abandoned	Free from constraint- Liam O’Flaherty. <i>Weed grown yard of an abandoned farmhouse.</i>
anarchist	An advocate of anarchism. <i>An anarchist newspaper.</i>
anarchy	The organization of society on the basis of voluntary cooperation, without political institutions or hierarchical government; anarchism. <i>He must ensure public order in a country threatened with anarchy.</i>
blank	A document with blank spaces to be filled. <i>Those blank moments aboard airplanes.</i>
countermand	Declare (a vote or election) invalid. <i>He was already countermanding her.</i>
deplete	Use up the supply or resources of. <i>Reservoirs have been depleted by years of drought.</i>
deserted	(of a place) empty of people. <i>Deserted beaches of soft sand.</i>
destitute	Completely wanting or lacking. <i>Young recruits destitute of experience.</i>
devoid	Completely wanting or lacking. <i>The sentence was devoid of meaning.</i>
disrepair	Poor condition of a building or structure due to neglect. <i>The station gradually fell into disrepair.</i>
evacuate	(of troops) withdraw from (a place). <i>The last British troops evacuated the Canal Zone.</i>
famish	Die of food deprivation. <i>Many famished in the countryside during the drought.</i>
hollow	As if echoing in a hollow space. <i>A hollow groan.</i>

<u>hunger</u>	Feel or suffer hunger. <i>He hungered for a sense of self worth.</i>
hungry	Feeling hunger; feeling a need or desire to eat food. <i>Grasping power hungry individuals.</i>
impassive	Deliberately impassive in manner. <i>His cold impassive face.</i>
impoverish	Make (a person or area) poor. <i>The soil was impoverished by annual burning.</i>
nihilist	A person who believes that life is meaningless and rejects all religious and moral principles. <i>It is impossible to argue against a nihilist.</i>
penniless	Not having enough money to pay for necessities. <i>A penniless young student.</i>
<u>ravenous</u>	(of hunger or need) very great; voracious. <i>A ravenous boy.</i>
<u>revoke</u>	Officially cancel (a decree, decision, or promise). <i>The men appealed and the sentence was revoked.</i>
<u>starve</u>	Deprive of food. <i>The political prisoners starved to death.</i>
<u>starving</u>	The act of depriving of food or subjecting to famine. <i>The world's starving children.</i>
thirst	A physiological need to drink. <i>He is oblivious to all the thirst around him.</i>
vacancy	An unoccupied position or job. <i>Vacancy vanity and inane deception.</i>
<u>vacant</u>	(of a position or employment) not filled. <i>The throne is never vacant.</i>
<u>vacate</u>	Leave behind empty; move out of. <i>He vacated his office as Director.</i>
vacuum	A vacuum cleaner. <i>The political vacuum left by the death of the Emperor.</i>
<u>vagrant</u>	Relating to or living the life of a vagrant. <i>Vagrant beggars.</i>
<u>void</u>	(in bridge and whist) having been dealt no cards in a particular suit. <i>Void a plea.</i>
