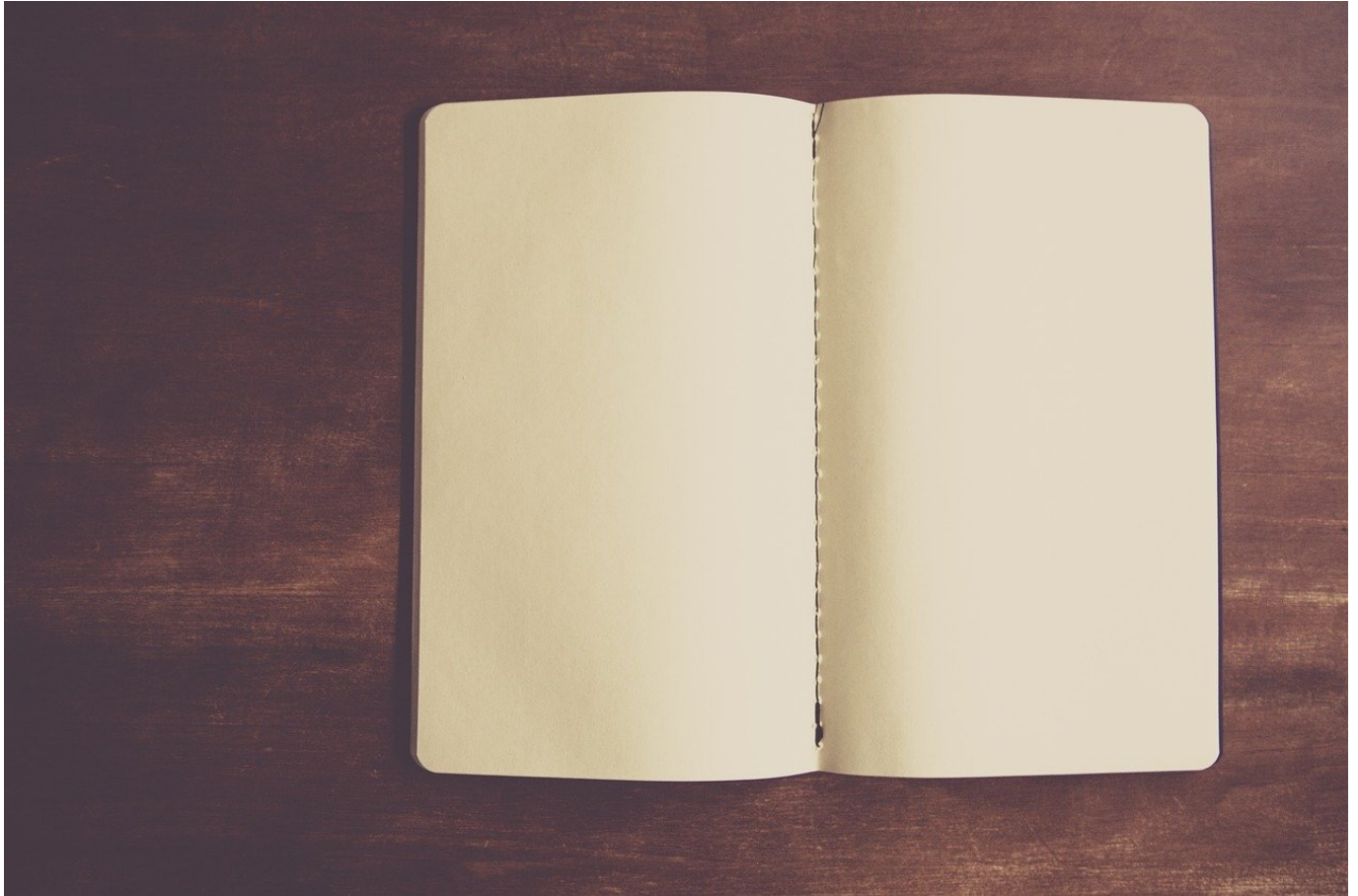

- abandon** Give up completely (a practice or a course of action).
*He had clearly **abandoned** all pretence of trying to succeed.*
- bleed** Draw blood.
*The cut was **bleeding** steadily.*
- clear** Make free from confusion or ambiguity make clear.
*Karen **cleared** the dirty plates.*
- disburden** Relieve (someone or something) of a burden or responsibility.
*I decided to **disburden** myself of the task.*
- discharge** Go off or discharge.
*If the jury cannot agree it should be **discharged**.*

evacuate	Empty completely. <i>The last British troops evacuated the Canal Zone.</i>
extract	Extract by the process of distillation. <i>Early computers had an instruction to extract a square root.</i>
make vacant	Reach a destination, either real or abstract.
milk	Draw milk from a cow or other animal either by hand or mechanically. <i>Two hours later he was up again to milk the cows.</i>
pour out	Pour out.
pump out	Deliver forth.
remove	Remove something concrete as by lifting pushing or taking off or remove something abstract. <i>It is an isolated place far removed from the London art world.</i>
siphon off	Move a liquid from one container into another by means of a siphon or a siphoning action.
tap	Furnish with a tap or spout so as to be able to draw liquid from it. <i>He considered whom he could tap for information.</i>
<u>unburden</u>	Relieve (someone) of a burden. <i>Unburden the donkey.</i>
<u>unload</u>	Leave or unload. <i>Unload the cargo.</i>
<u>unpack</u>	Analyse (something) into its component elements. <i>I haven't unpacked yet.</i>
<u>vacate</u>	Leave behind empty; move out of. <i>The Justices vacated a ruling by the federal appeals court.</i>
<u>void</u>	Declare that (something) is not valid or legally binding. <i>The concert hall was voided of the audience.</i>
withdraw	Withdraw from active participation. <i>For the cocaine user it is possible to withdraw without medication.</i>

<u>ineffectual</u>	Not producing any significant or desired effect. <i>An ineffectual ruler.</i>
<u>insignificant</u>	Too small or unimportant to be worth consideration. <i>She was so small and insignificant.</i>
insubstantial	Lacking solidity or strength. <i>An insubstantial and unsatisfying meal.</i>

meaningless	Having no purpose or reason. <i>The paragraph was a jumble of meaningless words.</i>
 motiveless	Occurring without motivation or provocation- F.D.Roosevelt. <i>Motiveless malignity.</i>
not filled	Taken up.
nugatory	Of no value or importance. <i>A nugatory law.</i>
of no use	Quantifier; used with either mass nouns or plural count nouns for indicating a complete or almost complete lack or zero quantity of.
of no value	Quantifier; used with either mass nouns or plural count nouns for indicating a complete or almost complete lack or zero quantity of.
<u>pointless</u>	Having little or no sense, use, or purpose. <i>My pencils are all pointless.</i>
purposeless	Serving no useful purpose; having no excuse for being. <i>Purposeless vandalism.</i>

hollow	A depression hollowed out of solid matter. <i>The hollow sound of footsteps in the empty ballroom.</i>
<u>hunger</u>	Feel or suffer hunger. <i>They died from cold and hunger.</i>
hungry	Extremely desirous. <i>Hungry for recognition.</i>
impassive	Deliberately impassive in manner. <i>Her impassive remoteness.</i>
impoverish	Exhaust the strength or vitality of. <i>The wars had impoverished him.</i>
nihilist	A supporter of an extreme Russian revolutionary party c.1900 which found nothing to approve of in the established social order. <i>It is impossible to argue against a nihilist.</i>

penniless	Not having enough money to pay for necessities. <i>A penniless young student.</i>
<u>ravenous</u>	Extremely hungry. <i>I d been out all day and was ravenous.</i>
<u>revoke</u>	Officially cancel (a decree, decision, or promise). <i>The men appealed and the sentence was revoked.</i>
<u>starve</u>	Die of food deprivation. <i>The political prisoners starved to death.</i>
<u>starving</u>	Suffering from lack of food. <i>The world s starving children.</i>
thirst	A strong desire for something. <i>They quenched their thirst with spring water.</i>
vacancy	An empty area or space. <i>Vacancy vanity and inane deception.</i>
<u>vacant</u>	(of a place) not occupied; empty. <i>The throne is never vacant.</i>
<u>vacate</u>	Leave (a job, post, or position) voluntarily. <i>He vacated his office as Director.</i>
vacuum	Clean with a vacuum cleaner. <i>The political vacuum left by the death of the Emperor.</i>
<u>vagrant</u>	Relating to or living the life of a vagrant. <i>Vagrant hippies of the sixties.</i>
<u>void</u>	An emptiness caused by the loss of something. <i>The gases are usually voided into the mechanism.</i>
