**authorize** Give or delegate power or authority to.

**authorize** Give official permission for or approval to (an undertaking or agent).  
*The troops were **authorized** to use force.*

**endow** Furnish with an endowment.  
*The country is well **endowed** with mineral resources.*

**endue** Give qualities or abilities to.  
*Our sight would be **endued** with a far greater sharpness.*

**gift** Give as a present make a gift of.  
*The company **gifted** 2 999 shares to a charity.*

**indue** Give qualities or abilities to.

**invest** Make an investment.  
*All executive powers were **invested** in the Secretary of State.*

<b>certification</b>	Validating the authenticity of something or someone. <i>Graduates who want to gain industry recognized <b>certifications</b>.</i>
<b>characterize</b>	Describe or portray the character or the qualities or peculiarities of. <i>This poem can be <b>characterized</b> as a lament for a dead lover.</i>
<b>concede</b>	Be willing to concede. <i>They have <b>conceded</b> only one goal in seven matches.</i>
<b>concession</b>	A gesture made in recognition of a demand or prevailing standard. <i>There are <b>concessions</b> on party bookings.</i>
<b>delegate</b>	Transfer power to someone. <i>The power <b>delegated</b> to him must never be misused.</i>
<b>dividend</b>	An individual's share of a dividend. <i>Buying a rail pass may still pay <b>dividends</b>.</i>
<b>enable</b>	Render capable or able for some task. <i>The rope <b>enables</b> you to secure yourself when you climb the mountain.</i>
<b>endue</b>	Endow or provide with a quality or ability. <i>Our sight would be <b>endued</b> with a far greater sharpness.</i>

<b><u>ennoble</u></b>	Confer dignity or honor upon. <i>The theatre is a moral instrument to <b>ennoble</b> the mind.</i>
<b>enthrone</b>	Install (a monarch or bishop) on a throne, especially during a ceremony to mark the beginning of their rule. <i>The Queen was <b>enthroned</b> more than 50 years ago.</i>
<b>entitle</b>	Give the right to. <i>The Freedom of Information Act <b>entitles</b> you to request your FBI file.</i>
<b>exemption</b>	An act exempting someone. <i>Vehicles that may qualify for <b>exemption</b> from tax.</i>
<b>finance</b>	Monetary support for an enterprise. <i>The health service is <b>financed</b> almost entirely by the taxpayer.</i>
<b><u>give</u></b>	Give food to. <i>He did not <b>give</b> his name.</i>
<b>grant</b>	A contract granting the right to operate a subsidiary business. <i><b>Grant</b> permission.</i>
<b>induct</b>	Introduce someone to (a difficult or obscure subject). <i>The young geisha was <b>inducted</b> into the ways of her profession.</i>
<b><u>invest</u></b>	Make an investment. <i>I <b>invested</b> in an expensive moisturizer and tried to drink more water.</i>
<b><u>permit</u></b>	Make it possible through a specific action or lack of action for something to happen. <i>Weather <b>permitting</b> guests can dine outside on the veranda.</i>
<b>privilege</b>	Bestow a privilege upon. <i>A breach of parliamentary <b>privilege</b>.</i>
<b><u>qualify</u></b>	(of a word or phrase) attribute a quality to (another word, especially a preceding noun). <i>A pensioner who does not <b>qualify</b> for income support.</i>
<b><u>stake</u></b>	Support a plant with a stake or stakes. <i>The gladioli were <b>staked</b> in gaudy ranks.</i>
<b>warrant</b>	Officially affirm or guarantee. <i>The employees feel that industrial action is <b>warranted</b>.</i>
