### Definitions of "Enchant" as a verb

- *Fill (someone) with great delight; charm.*
- *Attract; cause to be enamored.*
- *Hold spellbound.*
- *Put (someone or something) under a spell; bewitch.*
- *Cast a spell over someone or something; put a hex on someone or something.*



## Synonyms of "Enchant" as a verb (27 Words)

- becharm** Control by magic spells, as by practicing witchcraft.
- beguile** Attract; cause to be enamored.  
*To **beguile** some of the time they went to the cinema.*
- bewitch** Enchant and delight (someone).  
*They both were **bewitched** by the golden luminosity of Italy.*
- captivate** Attract and hold the interest and attention of; charm.  
*He was **captivated** by her beauty.*
- capture** Bring about the capture of an elementary particle or celestial body and causing it enter a new orbit.  
*This nucleus has **captured** the slow moving neutrons.*
- catch** Be the catcher.  
*Did you **catch** a cold.*
- charm** Induce into action by using one's charm.  
*She will **charm** your warts away.*
- dazzle** To cause someone to lose clear vision, especially from intense light.  
*Her arguments **dazzled** everyone.*

<b>delight</b>	Take delight in. <i>An experience guaranteed to <b>delight</b> both young and old.</i>
<b>enamor</b>	Attract cause to be enamored.
<b>enamour</b>	Have a liking or admiration for. <i>It is not difficult to see why Edward is <b>enamoured</b> of her.</i>
<b>enrapture</b>	Give intense pleasure or joy to. <i>Ruth was <b>enraptured</b> by the sleeping child.</i>
<b>ensnare</b>	Catch in or as in a trap. <i>They were <b>ensnared</b> in city centre traffic.</i>
<b>enthrall</b>	Hold spellbound. <i>She had been so <b>enthralled</b> by the adventure that she had hardly noticed the cold.</i>
<u><b>enthrall</b></u>	Hold spellbound.
<u><b>entrance</b></u>	Put into a trance.
<u><b>fascinate</b></u>	Cause to be interested or curious. <i>The snake charmer <b>fascinates</b> the cobra.</i>
<u><b>glamour</b></u>	Cast a spell over someone or something; put a hex on someone or something.
<u><b>hex</b></u>	Cast a spell over someone or something put a hex on someone or something. <i>He <b>hexed</b> her with his fingers.</i>
<b>hypnotize</b>	Capture the whole attention of (someone); fascinate. <i>She gazed down <b>hypnotized</b> by the swirling tide.</i>
<b>jinx</b>	Foredoom to failure. <i>The play is <b>jinxed</b>.</i>
<b>mesmerize</b>	Induce hypnosis in. <i>They were <b>mesmerized</b> by his story.</i>
<b>ravish</b>	Fill (someone) with intense delight; enrapture. <i>There is no assurance that her infant child will not be <b>ravished</b> from her breast.</i>
<b>spellbind</b>	Hold the complete attention of (someone) as though by magic; fascinate. <i>The singer held the audience spellbound.</i>
<u><b>trance</b></u>	Put into a trance. <i>She s been <b>tranced</b> and may need waking.</i>
<b>transport</b>	Transport commercially. <i>She was <b>transported</b> with pleasure.</i>
<u><b>witch</b></u>	(of a woman) enchant (a man). <i>Mrs Mucharski had somehow <b>witched</b> the house.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Enchant" as a verb

- *You have been enchanted by some spirits.*
- *The scenery began to enchant her.*
- *Marcia had enchanted the rope so that it simply regenerated when any length was cut off.*
- *Isabel was enchanted with the idea.*





## Associations of "Enchant" (30 Words)

**admittance** The right to enter.  
*People were unable to gain **admittance** to the hall.*

**allure** The power to entice or attract through personal charm.  
*People for whom gold holds no **allure**.*

<b>appeal</b>	Apply to a higher court for a reversal of the decision of a lower court. <i>Police are <b>appealing</b> for information about the incident.</i>
<b>attract</b>	Be attractive to. <i>I did not want to <b>attract</b> attention.</i>
<b>attraction</b>	An entertainer who attracts large audiences. <i>She has very romantic ideas about sexual <b>attraction</b>.</i>
<b>attractive</b>	Pleasing to the eye or mind especially through beauty or charm. <i>The <b>attractive</b> force between the magnets and the metal plate.</i>
<b>beguile</b>	Influence by slyness. <i>To <b>beguile</b> some of the time they went to the cinema.</i>
<b>cachet</b>	A seal on a letter. <i>No other shipping company had quite the <b>cachet</b> of Cunard.</i>
<b>captivate</b>	Attract; cause to be enamored. <i>He was <b>captivated</b> by her beauty.</i>
<b>charisma</b>	Compelling attractiveness or charm that can inspire devotion in others. <i>He has tremendous <b>charisma</b> and stage presence.</i>
<b>charm</b>	A characteristic property of certain subatomic particles specifically charm quarks charm antiquarks and hadrons containing these expressed as a quantum number. <i>The <b>charm</b> begins with ritual instructions.</i>
<b>engage</b>	Engage or hire for work. <i>She had offered to <b>engage</b> a room in the house of the woman.</i>
<b>enthrall</b>	Hold spellbound.
<b>entrance</b>	An act or instance of entering somewhere. <i>Her final <b>entrance</b> is as a triumphant princess.</i>
<b>fascinate</b>	Cause to be interested or curious. <i>The serpent <b>fascinates</b> its prey.</i>
<b>gate</b>	Control with a valve or other device that functions like a gate. <i>He was <b>gated</b> for the rest of term.</i>
<b>gateway</b>	A frame or arch built around or over a gate. <i>To me a home in the country was a <b>gateway</b> to happiness.</i>
<b>hypnotize</b>	Induce hypnosis in. <i>She gazed down <b>hypnotized</b> by the swirling tide.</i>
<b>inviting</b>	Attractive and tempting. <i>The sea down there looks so <b>inviting</b>.</i>
<b>magician</b>	One who practices magic or sorcery. <i>He was the <b>magician</b> of the fan belt.</i>



- mesmerize** Capture the complete attention of (someone); transfix.  
*He was **mesmerized** when at the point of death.*
- portal** A short vein that carries blood into the liver.  
*The **portals** of the cathedral.*
- seduction** A tempting or attractive thing.  
*If **seduction** doesn't work she can play on his sympathy.*
- seductive** Tempting and attractive; enticing.  
*A **seductive** voice.*
- spellbind** Hold the complete attention of (someone) as though by magic; fascinate.  
*The singer held the audience **spellbound**.*
- tempt** Persuade (someone) to do something.  
*He was **tempted** out of retirement to save the team from relegation.*
- tempting** Highly attractive and able to arouse hope or desire.  
*A **tempting** invitation.*
- trance** Put into a trance.  
*The kind of **trance** he went into whenever illness was discussed.*
- wile** The use of tricks to deceive someone (usually to extract money from them).  
*The gang had played monopoly as they **wiled** away the hours.*
