>
positivism	A humanistic religious system founded on positivism.
presence	The state of being present; current existence. <i>He tested for the presence of radon.</i>
proven	Established beyond doubt. <i>A Soviet leader of proven shrewdness.</i>

- provenance** Where something originated or was nurtured in its early existence.
*They try to understand the whole universe its **provenance** and fate.*
- rationalism** (philosophy) the doctrine that knowledge is acquired by reason without resort to experience.
*Scientific **rationalism**.*
- verifiable** Able to be checked or demonstrated to be true, accurate, or justified.
*There is not a single **verifiable** fact.*
