*He was **infatuated** with her.*

smitten (used in combination) affected by something overwhelming.
*Conscience **smitten**.*

soft on Produced with vibration of the vocal cords.

affection	The action or process of affecting or being affected. <i>She felt affection for the wise old lady.</i>
affectionate	Readily feeling or showing fondness or tenderness. <i>His affectionate nature.</i>
amatory	Relating to or induced by sexual love or desire. <i>Her amatory affairs.</i>
amorous	Showing, feeling, or relating to sexual desire. <i>She rejected his amorous advances.</i>
attached	Used of buildings joined by common sidewalls. <i>During the journey Mark became increasingly attached to Tara.</i>
beautiful	Highly enjoyable. <i>Beautiful poetry.</i>
beauty	The best aspect or advantage of something. <i>He arrived with a blonde beauty on his arm.</i>
benediction	(in the Roman Catholic Church) a service in which the congregation is blessed with the sacrament. <i>He said the benediction.</i>
blessing	The formal act of approving. <i>Enjoy the blessings of peace.</i>
caring	A loving feeling. <i>The caring professions.</i>
cherish	Be fond of; be attached to. <i>I cherish the letters she wrote.</i>
compassionate	Share the suffering of. <i>I allowed him to go home on compassionate grounds.</i>
decorous	Characterized by propriety and dignity and good taste in manners and conduct. <i>Charlotte gave David a decorous kiss.</i>
delicate	A delicate fabric or garment. <i>A delicate sweet flavour.</i>
doting	Extremely and uncritically fond of someone; adoring. <i>Deceiving her preoccupied and doting husband with a young captain.</i>
enchantingly	In a bewitching manner.

<u>fond</u>	Extravagantly or foolishly loving and indulgent. <i>A fond embrace.</i>
<u>infatuated</u>	Marked by foolish or unreasoning fondness. <i>He was infatuated with her.</i>
lovely	Used as an affectionate form of address. <i>Lovely views.</i>
loving	Feeling or showing love or great care. <i>Her music loving son.</i>
mawkish	Having a faint sickly flavour. <i>A mawkish ode to parenthood.</i>
melodrama	The genre of melodrama. <i>He gloated like a villain in a Victorian melodrama.</i>
<u>obsess</u>	Be constantly talking or worrying about something. <i>She is obsessing over her weight.</i>
<u>rendezvous</u>	Meet at a rendezvous. <i>You d be welcome to use this place as a rendezvous.</i>
<u>romantic</u>	Relating to or denoting the artistic and literary movement of romanticism. <i>A romantic candlelit dinner.</i>
sentimentality	Extravagant or affected feeling or emotion. <i>There are passages which verge on sentimentality.</i>
<u>smitten</u>	(used in combination) affected by something overwhelming. <i>Conscience smitten.</i>
<u>tender</u>	Make tender or more tender as by marinating pounding or applying a tenderizer. <i>A tender glance.</i>
<u>tryst</u>	Keep a private, romantic rendezvous with a lover. <i>A moonlight tryst.</i>
