authorize Give or delegate power or authority to.

authorize Give official permission for or approval to (an undertaking or agent).
*The troops were **authorized** to use force.*

endow Furnish with an endowment.
*The country is well **endowed** with mineral resources.*

endue Give qualities or abilities to.
*Our sight would be **endued** with a far greater sharpness.*

gift Give as a present make a gift of.
*The company **gifted** 2 999 shares to a charity.*

indue Give qualities or abilities to.

invest Make an investment.
*All executive powers were **invested** in the Secretary of State.*

| concession | A gesture made in recognition of a demand or prevailing standard. <i>There are concessions on party bookings.</i> |
| delegate | Transfer power to someone. <i>The power delegated to him must never be misused.</i> |
| dividend | An individual's share of a dividend. <i>Buying a rail pass may still pay dividends.</i> |
| enable | Render capable or able for some task. <i>The rope enables you to secure yourself when you climb the mountain.</i> |
| endue | Endow or provide with a quality or ability. <i>Our sight would be endued with a far greater sharpness.</i> |

| <u>ennoble</u> | Confer dignity or honor upon. <i>The theatre is a moral instrument to ennoble the mind.</i> |

| entitle | Give the right to. <i>The Freedom of Information Act entitles you to request your FBI file.</i> |

| privilege | Bestow a privilege upon. <i>A breach of parliamentary privilege.</i> |
| <u>qualify</u> | (of a word or phrase) attribute a quality to (another word, especially a preceding noun). <i>A pensioner who does not qualify for income support.</i> |
| <u>stake</u> | Support a plant with a stake or stakes. <i>The gladioli were staked in gaudy ranks.</i> |
| warrant | Officially affirm or guarantee. <i>The employees feel that industrial action is warranted.</i> |
