<b>occupation</b>	A job or profession. <i>During the German <b>occupation</b> of Paris.</i>
<b>position</b>	A condition or position in which you find yourself. <i>Be familiar with the first six <b>positions</b> across the four strings.</i>
<b>post</b>	A goalpost. <i>It came by the first <b>post</b>.</i>
<b>profession</b>	A body of people engaged in a particular profession. <i>The legal <b>profession</b> has become increasingly business conscious.</i>
<b>pursuit</b>	An activity of a specified kind, especially a recreational or sporting one. <i>The Olympic <b>pursuit</b> champion.</i>
<b>situation</b>	A set of circumstances in which one finds oneself; a state of affairs. <i>The <b>situation</b> between her and Jake had come to a head.</i>
<b>trade</b>	A trade wind. <i>A significant increase in foreign <b>trade</b>.</i>
<b>vocation</b>	The particular occupation for which you are trained. <i>Not all of us have a <b>vocation</b> to be nurses or doctors.</i>

<b>apply</b>	Apply oneself to. <i>The oil industry has failed to <b>apply</b> appropriate standards of care.</i>
<b>appoint</b>	Determine or decide on (a time or a place). <i>They <b>appointed</b> a day in May for the meeting.</i>
<b>avail oneself of</b>	Be of use to, be useful to.
<b>commission</b>	Put into commission equip for service of ships. <i>The aircraft carrier was <b>commissioned</b> in 1945.</i>
<b><u>engage</u></b>	Keep engaged. <i>They <b>engaged</b> in a discussion.</i>
<b><u>enlist</u></b>	Engage (a person or their help or support). <i>He <b>enlisted</b> in the Royal Naval Air Service.</i>
<b>enrol</b>	Recruit (someone) to perform a service. <i>All entrants will be <b>enrolled</b> on new style courses.</i>
<b>hire</b>	Engage or hire for work. <i>Management <b>hired</b> and fired labour in line with demand.</i>
<b><u>involve</u></b>	Be or become occupied or engrossed in something. <i>Angela told me she was <b>involved</b> with someone else.</i>

<b>keep busy</b>	Continue a certain state, condition, or activity.
<b>make use of</b>	Add up to.
<b>occupy</b>	Occupy the whole of. <i>The young prince will soon <b>occupy</b> the throne.</i>
<b>put into service</b>	Estimate.
<b>put on the payroll</b>	Put into a certain place or abstract location.
<b>recruit</b>	Enlist (someone) in the armed forces. <i>The lab director <b>recruited</b> an able crew of assistants.</i>
<b>secure the services of</b>	Make certain of.
<b>sign</b>	Authorize a document or other written or printed material by attaching a signature. <i>She <b>signed</b> to her husband to leave the room.</i>
<b>sign up</b>	Communicate silently and non-verbally by signals or signs.
<b>take into employment</b>	Accept or undergo, often unwillingly.
<b>take on</b>	Take on a certain form attribute or aspect.
<b>tie up</b>	Finish a game with an equal number of points, goals, etc.
<b>use</b>	Habitually do something use only in the past tense. <i>I could <b>use</b> another cup of coffee.</i>
<b>utilise</b>	Put into service; make work or employ for a particular purpose or for its inherent or natural purpose.
<b>utilize</b>	Convert (from an investment trust to a unit trust). <i>How do you <b>utilize</b> this tool.</i>

## Associations of "Employ" (30 Words)

<b>applicant</b>	A person who requests or seeks something such as assistance or employment or admission. <i><b>Applicants</b> for the degree course.</i>
<b>application</b>	A verbal or written request for assistance or employment or admission to a school. <i>This principle has no <b>application</b> to the present case.</i>
<b>apply</b>	Apply to a surface. <i>The same laws <b>apply</b> to you.</i>
<b>clerk</b>	Work as a clerk. <i>A bank <b>clerk</b>.</i>
<b>contracted</b>	Reduced in size or pulled together. <i>The <b>contracted</b> pupils of her eyes.</i>
<b>coordinator</b>	A word used to connect clauses, sentences, or words of equal syntactic importance (e.g. and, or, for). <i>Subordinate clauses can be connected with a <b>coordinator</b>.</i>
<b>employed</b>	Put to use. <i>Up to 40 per cent of <b>employed</b> people are in part time jobs.</i>
<b>employee</b>	A person employed for wages or salary, especially at non-executive level.
<b>employment</b>	The state of having paid work. <i>He is looking for <b>employment</b>.</i>
<b>headhunter</b>	A person who identifies and approaches suitable candidates employed elsewhere to fill business positions. <i>A <b>headhunter</b> offering you a wonderful new position at a higher salary.</i>
<b>hire</b>	Engage or hire for work. <i>They <b>hired</b> two new secretaries in the department.</i>
<b>indenture</b>	The state of being bound to service by an indenture. <i><b>Indentures</b> recording the number of 1377 taxpayers.</i>
<b><u>interview</u></b>	Go for an interview in the hope of being hired. <i>Police are keen to <b>interview</b> two men seen nearby.</i>
<b>lackey</b>	Behave in a servile way towards (someone). <i>He denied that he was the <b>lackey</b> of the Chief Secretary to the Treasury.</i>
<b><u>mercenary</u></b>	Serving for wages in a foreign army. <i>She s nothing but a <b>mercenary</b> little gold digger.</i>
<b><u>occupation</u></b>	The act of occupying or taking possession of a building. <i>A game of cards is a pretty harmless <b>occupation</b>.</i>



<b>profession</b>	A body of people engaged in a particular profession. <i>His chosen <b>profession</b> of teaching.</i>
<b>proletarian</b>	A member of the working class (not necessarily employed). <i>A <b>proletarian</b> ideology.</i>
<b>recruiter</b>	Someone who supplies members or employees. <i>A <b>recruiter</b> will schedule you for an interview.</i>
<b>recruitment</b>	The incorporation of cells from elsewhere in the body into a tissue or region. <i>Inflammatory cell <b>recruitment</b>.</i>
<b>secretarial</b>	Relating to the work or position of a secretary. <i><b>Secretarial</b> staff.</i>
<b>semiskilled</b>	Possessing or requiring limited skills. <i><b>Semiskilled</b> dockworkers.</i>
<b>staff</b>	Provide with staff. <i>A <b>staff</b> of 600.</i>
<b>subcontract</b>	Work under a subcontract engage in a subcontract. <i><b>Subcontract</b> work.</i>
<b>subcontractor</b>	A firm or person that carries out work for a company as part of a larger project.
<b>vocation</b>	A person's employment or main occupation, especially regarded as worthy and requiring dedication. <i>GNVQs in Leisure and Tourism will be the introduction to a wide span of <b>vocations</b>.</i>
<b>workaholic</b>	Person with a compulsive need to work.
<b>worker</b>	Used in Marxist or leftist contexts to refer to the working class. <i>I got a reputation for being a <b>worker</b>.</i>
