<b>bewitchment</b>	A magical spell.

<b>captivation</b>	The state of being intensely interested (as by awe or terror).
<b>conjunction</b>	A ritual recitation of words or sounds believed to have a magical effect. <i>The <b>conjunction</b> of spirits.</i>

<b>enthralment</b>	A feeling of great liking for something wonderful and unusual.
<b>enticement</b>	Something that seduces or has the quality to seduce. <i>His <b>enticements</b> were shameless.</i>
<b>entrancement</b>	A feeling of delight at being filled with wonder and enchantment.
<b><u>fascination</u></b>	The state of being intensely interested (as by awe or terror). <i>Television has always held a <b>fascination</b> for me.</i>
<b>heaven</b>	A place, state, or experience of supreme bliss. <i>Those who practised good deeds would receive the reward of a place in <b>heaven</b>.</i>
<b>joy</b>	A thing that causes joy. <i>The <b>joys</b> of country living.</i>
<b>magic</b>	An illusory feat considered magical by naive observers. <i>Suddenly as if by <b>magic</b> the doors start to open.</i>
<b>necromancy</b>	Sorcery or black magic in general. <i>Alchemy <b>necromancy</b> and other magic practices.</i>
<b>rapture</b>	A state of being carried away by overwhelming emotion- Charles Dickens. <i>Leonora listened with <b>rapture</b>.</i>
<b><u>seduction</u></b>	An act of winning the love or sexual favor of someone. <i>The <b>seductions</b> of the mainland.</i>
<b>sorcery</b>	The use of magic, especially black magic.
<b><u>spell</u></b>	A psychological state induced by (or as if induced by) a magical incantation. <i>A <b>spell</b> of good weather.</i>
<b><u>temptation</u></b>	A thing that attracts or tempts someone. <i>We almost gave in to <b>temptation</b>.</i>
<b><u>trance</u></b>	A state of abstraction. <i>The kind of <b>trance</b> he went into whenever illness was discussed.</i>
<b><u>witchcraft</u></b>	The art of sorcery. <i>Children and goods were believed to be vulnerable to the <b>witchcraft</b> of jealous neighbours.</i>
<b>wizardry</b>	Very impressive or ingenious technology or devices. <i>The car is full of hi tech <b>wizardry</b>.</i>

<b>adore</b>	Worship; venerate. <i>He <b>adored</b> his mother.</i>
<b>allure</b>	Powerfully attract or charm; tempt. <i>Will sponsors really be <b>allured</b> by such opportunities.</i>
<b>amulet</b>	An ornament or small piece of jewellery thought to give protection against evil, danger, or disease.
<b>attract</b>	Be attractive to. <i>Her good looks <b>attract</b> the stares of many men.</i>
<b>attraction</b>	The force by which one object attracts another. <i>Gravitational <b>attraction</b>.</i>

<u><b>charm</b></u>	A characteristic property of certain subatomic particles specifically charm quarks charm antiquarks and hadrons containing these expressed as a quantum number. <i>The <b>charm</b> begins with ritual instructions.</i>
<u><b>charming</b></u>	Pleasing or delighting. <i>A <b>charming</b> little cottage.</i>
<u><b>dazzle</b></u>	Brightness that blinds someone temporarily. <i>She was <b>dazzled</b> by the headlights.</i>
<b>dote</b>	Be silly or feeble-minded, especially as a result of old age. <i>Having an older brother who <b>dots</b> you a lot is the best thing ever.</i>
<u><b>enchant</b></u>	Cast a spell over someone or something; put a hex on someone or something. <i>The scenery began to <b>enchant</b> her.</i>
<u><b>entrance</b></u>	Something that provides access (to get in or get out). <i>An <b>entrance</b> hall.</i>
<u><b>fascinate</b></u>	To render motionless, as with a fixed stare or by arousing terror or awe. <i>The snake charmer <b>fascinates</b> the cobra.</i>
<u><b>fascination</b></u>	The state of being intensely interested (as by awe or terror). <i>He held the children spellbound with magic tricks and other <b>fascinations</b>.</i>
<b>ingratiate</b>	Bring oneself into favour with someone by flattering or trying to please them. <i>A sycophantic attempt to <b>ingratiate</b> herself with the local aristocracy.</i>
<u><b>inviting</b></u>	Attractive and tempting. <i>The sea down there looks so <b>inviting</b>.</i>
<b>mesmerize</b>	Induce hypnosis in. <i>He was <b>mesmerized</b> when at the point of death.</i>
<u><b>obsessive</b></u>	A person who has obsessions. <i>She became <b>obsessive</b> about her school work.</i>
<b>spellbind</b>	Put into a trance. <i>The singer held the audience spellbound.</i>
<u><b>splendor</b></u>	The quality of being magnificent or splendid or grand. <i>It is the university that gives the scene its stately <b>splendor</b>.</i>

<u><b>suave</b></u>	Smoothly agreeable and courteous with a degree of sophistication. <i>All the waiters were <b>suave</b> and deferential.</i>
<u><b>superstition</b></u>	A widely held but irrational belief in supernatural influences, especially as leading to good or bad luck, or a practice based on such a belief. <i>She touched her locket for luck a <b>superstition</b> she d had since childhood.</i>
<u><b>tempt</b></u>	Persuade (someone) to do something. <i>I was <b>tempted</b> to look at my watch but didn t dare.</i>
<u><b>trance</b></u>	Put into a trance. <i>She s been <b>tranced</b> and may need waking.</i>
<b>winsome</b>	Attractive or appealing in a fresh, innocent way. <i>A <b>winsome</b> smile.</i>
<u><b>wizard</b></u>	A help feature of a software package that automates complex tasks by asking the user a series of easy-to-answer questions. <i>How absolutely <b>wizard</b>.</i>
