- becharm** Control by magic spells, as by practicing witchcraft.
- beguile** Attract; cause to be enamored.
*To **beguile** some of the time they went to the cinema.*
- bewitch** Enchant and delight (someone).
*They both were **bewitched** by the golden luminosity of Italy.*
- captivate** Attract and hold the interest and attention of; charm.
*He was **captivated** by her beauty.*
- capture** Bring about the capture of an elementary particle or celestial body and causing it enter a new orbit.
*This nucleus has **captured** the slow moving neutrons.*
- catch** Be the catcher.
*Did you **catch** a cold.*
- charm** Induce into action by using one's charm.
*She will **charm** your warts away.*
- dazzle** To cause someone to lose clear vision, especially from intense light.
*Her arguments **dazzled** everyone.*

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| delight | Take delight in. <i>An experience guaranteed to delight both young and old.</i> |
| enamor | Attract cause to be enamored. |
| enamour | Have a liking or admiration for. <i>It is not difficult to see why Edward is enamoured of her.</i> |
| enrapture | Give intense pleasure or joy to. <i>Ruth was enraptured by the sleeping child.</i> |
| ensnare | Catch in or as in a trap. <i>They were ensnared in city centre traffic.</i> |
| enthrall | Hold spellbound. <i>She had been so enthralled by the adventure that she had hardly noticed the cold.</i> |
| <u>enthrall</u> | Hold spellbound. |
| <u>entrance</u> | Put into a trance. |
| <u>fascinate</u> | Cause to be interested or curious. <i>The snake charmer fascinates the cobra.</i> |
| <u>glamour</u> | Cast a spell over someone or something; put a hex on someone or something. |
| <u>hex</u> | Cast a spell over someone or something put a hex on someone or something. <i>He hexed her with his fingers.</i> |
| hypnotize | Capture the whole attention of (someone); fascinate. <i>She gazed down hypnotized by the swirling tide.</i> |
| jinx | Foredoom to failure. <i>The play is jinxed.</i> |
| mesmerize | Induce hypnosis in. <i>They were mesmerized by his story.</i> |
| ravish | Fill (someone) with intense delight; enrapture. <i>There is no assurance that her infant child will not be ravished from her breast.</i> |
| spellbind | Hold the complete attention of (someone) as though by magic; fascinate. <i>The singer held the audience spellbound.</i> |
| <u>trance</u> | Put into a trance. <i>She s been tranced and may need waking.</i> |
| transport | Transport commercially. <i>She was transported with pleasure.</i> |
| <u>witch</u> | (of a woman) enchant (a man). <i>Mrs Mucharski had somehow witched the house.</i> |

- *You have been enchanted by some spirits.*
- *The scenery began to enchant her.*
- *Marcia had enchanted the rope so that it simply regenerated when any length was cut off.*
- *Isabel was enchanted with the idea.*

allure The power to entice or attract through personal charm.
*People for whom gold holds no **allure**.*

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| appeal | Apply to a higher court for a reversal of the decision of a lower court. <i>Police are appealing for information about the incident.</i> |
| attract | Be attractive to. <i>I did not want to attract attention.</i> |
| attraction | An entertainer who attracts large audiences. <i>She has very romantic ideas about sexual attraction.</i> |
| attractive | Pleasing to the eye or mind especially through beauty or charm. <i>The attractive force between the magnets and the metal plate.</i> |
| beguile | Influence by slyness. <i>To beguile some of the time they went to the cinema.</i> |
| cachet | A seal on a letter. <i>No other shipping company had quite the cachet of Cunard.</i> |
| captivate | Attract; cause to be enamored. <i>He was captivated by her beauty.</i> |
| charisma | Compelling attractiveness or charm that can inspire devotion in others. <i>He has tremendous charisma and stage presence.</i> |
| charm | A characteristic property of certain subatomic particles specifically charm quarks charm antiquarks and hadrons containing these expressed as a quantum number. <i>The charm begins with ritual instructions.</i> |
| engage | Engage or hire for work. <i>She had offered to engage a room in the house of the woman.</i> |
| enthrall | Hold spellbound. |
| entrance | An act or instance of entering somewhere. <i>Her final entrance is as a triumphant princess.</i> |
| fascinate | Cause to be interested or curious. <i>The serpent fascinates its prey.</i> |
| gate | Control with a valve or other device that functions like a gate. <i>He was gated for the rest of term.</i> |
| gateway | A frame or arch built around or over a gate. <i>To me a home in the country was a gateway to happiness.</i> |
| hypnotize | Induce hypnosis in. <i>She gazed down hypnotized by the swirling tide.</i> |
| inviting | Attractive and tempting. <i>The sea down there looks so inviting.</i> |
| magician | One who practices magic or sorcery. <i>He was the magician of the fan belt.</i> |

- mesmerize** Capture the complete attention of (someone); transfix.
*He was **mesmerized** when at the point of death.*
- portal** A short vein that carries blood into the liver.
*The **portals** of the cathedral.*
- seduction** A tempting or attractive thing.
*If **seduction** doesn't work she can play on his sympathy.*
- seductive** Tempting and attractive; enticing.
*A **seductive** voice.*
- spellbind** Hold the complete attention of (someone) as though by magic; fascinate.
*The singer held the audience **spellbound**.*
- tempt** Persuade (someone) to do something.
*He was **tempted** out of retirement to save the team from relegation.*
- tempting** Highly attractive and able to arouse hope or desire.
*A **tempting** invitation.*
- trance** Put into a trance.
*The kind of **trance** he went into whenever illness was discussed.*
- wile** The use of tricks to deceive someone (usually to extract money from them).
*The gang had played monopoly as they **wiled** away the hours.*
