## Encapsulate as a Verb

### Definitions of "Encapsulate" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “encapsulate” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Enclose (an organ or structure of the body) in a tough sheath or membrane.*
- *Enclose (a message or signal) in a set of codes that allow transfer across networks.*
- *Enclose in a capsule or other small container.*
- *Provide an interface for (a piece of software or hardware) to allow or simplify access for the user.*
- *Enclose (something) in or as if in a capsule.*
- *Put in a short or concise form; reduce in volume.*
- *Express the essential features of (something) succinctly.*



## Synonyms of "Encapsulate" as a verb (23 Words)

<b>abbreviate</b>	Shorten the duration of; cut short. <i>Network is often <b>abbreviated</b> to net.</i>
<b><u>abridge</u></b>	Lessen, diminish, or curtail. <i>The new law might <b>abridge</b> our freedom of expression.</i>
<b>capsule</b>	Enclose in a capsule.
<b>capsulise</b>	Enclose in a capsule.
<b>capsulize</b>	Enclose in a capsule. <i><b>Capsulize</b> the news.</i>
<b>cocoon</b>	Retreat as if into a cocoon as from an unfriendly environment. <i>We remain <b>cocooned</b> in our own little world of fantasies.</i>
<b><u>compact</u></b>	Have the property of being packable or of compacting easily. <i>The foundation of the walls <b>compacted</b> of Granite and Lime.</i>

<b><u>compress</u></b>	Make more compact by or as if by pressing. <i>The skirt can be folded and <b>compressed</b> into a relatively small bag.</i>
<b><u>condense</u></b>	Change or cause to change from a gas or vapour to a liquid. <i>The morning play on Saturday was <b>condensed</b> into a half hour package.</i>
<b>confine</b>	Deprive of freedom take into confinement. <i>The troops were <b>confined</b> to their barracks.</i>
<b>contain</b>	Be capable of holding or containing. <i>Documents <b>containing</b> both text and simple graphics can be created.</i>
<b>contract</b>	Enter into a contractual arrangement. <i>Exhale and slowly <b>contract</b> your abdominal muscles.</i>
<b><u>digest</u></b>	Systematize, as by classifying and summarizing. <i>The government <b>digested</b> the entire law into a code.</i>
<b>encase</b>	Enclose in, or as if in, a case. <i>Each was <b>encased</b> in a plastic shrink wrap.</i>
<b>enclose</b>	Enclose or enfold completely with or as if with a covering. <i>The open fields in the parish were <b>enclosed</b> in 1808.</i>
<b>enfold</b>	Enclose or enfold completely with or as if with a covering. <i>He shut off the engine and silence <b>enfolded</b> them.</i>
<b>envelop</b>	(of troops) surround (an enemy force). <i>A figure <b>enveloped</b> in a black cloak.</i>
<b>give a summary of</b>	Give entirely to a specific person, activity, or cause.
<b>precis</b>	Make a precis of a text or speech.
<b>sum up</b>	Be a summary of.
<b><u>summarize</u></b>	Give a summary (of). <i>I will now <b>summarize</b>.</i>
<b><u>surround</u></b>	Surround so as to force to give up. <i>The forest <b>surrounds</b> my property.</i>
<b>telescope</b>	Make smaller or shorter. <i>The sliding carriage escapes were <b>telescoped</b> into a shorter length.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Encapsulate" as a verb

- *The conclusion is encapsulated in one sentence.*
- *Pancreatic tumours are encapsulated in a densely packed thicket of proteins and cells.*
- *Third-party vendors can encapsulate their tools to run with this software backplane.*
- *The company would encapsulate the asbestos waste in concrete pellets.*
- *Encapsulated organs such as the kidneys.*
- *Data requested is encapsulated and can be manipulated.*



## Associations of "Encapsulate" (30 Words)

- abbreviate** Reduce in scope while retaining essential elements.  
*Network is often **abbreviated** to net.*
- abbreviated** (of clothing) very short.  
*An **abbreviated** version of the earlier work.*
- abbreviation** Shortening something by omitting parts of it.  
*Nursing records must be written without **abbreviation**.*
- abridge** Shorten (a piece of writing) without losing the sense.

<b>bowdlerize</b>	Edit by omitting or modifying parts considered indelicate. <i>Every edition of his letters and diaries has been <b>bowdlerized</b>.</i>
<b>brief</b>	Instruct a barrister by brief. <i>The president made a <b>brief</b> working visit to Moscow.</i>
<b>briefly</b>	For a short time; fleetingly. <i>She replied <b>briefly</b>.</i>
<b>concisely</b>	In a concise manner; in a few words. <i>The history is summed up <b>concisely</b> in this book.</i>
<b>condensation</b>	The conversion of a vapour or gas to a liquid. <i>The inside of the cab steamed up with <b>condensation</b>.</i>
<b>contraction</b>	The process of becoming smaller. <i>The manufacturing sector suffered a severe <b>contraction</b>.</i>
<b>curtail</b>	Deprive someone of (something). <i>I that am <b>curtailed</b> of this fair proportion.</i>
<b>diminish</b>	Lessen the authority, dignity, or reputation of. <i>The pain will gradually <b>diminish</b>.</i>
<b>elision</b>	Omission of a sound between two words (usually a vowel and the end of one word or the beginning of the next). <i>The movie s <b>elisions</b> and distortions have been carefully thought out.</i>
<b>expurgate</b>	Edit by omitting or modifying parts considered indelicate. <i>Editors heavily <b>expurgated</b> the novel before its initial publication.</i>
<b>haircut</b>	The act of cutting the hair. <i>Hair salons offering discounted <b>haircuts</b>.</i>
<b>minimize</b>	Cause to seem less serious; play down. <i>The aim is to <b>minimize</b> costs.</i>
<b>outline</b>	Draw up an outline or sketch for something. <i>An <b>outline</b> of parliamentary procedure.</i>
<b>precis</b>	Make a precis of a text or speech.
<b>profile</b>	Represent in profile by drawing or painting. <i>In soft rocks a <b>profile</b> drawn normally to the beach would show a concave form comparable with the long <b>profile</b> of a river.</i>
<b>reduce</b>	Reduce in scope while retaining essential elements. <i>The church was <b>reduced</b> to rubble.</i>
<b>resume</b>	Take or put on again. <i>The talks <b>resumed</b> in April.</i>
<b>retrench</b>	Reduce (something) in extent or quantity. <i>The company had to <b>retrench</b>.</i>

- short** Of a vowel categorized as short with regard to quality and length e g in standard British English the vowel in good is short as distinct from the long vowel u in food.  
*All too often you pitch the ball **short**.*
- shorten** Make short or shorter.  
*In winter the days **shorten**.*
- shrink** Move back or away, especially because of fear or disgust.  
*I don t **shrink** from my responsibilities.*
- shrinkage** An allowance made for reduction in the takings of a business due to wastage or theft.  
*The material lost 2 inches per yard in **shrinkage**.*
- summarize** Be a summary of.  
*I will now **summarize**.*
- summary** A brief statement or account of the main points of something.  
*A **summary** of Chapter Three.*
- synopsis** A sketchy summary of the main points of an argument or theory.  
*A **synopsis** of the insurance cover provided is set out below.*
